The Marquis of Lansdowne, Governor-General of Canada, has received a Knight Grand Cross of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

Mill-owners of Oldham and Blackburn, in Lancashire, have decided to reduce the production of their factories by working shorter hours.

The Marquis of Hertford died on Friday from the effects of injuries received while hunting last week. The deceased nobleman was seventy-two years of age.

General Lord Wolseley, Adjutant-General of the Army, has been promoted to the rank of Major-General.

Lord Wolseley's promotion is a recognition of his services in the Sudan.

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UNITED STATES.

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FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

General Cleanings from Distant Lands.

Permission to erect a monument to Luther at Riga has been refused by the Russian authorities.

A son of a nobleman at Laurvig, Norway, destroyed sixty-two dwellings, causing a loss amounting to 250,000 kroner.

A Rome despatch says the servant of Monsignor Cesar, who was murdered in bed on the 15th inst., has confessed that he was the assassin, and that he had no accomplices.

The remains of the victims of the ill-fated Jenneht expedition reached Moscow Monday. Splendid wreaths were sent by the American residents to be placed on the caskets.

A batch of arrests has been made at St. Petersburg, consisting of a number of persons connected with the assassination of the desk of the murdered Col. Sandakoff marked "dangerous."

The Italian-Italian of the Austro-German Alliance is stated to be both offensive and defensive, both the contracting parties having the right to call on each other for military assistance in case of a war.

Charges by a Pastor Against the Elder of a Church.

WOODSTOCK, Jan. 25.—The Presbytery of Paris continued on Friday from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. on session, when the vote was taken.

The motion by Rev. F. R. Bettie, was as follows:—

"That the Presbytery having fully heard the case of the charges preferred by Rev. W. A. McKay against Mr. Alex. Watson, and satisfied that the details under the general charge of exhibiting a temperate and conduct inconsistent with his sacred office have not been established, yet at the same time approving of the motion by Rev. F. R. Bettie, and taking into account all the circumstances of the case, the conduct of Mr. Watson has been such that his longer continuance in the eldership in the congregation of Chalmers Church is not conducive to the best interests of the congregation, and the welfare of the church, that the Presbytery deem it necessary to remove Mr. Watson from the office of the eldership, and to resign his eldership and withdraw from the membership of Chalmers Church."

Eleven voted for the amendment of Dr. Cochrane and five for the motion of Mr. Leod. The amendment was declared carried.

The parties acquiesced in the decision, and Mr. Watson withdrew from the congregation accordingly.

THE FRANCOISE ACT.

The following is a condensation of the Francoise bill laid on the table of Parliament yesterday. It is substantially the same as that submitted to the Committee of the Whole last session and subsequently withdrawn.

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"Owner," when relating to a male person, of real property situated in the Province of Quebec, shall mean a proprietor in his own right, or that of his wife, or real property in fee and common socage.

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Courts in the provinces of Canada, and the judges of all the courts in the said provinces, whether such courts are now in existence or are hereafter created, and police, stipendiary magistrates, and police, Revising officers, returning officers, and election clerks who are disqualified only as far as their holding of such offices or positions is concerned, and any person who at any time, either during or before the election, is or has been employed at the same election or in reference thereto for the purpose of forwarding the same by any candidate or by any person whomsoever in any capacity whatsoever, and who has received or expects to receive either before, during, or after the said election from any candidate or from any person whomsoever in any such capacity as aforesaid, except upon the returning officer's certificate of equality of votes between the candidates where the addition of a vote would entitle any such candidate to be declared elected, shall be deemed to be disqualified as to the election in which he is so employed, and all married women whose husbands are living will also be disqualified and incompetent to vote.
