Parliamentary.

Monday, March 27.

The House, in Committee of the whole, resumed the consideration of a Bill relating to Physicians and Surgeons.

Hon. Mr. GORDON approved of the principle of the Bill, but thought it would operate unjustly in some respects, and that it would be contrary to the popular voice, for it would prevent some men from practising as physicians and surgeons, who were now doing so with success.

Hon. Mr. MITCHELL submitted the following amendment:—

"Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to affect any person or persons who have practised physic, surgery or midwifery on this Island for five years immediately previous to the passing hereof."

Hon. Mr. BEER was opposed to the amendment.

Hon. Mr. SECRETARY was not opposed to the principle of the amendment; but in the shape in which it was presented, it was too vague and indefinite.

Hon. Mr. HAYTHORNE was opposed to the amendment, because the fact that a man had practised for five years did not afford any security to the public that he was competent to do so. Those who had devoted much time to the study of medicine should be protected, and the public should be guarded against being imposed upon by ignorant quacks.

Hon. Mr. GORDON proposed the following amendment:—

"Every person residing on this Island, and who shall have practised physic, surgery and midwifery therein, for five years immediately preceding the passing of this Act, shall, on proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, be entitled to receive a license to practise under the hand and seal of the Lieutenant Governor."

Hon. Mr. SECRETARY was under the impression that the Bill would not practise midwifery under the operation of the Bill, without being liable to the penalties it imposed, but he understood that an hon. member who had charge of the business intended to submit an amendment.

Hon. Mr. BALDWIN said that though he was not the member alluded to, yet he was not favorable to the Bill as it stood, and would, therefore, submit the following amendment:—

"Provided, always, that nothing in this Act contained shall apply to any person or persons who shall hereafter practise physic or surgery gratuitously."

Hon. Mr. GORDON remarked that there was no petition before the House asking for such a law, and the more he heard the Bill discussed, the more he was convinced that it was not calculated to be a general benefit to the country.

Hon. Mr. SECRETARY said they were the representatives of the people, and were not to wait for petitions before they passed any measure for general welfare. The principle of the Bill had generally been admitted, and it would say very little for the ability of thirteen gentlemen who represented the wisdom and stability of the country, if they were going to break down upon a doctory's petition.

House resumed and progress reported.

A Bill to authorize the Judges of the Supreme Court to extend the term thereof, was read a second time, and Hon. Mr. SECRETARY, on moving the House into Committee, said the terms of the Supreme Court in Prince and King's Counties were limited to seven days, and when there was a large docket the business could not be completed. It was, therefore, considered desirable to give the Judges power to extend the terms, so that suitors might not be subjected to the expense and inconvenience of having their cases postponed. When the House would go into Committee, he would offer one or two amendments, which he considered necessary.

Hon. Mr. DIXWELL would not oppose the bill, but was sorry it did not make provisions for the more adequate payment of jurors.

most useful. We ourselves have persistently used them for some years and with considerable advantage. None of them, however, can be compared with the pad of which we now speak—that patented by Mr. McKinnon. The pad of hitherto used were nailed under the shoe liable to come off. Mr. J. The frog in a state of nature is soft and elastic, and extends beyond the wall or outer edge of the foot, and comes in contact with the ground first. When a horse is shod the wall is added to, but the frog is not, and the action of the frog is thus negated. Mr. McKinnon's artificial frog is in fact an addition to the natural frog as the shoe is an addition to the wall, as the impetus comes first on this elastic substance the pressure on the horse is much lessened. An immediate effect of this provision is that it gives to the horse in traveling lightness and ease, the sole of the foot being saved from the injury of broken bones on the road or slumps in frosty weather, and thus removes all necessity for iron nails, calks on the forehoofs, and prevents the injury to the hoof from constant shoeing. If for no other purpose alone, Mr. McKinnon's pad must prove a most valuable and necessary addition to the veterinary forge. In its use the owner of horses is saved from the accidents hitherto occurring in winter. The pad can be removed and inserted by the groom at pleasure, in fact can be used or dispensed as occasion may suggest. Dublin Freeman.
