Overt Act at Last Recognized by U. S. Government, But No Action Taken Until Congress Considers President's Request—Action Will Be Hastened by Liner's Destruction.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 27. - The sinking of the Laconia, with the loss of American lives, is looked upon by the American Government as a clear cut violation of American rights, according to an authoritative expression of opinion obtained after a conference between President Wilson and Secretary of State Lansing. No further investigation is considered neces-

Washington, Feb. 27 .- Official dispatches, confirming reports of the death of Americans on the Laconia, torpedoed without warning, establish the case as "the overt act."

No Warning.

"Laconia torpedoed without warning, 10:30 p.m., February 25th, 150 miles west of Fastnet. Overcast, heavy swells not breaking, fair breeze.

"Laconia carried 4.7 gun invisible at night. Second torpedo twenty minutes after first. Thirteen boats got away, of which No. 8 with Hoy ladies, was lost. Wireless has been sent out. Boats picked up admiralty patrol 4:00 p.m., February 26th. Cargo cotton, foodstuffs and non-explosive munitions. Apparently eight deaths out of 335 on board, 260 crew and 75 passengers, including many momen and chilincluding many momen and chil

Sank in 45 Minutes.

"Ship sank in about 45 minutes from time of first torpedo. Had fired six rockets, which were seen by admiralty patrol. Wireless also used up to last moment. Boats scattered two or three miles in swells 12 feet high. Burned flares and were picked up seriatim between 3 and 4 a.m., February 26th."

WIRELESS OPERATORS HEROES OF LACONIA

Queenstown, Feb. 27 .- Wireless Operators Taylor and Donnes were heroes of the Laconia disaster. They were the two last survivors to leave the sinking Cunarder. They stuck to their apparatus, sending out "S. O. S." calls until a British warship responded, and then jumped overboard. The Meboat commanded by Capt. Irvine picked the two men up, little the worse for their experience.

All survivors' stories today united in eulogy of the splendid conduct and discipline of the Laconia's officers and crew.

British, With Guns, Cavalry and Infantry, Are Pressing Retiring Germans Closely Along the Ancre---Great British Victory Is in Sight.

New York, Feb. 27 .- A news agency dispatch, published here oday, follows:

"With the British Armies Afield, February 27 .- There seems every reason to believe the present German retirement will not be ended until the Teutons reach a line approximating the front between Arras and Cambrai

TOWARDS BAPAUME.

"Meanwhile the British are still pressing forward today. They are constantly in touch with the Germans-and the Germans are breaking many war records in their retreat. The British pressure is toward Bapaume, and the advance is being rapidly forced. The Germans, however, are offering stiff resistance with largecalibre guns, which are evidently mounted on railway trucks, all ready for a quick getaway at the psychological moment. BLEW UP DEFENCES.

"Just before the Germans took flight they blew up their strongest defensive works. But this didn't worry the British. A new line is being established by the British troops far back of what was the old enemy front line.

"It is said the Germans had many thousand soldiers and civilian prisoners working on the defensive works in the line from Arras to Cambrai for the past few weeks.

ALL EYES ON BAPAUME.

"For the present moment all eyes are turned toward Bapaume, The Germans have converted the city into an underground Gibraltar, and have lavished on it all the arts of modern fortress building. Many explosions have been heard in the city, and there were various reports today that the garrison had blown up all these wonderful cellars and passages, as well as the city's wells, preparatory to leaving when the pressure of the British forces becomes stronger.

HARASSING THE ENEMY.



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United States Money To Flow Into Russia, China and Canada

Address given before the Boston Chapter of the American Institute of Banking at Boston on 16th inst. by Samuel McRoberts, executive manager National City Bank of New York. Mr. McRoberts said in part:

If we are ambitious simply to hold the new capital derived from the war, we can expect to do so only by putting it to productive use. The parable of the talents is good financial doctrine today, and we cannot devise a napkin with which to hold the gold. We can expect to keep it only by immediately putting it to active use, and incorporating it into the commercial capital of the world's business. The conclusion seems inevitable that the outlet for our surplus capital must be in foreign investments and that the protection of our demostic comments. must be in foreign investments and that the protection of our domestic economi situation deman's this. Investment of capital in foreign government securities in sufficient volume will protect our gold supply against the immediate effects of the inevitable reaction after the war, and at the same time will prevent an inflation of bank credits at home.

