## NORTHUMBERLAND ELECTORS RALLY TO SUPPORT OF MARITIME RIGHTS

Mayor Hickey, the Conservative Candidate, Given Enthusiastic Receptions at Red Bank, Whitneyville and Tabusintac.

A particularly large gathering of the Tabusintac electors on Saturday night heard Hon. J.B.M. Baxter, K.C., M.P. and A.J. Doucet, M.P. for Kent, advance reasons why they should vote for C.P. Hickey, the Conservative candidate, on Oct. 7th. Mr. Hickey, they said stood for Maritime rights, a freer and better Canada. The candidate spoke and made an excellent speech. The speakers were enthusiastically applauded and the interest of the electors present was evident. The Conservatives held a meeting at Black River Monday night. The speakers were Dr. O.B. Price of Moncton, Ald. Watling and the candidate.

The Liberals held a meeting at Belle St. Anne on Friday night. The speakers were C.J. Morrissy, M.L.A.; C.C. Loggie; J.G. Koblischaud, M.P. for Gloucester and the candidate, W.B. Snowball. Mayor Hickey, Conservative Candidate, addressed two large meet-

ings Friday night, one at Redbank and the second at Whitneyville. At Redbank, in addition to Mr. Hickey were Hon. Dr. J.B.M. Baxter, K.C., M.P. and Ex-Mayor Fish of Newcastle. The hall was crowded with electors who listened to the address with the utmost enthusiasm. In the main Mr. Baxter dealt with Maritime rights. He also took up the question of Railways and freights. At Whitneyville in addition to the candidate the speakers were the Provincial Organizer, Major Brooks, and Ald. Watling of Chatham. The hall was well filled and the interest of those present was evidenced by their frequent applause.

W.B. Snowball, the Liberal choice, spoke at Bay du Vin Friday night. Hon. A.B. Copp, who is taking an active part in the campaign, also spoke. W.F. Cassidy completed the quota of Liberal speakers.

## BECOMES HEAD OF SUPREME COURT OF THE DOMINION

Ottawa, Sept. 17.—The appointment of Hon. Francis Alexander Anglin a puisne judge of the Supreme Court of Canada to the position of chief justice of the Supreme Court of Canada was announced tonight. Chief Justice Anglin succeeds the late Rt. Hon. Sir Louis Davies in this position. Simultaneously with the announcement of this appointment it was announced that Edwin L. Newcombe Deputy Minister of Justice and Judge Malouin had retired. The latter was appointed about a year ago.

Chief Justice Anglin was born in St. John in April 1865, a son of Hon. T.W. Anglin, a former speaker of the House of Commons. He was called to the bar in 1888, created King's Counsel in 1902 and appointed puisne judge of the High Court of Ontario in March 1904. His appointment to the Supreme Court of Canada dates from Feb. 20, 1909. Judge E.L. Newcombe has occupied the position of Deputy Minister of Justice since 1859 and was called to the bar of Nova Scotia in 1883. He has represented the Dominion on a number of important cases before the Imperial Privy Council;

he was appointed representative of the Government of Canada to confer with the British Government on the subject of Canadian copyright in the year 1895 and was one of the commissioners and chairmen of the special committee for the consolidation and revision of the statutes of Canada in 1902 and 1906.

## HUNTING MOOSE SEASON STARTS OCT. 1

Many Enquiries from United States Seeking Big Game.

The season for hunting moose will open on Oct. 1, and judging from the number of enquiries received, many from the United States are considering spending a vacation in the New Brunswick forests, seeking big game. Some have already arrived and are putting in the interim seeking deer and ducks. So far as can be learned very few deer have been brought out since the opening of the season on Sept. 15. They are said to be numerous, but scarcity of the undergrowth is handicapping the hunters.

