

September a Busy Month in Local Real Estate

Assessment Commissioner Grant today gave out the figures of the realty transfers in this city since June last up to Sept. 30. Owing to the press of work in the office, the figures, which are usually given out each month, were delayed.

As compared with a year ago, the transfers for 1905 average about the same in consideration, but in September of this year the real estate business showed a decided gain.

In that month 103 sales were recorded. The properties were assessed for \$108,108, and sold for \$143,290, or for \$35,182 more than the assessment. In September a year ago, only 97 sales were recorded, the properties being assessed for \$85,590, and selling for \$109,589, or for \$23,999 more than the assessed value.




