The Skoda Discovery Company.

Most of our readers have noticed the large building near the railway station, erected by Messrs Rhodes, Curry & Co., as a Laboratory for the preparation of patent medicines by the Skoda Discovery Company. The structure is three stories high, with hip roof, making four floors; and is 70 feet long and 45 wide. On the lower floor are two offices, bottling room, and packing room. The second floor contains the compounding room, and two waiting rooms, where the advertising matter is prepared for delivery to the mails. The two upper floors are for storing the raw and finished products. A large amount of material is now in the building, and one carload of bottles is on the way from Montreal. The promoters of this company are the proprietors, as well as large stockholders, in the Skoda Discovery Company in the United States. They are putting the same line of German-American remedies—seven preparations in all,—on the market here, that the Canadian corporation, bearing the same name, will shortly put upon the market here. No expense will be spared in putting into these remedies the highest class of material known to medical science. Some of the formulae of these preparations, are the work of a distinguished German physician whose name the company bears. The Skoda Company in the States have recently issued an illustrated paper, called *The Morning Light*, which contains endorsements of physicians, judges, lawyers and members of Congress. A Canadian edition of this paper is now being printed by Mr Geo. A. Knudell, of St. John. One hundred thousand copies of this paper will be mailed from Wolfville, to heads of families in the lower provinces. No other line of remedies now on the market in the United States, contains such strong endorsements from prominent physicians and other distinguished men. The chief preparation is called the "Discovery," which is put up in amber colored twelve ounce bottles. This contains a more highly concentrated extract of sarsaparilla than any sarsaparilla now before the public, and more celery than any celery compound. Physicians who have used it in their practice endorse it, as not only rich in brain and nerve food, but also potent in its blood purifying properties. In a few weeks a representative of the American company who has had charge of their manufacturing department, will come to Wolfville, and superintend the putting up the preparation here.

Which Flag Protects.

Some time ago Alexander McLean was arrested and imprisoned by the Russians. He escaped and applied to the United States government, of which he claimed to be a naturalized subject, to make a demand on Russia for damages. The U. S. government have refused to urge his claim on the ground that he is a British subject, having been born in Cape Breton, and not naturalized. The British government being moved by the Canadian Government in consequence of representations made last year by Mr McDougall, M. P. for Cape Breton, ascertained, through the British consul in Boston, that McLean was naturalized there in 1882. Investigation independently of Canadian, and other reasons given by the American government, make it apparent that the latter will not support Mr McLean's claim against Russia. American citizenship is a great thing ordinarily, but when protection is asked for by any of its citizens, against a foreign power—particularly one of the great powers—an excuse is easily found and the protection to which the subject is entitled is insolently refused.

The Prohibition Commission.

Our readers will remember that at the last session of the Dominion Parliament a resolution was passed that a royal commission be appointed to make enquiries as to the workings of a prohibition law in other countries where it had been adopted. This commission has just been appointed, and is as follows:—Judge MacDonald (County court, Leeds and Grenville), Sir Joseph Hickson (late general manager of the G. T. R.), Montreal, Rev. Dr. McLeod (Fredericton), Edward H. Clarke (late mayor of Toronto) and George A. Giguere (late M. P. Rouville, Quebec), have been appointed prohibition commission; and Patrick A. Monaghan, Halifax, secretary. It is understood that the work will be commenced forthwith.

We are glad to learn that there is now quite a good prospect of a band being organized in Wolfville. The Acadian has often advocated such a movement and will be glad to lend its aid in the matter. We have no doubt but that the citizens of Wolfville would contribute generously to a fund for this purpose.

The Quebec Election.

The local general election in the Province of Quebec took place on Tuesday, 1st inst. in the complete route of Mercier, and his gang of booby followers and in the return of the Bonaventure City, succeeded in carrying 52 constituencies, Mercier's 17 and 4 unclassified, of the latter three will support the Government on matters where party lines are not drawn. Mercier was so crushed down by his defeat; that he addressed a letter to his friends announcing his retirement from public life. In this connection it is announced that Mercier will be arrested at the instance of Attorney-General Casgrain in a few days and prosecuted on criminal charges of robbing the public treasury. Newspaper comments from England and all parts of Canada are unanimous in congratulating the Province of Quebec on their noble victory of Tuesday last. Despatches from London, England, say: Mercier's defeat gives unalloyed satisfaction throughout Great Britain. As the *Financial News* says, the people here cared nothing about political or racial issues, but realized that Mercier's success would result in continued political corruption, tending to sap Canada's nationality, and destroy Canadian credit. The *St. James' Gazette* says: "The result of this spirited and crushing protest against corruption completely justified Lieut.-Governor Angers, and is a striking proof of the existence of a public conscience in the Province of Quebec."

United States Horse Notes.