So much for the dangers of the situation. But what are we going to do with the opportunities that it presents? The optimistic conclusion that New York is to be henceforth the financial centre of the world; that the overseas trade will necessarily be cleared through the United States; that the key to the world's commerce is now in our hands, and that in the natural order of things we have be come a great trading nation, with our economic position assured for a decade, is intenable. For holding such a position we have only one qualification: money. Our geographical location, outside of the natural lanes of trade, is against us We have no shipping foolilities, and on the contrary, are apparently unwilling to We have no shipping facilities, and, on the contrary, are apparently unwilling recognize the ordinary economic principles necessary to establish them. We have not a sufficient number of international banks or other machinery necessary for financing foreign trade. We prohibit the establishment of foreign banks here, which is just as essential to the development of our relations in foreign trade as the establishment of our own banks abroad. We have few men with any knowledge and experience in international commerce. Our laws have been founded with an eye solely to domestic conditions, and with no consideration for our opportunities or necessities abroad. As a nation, we have a provincial point of pportunities or necessities abroad. As a nation, we have a provincial point of iew on all these questions, and until we can develop a settled public orinion regarding foreign investments and foreign trade, we will have a weak and unstable government to look to for support. When you contrast this with England's unparalleled equipment in each of these details, the conclusion is inevitable that no paraticled equipment in each of these details, the conclusion is inevitable that no Aladdin's lamp of gold is sufficient to produce a great foreign trade, and that by no one war can England be deprived of the dominance that has been the slow growth of centuries and the product of the energy and devotion of so many English lives. Whatever our ambitious desires may be, it must be a source of deep satisfaction to you that it is so, and that England, while paying in blood and treasure to preserve her ideals of government and civilization, will not also deep satisfaction to you that it is so, and that England, while paying in blood and treasure to preserve her ideals of government and civilization, will not also suffer that loss. That we are in no position to dominate the situation should be no cause for discouragement. On the other hand, considering our inexperience and lack of first-hand knowledge, our opportunity is probably greater in that through our surplus capital we can be useful to England in preserving what she has already established. An unofficial financial alliance with English and French capital would give greater safety and stability to our progress. and Europe's need capital would give greater safety and stability to our progress, and Europe's need of such support for a number of years following the war will insure us immedlate results that otherwise could have only been obtained by long years of patient building. In such co-operation lies our greatest opportunity, and it should not be endangered by faltering in the last stages of the conflict, or with rawing the financial support that has been up to this time so splendidly extended.

While recognizing the value of co-operation with European finance, we can While recognizing the value of co-operation with European linance, we cannot overlook those fields that are still unoccupied, wherein we lay the foundation for our own independent trade and commerce. Following the maxim of experience, that "trade follows the loan," we should in protecting our financial position by foreign loans not overlook those countries where future trade can be obtained. Probably the greatest field for our future operation is Mexico, owing to the character of its un'eveloped resources and its close juxtaposition. When life and property can be considered permanently safe in that country, our capital, and property can be considered permanently safe in that country, our capital and energy will flow over the border, to the mutual benefit of both countries. It is probably our greatest field and should be peculiarly our own. The re-establishment of its Government can be confidently expected when the European war no ys the hand of the other nations who have investments there. Canada ardly continue beyond the equalization of the interest rates between here and London. The most important distant fields are Russia and China, and you have asked me to speak particularly of Russia.

It is difficult to comprehend the physical extent of Russia or make compari sons that clearly convey an idea of its great area. It has one-sixth of the land area of the globe. The rail journey direct from Warsaw to Vladivostok is 6,000 miles long, nearly twice the distance from New York to San Francisco. It is over 2,000 miles from the Arctic Sea to Tiflis or Samarkand, about the distance from Hudson's Bay to the Gulf of Mexico. It has all variations of climate, from arctic to semi-tropical, such as you would encounter from Labrador to Florida In its borders are the most extensive plains in the world, the longest rivers, an some of the highest mountain ranges. It has all the climatic conditions of the some of the nignest mountain ranges. It has all the chimatic conditions of the remainder of the North Temperate zone, somewhat intensified by its great area being unbroken by seas. Within its borders are found all the natural resources that are essential to modern civilization. It has very large known deposits of inat are essential to modern civilization. It has very large known deposits of iron, coal, oil, copper and the precious metals, and practically all of the metals of minor importance. It has about one-half of the standing timber north of the Equator. It has the most extensive area of first-class farm land found anywhere on the globe. It has about 175,000,000 inhabitants.

