TWO THOUSAND GOVERNMENT IS URGED TO VICTIMS FROM LEGISLATION FOR AN 8-HOUR DAY,

Organized Labor Presents Its Claims to Dominion Government At Its Annual Interview This Afternoon - Action To Restore To All Workers Absolute Right To Organize

Ottawa, Jan. 8 .- By Canadian Press .- Organized labor presented its claims to the government at its annual interview this afternoon. This year's repre-sentations are of specially wide interest in view of the provisions of the treaty of Versailles, and of the part played by the Dominion Government delegates at the International Labor Conference at Washington. The delegation was headed by Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress. The chief re-

Legislation for an 8-hour day and a 44-hour week, with establishment of a minimum wage adequate to insure a fair standard of living.

Repeal of recent amendments to the criminal code imposing heavy fines for possession of certain literature.

Action to restore to all workers the absolute right to organize, Encouragement of the principle of collective bargaining.

On the question of immigration—in which organized labor has always taken a keen interest—the delegation had three recommendations to make: 1. Appointment of a representative of organized workers along with others on a central empire board; 2. Necessity of revision of the present method of admittance of Orientals by either total exclusion or international arrangement, limit-

ing the number to one per thousand of the population; 3. Elimination of any system whatever of bonusing for industria Cause of Strikes.

Cause of Strikes.

In presenting a claim for legislation enacting the eight-hour day and 44-hour week, the delegation submitted a written memorandum as follows:

"The efforts to establish this shorter work day and week, and an adequate wage have been the most fruitful cause of sirikes.

"The justice of the claim for a maximum 8-hour day is recognized in the treaty of peace to which Canada is a signatory."





TEMPORARY ASSESSORS GET PERMANENT JOBS, SO OTHERS ARE NEEDED

Last Year's Men Not Available for Present Work.

Training in the city assessment department is evidently valuable to the persons receiving it. Every year it is necessary to engage six temporary helpers about this time of the year. 

OTTAWA, Jan. 7 .- By an arrangement between counsel representing the various interests by which statements

ment between counsel representing the various interests by which statements as to non-contentious points in the dispute have been filed as exhibits in the case, the hearing of the million dollar power action against the Dominion Government has shortened, it is estimated, by at least two or three weeks. The hearing, which opened this morning before Sir Walter Cassels in the exchequer court, is now expected to take about a week. Only one witness, R. A. Clarke, chief engineer for the Toronto Power Company, was heard today. He was being crossexamined by Mr. G. H. Kilmer, counsel for the Ontario Power Company, when the court adjourned this evening.

Mr. Clarke dealt in his evidence with the history of his company's claim against the Government for power supplied on the orders of Sir Henry Drayton, power controller, to the Ontario Power Company, and by them to munition plants. The price to be charged for this power is an issue in the case and the court is to judge what is a fair charge for the 35,000 horsepower supplied as a steady load for some sixteen months. TWO DEAD, SEVERAL INJURED AS RESULT OF OIL EXPLOSION

Ends in Fatalities and Big Fire.

MONTREAL, Jan. 7 .- (Canadian Press Dispatch.) - One man was killed outright and one died tonight in the General Hospital here, while twelve others are suffering from severe burns, following the explosion, of an oil pipe and a fire while broke out afterwards at the plant of the Imperial Oil Company, Montreal, this afternoon.

The dead are Charles Bryant, 55 years of age, of Montreal, superintendent of labor at the oil company plant; Ludger Hebert, 36 years of age, Maissonneuve, laborer, who died in the hospital at 10:45 o'clock tonight.

Three others of the injured are reported at the Montreal General Hospital as being in danger of death. All the others are reported as doing well.

The explosion was not loud, but the flames for a time were of a sensational character and could be seen over the whole east end of the island of Montreal. The outbreak was under control within half an hour of its start. Total damage is estimated at about \$10,000.

"It was a most extraordinary and unfortunate accident," said J. L. Finley, superintendent of the plant, tonight. "In all my 25 years' experience in the business I have never seen anything like it occur. The exact cause of the bursting of the pipe cannot as yet be ascertained."

TO BRING MERCHANT MARINE UP TO 70 **VESSELS IS DECISION**

Conference To Result in Letting Further Contracts.

ASSIST BUILDING YARDS

May Undertake Construction of Boats For French Government in Near Future.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Jan. 7 .- That further con. tracts will be let for the construction of ships for the Canadian merchant marine to bring the number of vessels up to 70 and that thereafter shipbuild ing yards will be assisted here was decided as a result of a conference decided as a result of a conference held between the Government and representative shipbuilders this morning. The deputation urged upon the Government the necessity of continuing ship construction, not only because of the importance of the industry, but also because of the need of employment.

Already contracts have been let for 60 steel vessels, over a score of which are now in commission. When the armistice was declared the contract price was \$199.50 per ton. It has now dropped to \$176. The total appropriations for shipbuilding were about \$75,000,000, and of this \$59,500,000 has been expended.

000,000, and of this \$59,500,000 has been expended.