## THE PRIME MINISTER TO SPEAK

Are you going to the Liberal meeting tonight in the Opera House to hear Rt. Hon. MacKenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada? Certainly you are! The Prime Minister is a fluent speaker and people like to hear a good orator no matter whether he talks on socialism, religion or politics. Mr. King is deserving of your presence, because of the high position he holds and should receive an attentive hearing from the electors of Northumberland on whom the whole Dominion of Canada has its eyes at the present time.

The Prime Minister, no doubt will tell Northumberland County electors all about the many advantages it may expect, if it elects Mr. W.B. Snowball on October 7th. He will also probably tell us all about the many concessions we received and the great things his government has done for us since it came into power. We have no objection to his doing so, as we are satisfied that the electors of Northumberland are intelligent people and are quite capable of deciding the issues within their own minds, irrespective of what Mr. King may say he did, had not done, or intends doing.

This is the second time Mr. King has spoken publicly on the Miramichi, but his first appearance in Newcastle. The last time he was here in 1921, he spoke in Chatham and the people of this county have not forgotten the promises he made on that occasion and which are yet to be fulfilled. Northumberland is not to be fooled again,—once is enough, and polling day will tell the tale.

Mr. King cannot afford to lose Northumberland in this by-election and if it is at all possible for him to be left unturned. But the indications are, that he is playing a losing game. Nevertheless, it will be well for the electors to attend his meeting, hear what he has to say, and then go to the ballot boxes on polling day, exercise their franchise, and we have no fear of the result.

## NEW HANDBOOK ON THE MARITIMES

Much Information Contained in Publications of Natural Resources Intelligence Service.

When the Scottish editors visited the Maritime Provinces recently they remarked on the lack of knowledge in Scotland of this portion of Canada. This same condition exists elsewhere, unfortunately. To overcome as far as possible this discrepancy, the Natural Resources Intelligence Service of the Department of the Interior at Ottawa has issued two handbooks, one on New Brunswick and the other on Nova Scotia. These reports contain a large amount of information that should be known about these provinces by their own people. It is suggested that those interested should send to the Director of the Natural Resources Intelligence Service for copies, and that they advise those whom they would like to know more about their home provinces to do the same.

### WALTER JONAH KILLED IN MILL

Sliver From Edger Penetrated One of His Eyes.

Doaktown, N. B., Sept. 16—Walter Jonah of this place, edgerman in the sawmill of the Doaktown Lumber Company here met a sudden death this morning while working at his machine. The accident occurred at about 8.30. A sliver flew back from the edger penetrating one of the eyes of the unfortunate man and entering the head to the depth of about five inches. He was rendered unconscious and death took place in about twenty minutes.

The victim of the accident was aged twenty three years. He is survived by a widow and one child. He was married about two years ago and was a most popular young man with many friends here. He had been in the employ of the Doaktown Lumber Co., for the past three yrs. He originally belonged in Kent Co.

### Another Loan Coming Soon

Rumors are current of the early announcement of a Dominion domestic loan especially to meet maturing Victory loans bonds and to take up treasury bills. The rumor gives \$100,000,000 as the figure of the domestic loan with an interest rate of probably 4 1/2 per cent. A total of \$290,000,000 is required to be raised to meet the Victory bonds and treasury bills. The balance over the domestic loan would probably be floated in New York. There is at present no official confirmation of the rumor.

### WILLS' FIGHT WITH DEMPSEY DOUBTFUL

The effort to produce a heavyweight rival who would justify a boxing promoter undertaking to pay Champion Jack Dempsey his price to defend the title, and at the same time promise a battle for the champion which would attract enough patrons to make the venture a financial success, suffered rather than improved as a result of the Harry Wills-Luis Firpo battle Thursday night. This was the opinion expressed by Promoter Tex Rickard, relieved for the first time in weeks of cause for any serious worry in connection with the fracas. Rickard expressed disappointment with the bout and with the lack of ability of the two heavyweights, who are clamoring for Dempsey's scalp, and complained also of the failure of the said match to draw up to his expectations. With respect to the future and Dempsey's heavyweight title, Rickard was undecided. He said time would determine his future course in this respect.