Mr James A. Case, of the firm of Case Brothers, Westfield, United States Paper Mills, had a very valuable mare, named by "Baickerbaker," (209). This mare was taken suddenly on the 21, with flatulent colic, of a very severe nature. Mr Crane at once sent for J. J. Brown, V. Letter from a Wolfville Boy.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., March 1st. DEAR EDITOR,—I have just got back from the next little restaurant a few blocks away from my lodging house, where I usually take my morning and evening meals, and having enjoyed a refreshing wash and comb, I feel so much in the humor for writing something that I have decided to dash off a few lines to you and your many readers; that is if they will prove fit to place before the letter, if you enjoy them yourself, if you can gather any enjoyment from them. From the heading of my letter you will notice that this is the first day of March. How it is down home in our little town of Wolfville I can only judge from the recollection of years gone by. When I cross this morning the wind was rattling my window (a thing the wind is very apt to do during the third month of the year) and on glancing out I saw it was trying to snow, whether it would make it out I could not then decide, but was not kept long in doubt—for on reaching the street I found the temperature was quite mild—and appeared more to me like one of our N. S. February thaws than anything I've seen in the weather line since my arrival. My work is in New York, yet like a great many New York workers I live in Brooklyn. Brooklyn has received the name of the sleeping place for New York, and I think from the appearance both morning and evening of the trains that continually cross the great suspension bridge, loaded with girls and boys and ladies and gentlemen—going and coming from work, besides a large number of both sexes who prefer to walk, and add to this thousands who travel by the numerous ferries which are continually plying between the two great cities, you will get some idea why Brooklyn is called the "bedroom of New York." These boats and trains travel both night and day, Sundays and holidays included, but their greatest rush is in the evening at about 7 o'clock and in the morning at about 6 o'clock of every sex and color are going to and returning from work.

But I have wandered from my starting point, which was more about the weather than the traveling public. Umbrellas seemed to be having as hard a time of it as anything that was out the morning; people who had them seemed to have no idea of meeting another person as unfortunate as themselves, until the broken ribs of the umbrella told the sad tale better than words or pen can do. I feel sure the repairer of umbrellas did a rushing business to-day. I was fortunate enough not to have one and could therefore see where I was going, and was able to dodge clear of danger when I saw it approaching.

I left the snowstorm and entered my restaurant, to enjoy a warm cup of coffee and a piece of steak. As I opened the door the first words that came into my ears were, "Well, I guess she is coming in like a lion all right enough." I knew they didn't mean me because I was of the masculine gender, and naturally enough I turned and looked toward the door to see if there were any female lions following my footsteps, when all of a sudden it struck me the speaker had referred to the month of the year. I said nothing, yet concluded if the good folks thought the morning storm resembled the fierceness of a lion, I would not fear to face any number of lions.

My breakfast finished I started for the bridge, when as I reached the street it was raining again. I was thinking of walking across but before I reached the great structure I changed my mind, and decided to ride. There is a double track car, and as I started before the rains were going both ways night and day, on Sundays and holidays also there is. There is also two drive ways for the carriages and teams; the driver on the Brooklyn side enters the one to his right, and vice versa in New York, by this arrangement the drivers are relieved from the trouble of turning out for teams going in the opposite direction. There is also a portion set apart for foot-passengers, so they have nothing to fear from runaway horses or the like.

When the train I was in got across, the storm had taken another freak, for instead of snow or rain, it was now sending forth hail and sleet. The streets were full of slush, and the old women and ladies who were busy selling the morning papers, looked cold and shivered up! yet I used to much colder March weather than this, rather enjoyed the crisp morning air. When I reached the store those who had arrived before me were also talking about her coming in like a lion, and were hoping from the bottom of their hearts that she'd go out like a lamb.

The horse-cars and elevated railroads did a rushing business all day, for all who had a five cent piece rode instead of walked, not so much on account of the temperature and storm, as the dreadful condition of the streets.

As yet I have never found a place where I would sooner live than our own little town of Wolfville, but the different cities I have been in (and I can now boast of having been in quite a number) New York surpasses them all in my estimation. There is a cheery good natured way about its people, which you will not notice in Boston and the cities around it. I also notice the girls here are fairer than those of Boston, and yet I can hardly account for it as Boston has a great many more Nova Scotian maids than New York, and certainly they cannot be classed among her homely girls, for you and your readers know, N. S. is a land of beauty as far as the fair sex is concerned. However, New York being the greatest city in the Union, it ought to have the largest amount of beauty. The day concluded the same through.

out, snowing a little—raining a little—hailing a little—sleetings a little—and blowing a little; and when night came it was about the same as it began, appearing more to me like an N. S. A young man from the country came to Boston a few months ago to take a situation in a store. Some convivial friends induced him to take a social glass with them. He drank, became tipsy and then started for his lodgings. On his way he bought a pint of brandy. He drank it and was taken with convulsions and died before daybreak.

The ruins of the unhappy youth were taken home to his heartbroken friends. And this is the infernal work of the rum, traffic. The trader's business is to sell death by measure!