It is anticipated that contracts for a dozen more ships will be let and that after that the Government will limit its efforts to bonusing. The French Government has desired for some time to have ships built in Canada. A credit of \$25,000,000 was voted for trade with that country and but a small part of it has been expended. It is possible that they may be diverted for shipbuilding purposes on the guarantee of the French Government.

THE OPENING GUN.

Mr. King's speech at Newmarket is a clear presentation of those consistent and persistent principles of Liberalism which have been the making of the best in Canadian political institutions since 1838. Liberalism always struggles against cliques, compacts, combines, cabals and narrow class spirit, asserting freedom and equality for the whole people, or the greatest good to the greatest number.

Quite justly and inevitably, but yet with mildness and mercy, the Liberal leader stated defeat even in Toronto, its huddled desperation showed up the imbecility of those who said that Liberalism is not triumphant in Ontario; Toronto is the visible proof. Sir Robert Borden. who was long somewhere in France or the eastern hemisphere, is now somewhere in the United States perhaps, and his captainless crew have not the slightest idea where they are going, have not the seamanship to steer by either political compass or political astrolabe, by hook

Amidst the criminal drift of the Federal Government, the clamors of righteous indignation everywhere and the increasing ill-will among sections and classes of the population of Canada, Mr. King lifts his voice for good-will and national unity, the ideals of Liberalism. He appeals for an entente cordiale of all elements. This can be brought about by the victory of the spirit of Liberalism which always works for general equality and opportunity. Probably Mr. King is right in his diagnosis that the thunderous atmosphere of Canadian politics is an aftereffect of the war in great measure. War makes for suspicion, distrust and jealousy all round. What is needed, says Mr. King, is a new spirit, or rather the old spirit of Liberalism, which overthrows unfairness and asserts justice. A reference to the platform drawn up by their convention will show how Canadian Liberals mean to fight unfairness-by tariff reduction, economic reforms, decent taxation and enforcement of law. The Liberal platform is the guarantee of Mr. King's promises. It aims towards

against pensions, aids, etc., that the motive for labor and saving and initiative may be weakened. What incentive, then, moved our soldiers to sacrifice in the late war? Was gain the motive of that all-sacrificing labor? A distinguishing feature of Liberalism is its belief in the dignity and worth of man, no matter what his "station" or occupation. It does not believe that a greater equalization of men's lot in life will destroy the incentive to effort and the assumption of responsibility. Some of those who prey on their fellows, as things are, might conceivably slacken their efforts if comparatively deprived of selfish prizes, the sort of men who stay home from the front; but the other sort, who went, may conceivably put forth more effort, under conditions of greater equality in reward, for the general weal.

Mr. King has made no demagogic opening in his campaign. He has made a calm, fair statement of the ideals of Liberalism, their saving grace in dealing with compacts and packings and the great need in Canada at the present time for the promotion of those ideals.

MEN WRANGLE AND BABIES STARVE. If the blockaders in the United States Senate could see Central and Eastern Europe as It is pictured in all its horror by Sir William Goode, British director of relief, the ratification of the peace treaty would seem the most urgent business in the world today. In an address recently delivered before an American organization in London, Sir William Goode declared that east of Switzerland the whole of Europe is still at war and that the whole central part of Europe is on the verge of crumbling away to ruin. It scarcely seemed to he realized, he said, that Austria, Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey are still technically at war with the Allies, and, what is more important, at war with most of their neighbors.

"Locomotives from one country dared not budge across the frontier of another; whole they came within the grasp of a neighboring army. The only real safeguard for a supply train was the presence of a solitary British Tommy, who, perched on the caboose, and knowing no language but his own, but thoroughly enjoying the freedom of riding without warrant or ticket, placidly escorted the few exchanges of food and raw materials which had so far enabled several of the countries to keep tody and soul together."

The human suffering that is going on in Central Europe today is beyond description. It is estimated that in Serbia alone there are half a million fatherless children, most of whom are suffering from exposure and malnutrition, while at least 35 per cent of the population have tuberculosis. In Hungary tuberculosis has increased 100 per cent and in the Budapest hospitals 5,000 out of the 21,000 hospital beds are occupied by children. Of the younger children out of hospital 25 per cent are suffering from rickets.

Any suppression of law breaking that is fair will not win for the offenders sympathy or support from patriotic, sane-minded citizens.





Ayres With Five Passengers Dead.

Ayres With Five Passengers Dead.

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 8.—The French steamer Malta, from Havre and Vigo, arrived here yesterday aftenoon with five passengers dead, seven dangerously ill and a large number of others suffering from attacks of influenza, which broke out in violent form a few days ago. The ship's doctor reported that he had daily attended 50 patients since the disease was first reported, and that the epidemic had continued to spread among the other passengers.

Dispatches in recent weeks have reported the reappearance of influenza in epidemic form in many parts of Spain, in varying degrees of intensity, A large number of deaths have been caused in Madrid by a double visitation of influenza and typhus, while Santandre, Valencia, Saragossa and other cities have been hard hit by influenza epidemics. No reports of the appearance of influenza at Vigo have been received, and this is also true of the French port of Havre.


