

"The way I became not famous-far less infamous—as a speaker was this. About 1870 I went one night after evensong from the prayer desk to the pulpit to read my sermon as usual. The service was late and the evening was cloudy, and suddenly for some reason the light began to fail. It was impossible for me to see to read my sermon. And then and there, for the first time in my life. I began preaching instead of reading to my people." From this accidental beginning the dean afterward attained distinction as convincing and pursuasive speaker. Dean Hole was a distinguished Free-mason. He used to point with pride to a number of beautiful stained glass windows in the cathedral at Rochester presented in 1899 by the Masons "ir onor of the grand chaplaincy" of the clergyman in the order. In 1896 he was the recipient of a handsome processional cross for the cathedral, pre-sented by several leading American Masons, whose acquaintance he made on his visit to the United States. The dean's acquaintance among the brilliant public men who were the glory of the Victorian era was wide. In his album at the deanery in Rochester he used to show with pride autographs, photographs, or brief manu-script extracts from almost all of the eminent men of the day. Dickens was one of his close friends and Dean Hole was the original of "The Dean of Cloisterham, the Rev. Septimus Cris-parkle," a character in "Edwin Drood." Dean Hole was the only ecclesiastic who was a contributor of Punch. The dean was born in 1819 at Caunton, Nottinghamshire, and was edu-cated at Newark-on-Trent and at Brasenose College, Oxford. He was ordained deacon in 1844, priest in 1845, and vicar in 1850. În 1855 he became