"I will say right now, however, that I am not committed to the selection of Wills as the next opponent of Dempsey," said Rickard. "It may be Wills and it may be Firpo, or, then again, it may be some young fellow out in the stocks right now, struggling to the front, who will arrive in time to face Dempsey when the champion decides to defend his title next year. Maybe Wills or Firpo will show something between now and next summer which would justify assuming the responsibility for such an important match as a championship battle for either, but only the future will decide that. On the strength of last night's battle I am not prepared to say whether Wills will or will not be selected to face Dempsey if I succeed in arranging a match for the champion. I will wait to make my selection according to public sentiment at the time the match is held."

### Figures That Tell Their Own Story

At the recent Unemployment Conference Honorable J. A. Robt. said that Canada was doing well. A little later he got a jolt when Tom Moore, President of the Trades and Labour Congress, said that the unemployment situation was serious enough to warrant a special session of Parliament. Canada should do well, for she has the natural resources, which, if fully developed at home, would banish unemployment. But what do the telltale figures show?  
Take savings deposits in chartered banks, when the King Government came into office at the end of 1921, the savings in Canadian chartered banks were \$1,230,897,000. At the end of June, 1924, two and one half years later, they were only \$1,189,018,000; or a decrease of \$51,789,000. This decrease took place in spite of the fact that the Government during the interval paid out fully \$250,000,000 to the people as well, where has the money gone? One of the best evidences of prosperity is growing savings deposits.

### SYMBOLISM OF THE KEY

When you next unlock the door of your home or office, reflect a moment upon the ancient and historic symbolism of the key. If you ever have the opportunity to examine the images of the Egyptian deities you will notice in the hands of some of them a cross with a circular handle. It represents the Ankh, or key of life, one of the oldest of all religious symbols, denoting the power to open and close the doors of heaven. The key had a magical meaning for the Greeks and Romans. Their gods were often given the title of Key-bearer, as, for example Janus, the god of gates, who was supposed to unlock the doors of war and peace. In early Christian history the symbol of the key was associated with St. Peter, with his two keys of gold and iron. In the Middle Ages the key was used to assist in the identification of guilty persons. If, for instance, a theft had been committed, a key was laid on the open page of a Bible, when it was supposed to move to wards, the culprit. Wedding rings had their origin in the key presented to the Roman bride by her husband, as a sign of her authority in his household.

### MANY CANADIANS RETURN FROM U. S.

Canadians to the number of 23,789 have returned to Canada from the United States within the past five months. Of these over 20,000 were Canadian born and the great bulk bringing good hard cash in their pockets.

"I haven't a doubt," said J. Bruce Walker, commissioner of United States immigration, "that during the month of August last Canadians leaving the United States from Detroit west to British Columbia have brought in addition to their experience a million and a half dollars in hard cash."

The returns are being very carefully kept by the department and are compiled from actual certificates signed by the returning men themselves, and giving place of birth and destination. Judging by these returns, there is little danger of these immigrants swelling the ranks of the unemployed for, in addition to the fact that they each possess money ranging from \$500 to \$15,000 the great majority give as their destination places in northern Saskatchewan and Alberta, quite a number being destined for the Peace River.

"The number of Canadians who have returned during the past five months," said Mr. Walker, "is one hundred per cent. greater than it was last year. By months the returns have been as follows: April, 4,087; May, 4,936; June, 4,720; July, 5,127; August, 4,819. The greater majority appear to be intent on farming, and in my opinion next year's returns will exceed those of this year."

### LONDON'S BUILDINGS ROCKING

The continuous vibration occasioned by London's intricate underground railways is having the effect of weakening the foundations of buildings, according to an eminent professor of structural engineering in the University of London. He measures sound by reflecting light from the surface of a delicately suspended concave mirror on to a screen. When a sound wave strikes this mirror its vibration strength is shown by movements of the ray of light on the screen. "In the early morning," he said, "and late evenings I have noticed that the vibration decreases with the lessening of the traffic. This university building and every other one in London is gently rocking all day long."

