SOMETHING DEEPER IN MAJOR MURDER. Theory Too Delicate For Publication Is Held By Port Huron Citizens.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Port Huron, March 4.—Although many theories have been advanced by various newspapers, both local and otherwise in regard to the Major case, many of the citizens of Port Huron appear to believe that there are depths in the affair that have not been sounded by the local papers, which have not been made public.

The municipalities personally represented were: London, by Ald. J. H. Johnston; Ottawa, by Mayor Hopewell; Brantford, by Mayor Duggan; Owen Sound, by Deputy Mayor and Mr. F. M. Tait; Port Arthur city council sent a letter, which expressed hearty sympathy with the movement, and hopes that the government can prevail upon the British session to grant the relief asked for.

Continuing, Mayor Hopewell said that the proper adjustment of taxation on land and improvements would mean waste land and land held for speculation in the community, where it would be made available for use and earn its value. In answer to a question by Sir James Whitney, he remarked that his idea would be to apply the principle of home rule to every municipality, including towns, villages and counties.

Control of the civic assessment committee had given much study to the question, made a brief argument, and filed for the benefit of Sir James the cabinet a report on the situation of land values made by a committee of the Imperial House of Commons appointed under the Balfour Government, Mr. H. H. Johnston said that he had gathered showing the beneficial effect of this system of taxation.

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Those who are familiar with several unpublised aspects of the case, sincerely hope that the crime is nothing more than a cold-blooded murder by a couple of racketeers, but until the unknown partner of Esson is apprehended, or more fully probed, the danger to public safety without proof, and consequently nothing is said or will likely be until certain facts are discovered that bear on the case.

BOURASSA SCORES THE BOUNDARY BILL

He Declares That Such Actions Make His British Blood Boil. PLEDGES WERE BROKEN

In Regard to School Question, as Manitoba's Case Was Not the Same.

Montreal, March 2.—"It makes my British blood boil!" Mr. Henri Bourassa thus summed up in an interview with a Montreal newspaperman, his feelings as to the arguments used in support of the situation to be created by the Federal Government's bill for the annexation to the Province of Manitoba of a portion of the territory of Keewatin. He declared that legislation passed by the Federal Parliament in 1875, with the co-operation of both political parties, committed the Dominion for all time to the principle of separate schools for minorities, either Catholic or Protestant, in the Northwest Territories, and that any proposal to invalidate this official pledge was contrary to all British traditions and all British sense of fair play.

"My British sense of justice, my British sense of right, my British sense of honor, revolts," he said. "Have Broken Pledge." "Suppose," said Mr. Bourassa, "that the U. S. R. or any other railway corporation had received from the Federal Parliament certain privileges and advantages in the territory of Keewatin. Would annexation involve the loss of that advantage? No, Parliament would respect its pledge, as it did in 1905, against the declared opposition of the representatives of Alberta and Saskatchewan. Why should a moral pledge, solemnly given in the name of Canada for all time to come, not be observed at least as religiously as a financial one?"

"This is not a religious or racial question. It is a question of civil rights, of constitutional guarantee, of national honor. It should be discussed and treated in that light. I have noticed that some attempts are being made to connect this question with the old Manitoba school affair. A conclusion is drawn that the so-called Laurier-Greenway agreement should apply to the territory to be annexed. The argument is void.

The Case of Manitoba. "First, Manitoba was never under the authority of the Federal Parliament. It entered Confederation as a Province with its own constitution, enacted by imperial statute, which the Federal Parliament could not alter. The rights of the minority in Manitoba were heavily handicapped by the well-known first decision of the Privy Council, which maintained the validity of the law passed by the Manitoba Legislature abolishing the separate schools.

"Some papers, I notice, have started to argue that because I, for one, accepted the 'agreement,' I am denounced for protesting against the proposed renunciation of our rights in Keewatin. Promises Carried Out. "If the discussion is brought upon that ground it will be an easy matter for me to explain my position. I accepted the 'agreement,' and to what extent I accepted it. It is sufficient at present to state that the agreement included much more than was expected by the Manitoba Government. A part of the promises made by the Greenway Government to remedy the grievances of the minority were carried out. Even outside of the amendment made to the law, the law remained unaccomplished. It is the whole thing I accepted, not the part.

"Both questions should be considered apart on their respective merits. But if attempts are made to justify a breach of national honor as regards the annexation of Keewatin, on the precedent of the Laurier-Greenway agreement, those who invoke the precedent shall be responsible for a reopening of the whole system. It may mean trouble to many."

Born at Cheney Court, in Birmingham, England, he came to Canada in 1878, going directly to West Nisour, where he purchased the farm on which he had lived ever since. He cleared one of the first farms in this district. After following the pursuit of farming for some time, he engaged in the contracting business, and for some years was a railway contractor. He built the bridges across the C. P. R. from Woodstock to Windsor, and had large contracts on other lines as well.

FATALLY BURNED

FARMERS' BANK PROBE OPENS IN TORONTO

This proved satisfactory to the commission, and the representatives of the various parties interested, who had date was set for the resumption of the inquiry. It is expected that the Ottawa witnesses can all be examined this day, and if so, the commission will resume in Toronto on Monday, March 18.

The commission will inquire into the constitution and organization of the bank; the application for a charter; the giving of a charter to the bank to carry on business; the conduct and operation of the business of the bank; the cause of its failure; its capital and assets.

May Call Strike.

Several district committees of miners have voted in favor of a twenty-four hours' strike on March 11, with the possibility of continuing it indefinitely if Parliament does not take the hint. But the attitude of a majority of the miners in France appears to be on the whole conservative.

Buy From Americans.

New York, March 4.—The strike in the British coal fields has caused heavy purchases here of practically all the available supplies of soft coal in the coal ports in and near New York and at Philadelphia and Baltimore in order to meet the needs of the foreign steamship companies using the Atlantic seaboard. Local coal market prices for immediate and prompt deliveries have risen sharply in consequence.

LARGE AUDIENCE HEARS DR. YEUELL ON SUNDAY

Addressed Appreciative Listeners in the Auditorium on "Samson."

There was a large attendance of men at the Auditorium Sunday to hear Dr. Yeuell's address on Samson. The delineation of the character of Samson, which Dr. Yeuell possesses a great deal of personal optimism, and is intensely dramatic. He said that Samson was a most attractive individual because of his natural beauty and strength, but it was surprising to him that of the many fairly hardy things Samson did, that he should have been chosen to judge Israel for years. "You cannot always tell a man's strength or power by looking at his physical makeup. Samson was strong physically, but he wished like a petted boy when things did not go his way. Many a man has lost his power by playing with sin, as Samson was shorn of his strength when he allowed himself to fall into the hands of the enemy." Dr. Yeuell told in a graphic way of the conversion of John B. Gough, stating that because of the message which John B. Gough left to the young men of the world, "Young men, lead your record clean" has been held all over the world, and through this message thousands of young men have been helped, and like Samson, he was greater in his death than in his life.

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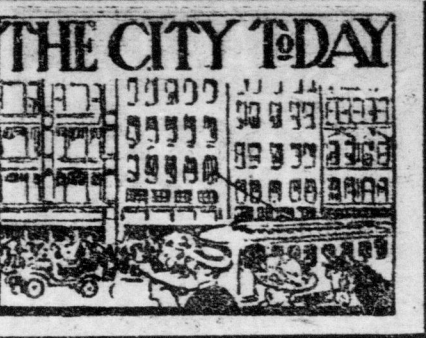