The present status of the development of these resources is indicated by the The present status of the development of these resources is indicated by the production of the last normal year before the war, 1913. That year produced about forty million tons of coal; four and a half million tons of finished iron and steel; 75 million pounds of copper, valued approximately at \$10,000,000; 1,300,000 ounces of gold, worth \$26,000,000, and 275,000 ounces, or \$25,000,000 worth of

Russia is, next to the United States, the largest producer of oil—the production for 1913 was over 60 million barrels.

Her forests have hardly been touched, and comprise today the great timber reserve of Europe, Russia having practically all of the surplus timber available outside of Canala and the United States. Still she exported during 1913 some \$84,000,000 worth of timber products. In agriculture, Russia pianted to cereals alone over 215,600,000 acres in 1913. On \$2.600,000 acres pianted to wheat, she produced over a billion bushels. In the same year the United States planted 19,600,000 acres, and produced three-quarters of a billion bushels. The yield in Russia per acre for winter wheat was practically the same as that of the United States. Her production in all other cereals, outside of corn, is much more extensive than the United States, and her root products are enormously greater. Russia has more sheep and goats than the United States, about as many cattle, about one-fourth as many hogs, and a much greater number of horses. It is still essentially an agricultural country. Eighty-five per cent of its people live on the land and obtain their livelihood almost solely by agricultural pursuits. At the same time there are established in the empire over 200 cities, ranging from a few thousand inhabitants to Petrograd with its two million. Russia has constructed and in operation 47,000 miles of railways, practically all of which is first-class in every respect and operated at a profit, comparing favorably with railroads elsewhere in the world. Russia produces about two-thirds of the cotton which she manufactures, and cotton growing can be easily extended to meet all of her requirements. She produces a great surplus of flax, which is largely exported in the raw state, although a substantial beginning has been made in textile manufacturing, not only on cotton and flax fabrics, but also wool. The coal and steel industry was developed previous to the war to a point where it produced the bulk of its own upon solutions of metallurgical problems, but simply upon the application of or

A consideration of geographical conditions leads to the conclusion that the Russian Empire, with the possible exception of Poland, is logicalclusion that the Russian Empire, with the possible exception of Poland, is logically one empire. When you consider Russian history, apart from its tragic and interesting character, you are most impressed with its consistent and logical development. This territory is occupied by people originally consisting of more than forty different races. It would seem that in the development of the nations, to produce the greatest unit was necessarily the hardest task and has required the loggest time.

This gives us the necessary entree into Russian affairs, and it would plainly be useless to subsequently consider industrial financing in Russia unless our investors understood and appreciated the intrinsic value of the Government securities. LIBERALS CINCH IT IN NEW BRUNSWICK: SWEEP GLOUCESTER

Government Reduced to 21 Seats; Opposition 27.

NOT THE FRENCH VOTE

An Analysis of Statistics Overthrows Conservative Argument.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Feb. 26.-By carrying all four seats in Gloucester today by heavy majorities the Opposition comes into power in New Brunswick with a clear lead of six seats in the legislature out of forty-eight seats. The now Opposition has twenty-seven, leaving the present Government twentyone, as compared with two seats for the Opposition and forty-six for the Government in the last house. The Op-position has won ten of the seventeen ridings in the province, splitting in another, and has a large majority of the popular vote. In not one of the seven ridings did the Government make

While some opponents of the new Government have made the statement that the French-speaking sections de-feated the Murray administration, the returns do not show this, for the river counties, Queens and Sunbury, all English, and Victoria, mostly English, con-verted big Government majorities into Opposition majorities for the first time in many years, while in York, Kings, Charlotte, St. John city and St. John County, all English, large Govern majorities were cut down from 100 to 400 votes. In St. John city in 1912 three of the four Opposition candidates lost their deposits. This year one of the four Opposition men was elected, and the three others came within, roughly speaking, 200 votes of winning.

Gioucester Vote Large.
A large vote was polled in Gloucester today, and while the returns are not complete, owing to the difficulty in gathering the figures in Shippegan, Mis-cou and other islands off the coast, it would seem that the Government candidates barely saved their deposits. The Caraquets went three to one for the Opposition, while in West Bathurst where the leader of the Government ticket, J. Bennett Hachey, who is also the Conservative federal candidate in Gloucester, lives, the Opposition had a large majority.

A special train was sent from Moncton early this morning by the Government, with several Government leaders, who tried to stem the tide in Gloucester County, and several of the Opposition leaders went to Gloucester Saturday night from St. John, Moneton and the north shore for the purpose of assisting in the fight against the Government