### APPOINTMENT OF HON. H. A. MCKEOWN TO RY. COMMISSION

Chief Justice H. A. McKeown of the King's Bench division Supreme Court of New Brunswick has been appointed Chief of the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada. His appointment fills the vacancy created by the death of Hon. F.B. Carvell.

Chief Justice McKeown was the Royal Commissioner, appointed by the government to investigate claims for indemnity made by depositors of the Home Bank. He conducted hearings at Ottawa and Toronto covering a period of some weeks and eventually brought in a report in which he found that representations were made to the Department of Finance in 1916 and 1918 which would have justified an investigation by the Minister of Finance under the Bank Act. The new chief commissioner has been Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick since 1916. He was born in St. Stephen, N.B., in November 28, 1863. He was admitted to the bar of New Brunswick in 1884 and became a judge of the supreme court of his province in 1901. He was elected to the legislature of New Brunswick, 1890, representing St. John City and County and became a member of the govern-

### TO REFOREST AREAS IN NORTHERN N. B.

John C. Venness, of the Dominion Forestry Department, who has been located at Salmon river during most of the summer overseeing a forestry party, arrived in St. John last week with Mrs. Venness and his family, and went to York county, where Mrs. Venness will spend some time with her mother, Mrs. (Col.) Mersereau, at Deaktown.

Mr. Venness will take charge of a large party which for the next two months will do reforestation work on the Tabusintac and a brook in Restigouche county. Last year, Mr. Venness said, there was some experimental work done in this section upon the burned lands and the result was so satisfactory that this year they proposed to reforest about 1,000 acres, planting spruce and pine seedlings. The spruce trees will be planted in Restigouche and the pine trees at Tabusintac.

Mr. Venness said it would require about 30 men a couple of months to do the work which will be carried on by him under the Forestry Department of New Brunswick.

### LUMBER AND PROTECTION

The argument has been advanced in the Northumberland contest that if the Meighen policy of adequate protection for home industry is carried out the United States may retaliate by imposing duties on lumber, to the injury of that industry. We do not suppose that any lumberman will seriously assert any such thing. The United States has gone as far as it can, in imposing duties on Canadian products. It confines such duties to things that may be produced in that country to advantage and in sufficient quantity to meet the demand. What it cannot produce, it will take in free. Our pulpwood, pulp and paper are in this class. The pulp and paper industry of the United States has been at a standstill for years, because of the falling supply of native timber and the higher cost of getting it to the mills.

Mr. Hugh P. Baker, executive of secretary of the American Pulp and Paper Association in an address prepared for the annual conference of that body this week, made a plea for the protection of the forests and the application of a sensible forestry policy. He said upon this depends the permanence of the pulp and paper industry in the New England states. He pointed out that the original forests there had been greatly depleted and asserted that only 44 per cent. of the remaining forest area contained trees suitable for logs or pulpwood. "Population has increased in New England 32 per cent. in the last two decades," continued Mr. Baker; "while the lumber output has declined 38 per cent. Only as we maintain the productivity of the forests of New England and bring back forests on her idle lands can we hold the wood-using industries, so important to the welfare of this section."

There is depression in the lumber industry in New Brunswick at present, and the time has come for the adoption of a policy that will preserve our forests and provide more labor by encouraging the manufacture of the finished product. We send out of the country millions of cords of pulpwood to keep mills running in the United States. This pulpwood gives a return to our people of a paltry ten or twelve dollars a cord, while if it were converted into pulp and paper the return would be fifty or sixty dollars a cord, practically all the difference being for labor. If we had a dozen paper mills on the Miramichi such as Mr. McLean has established at Bathurst, there would be more employment and better wages in the lumber districts. In the furtherance

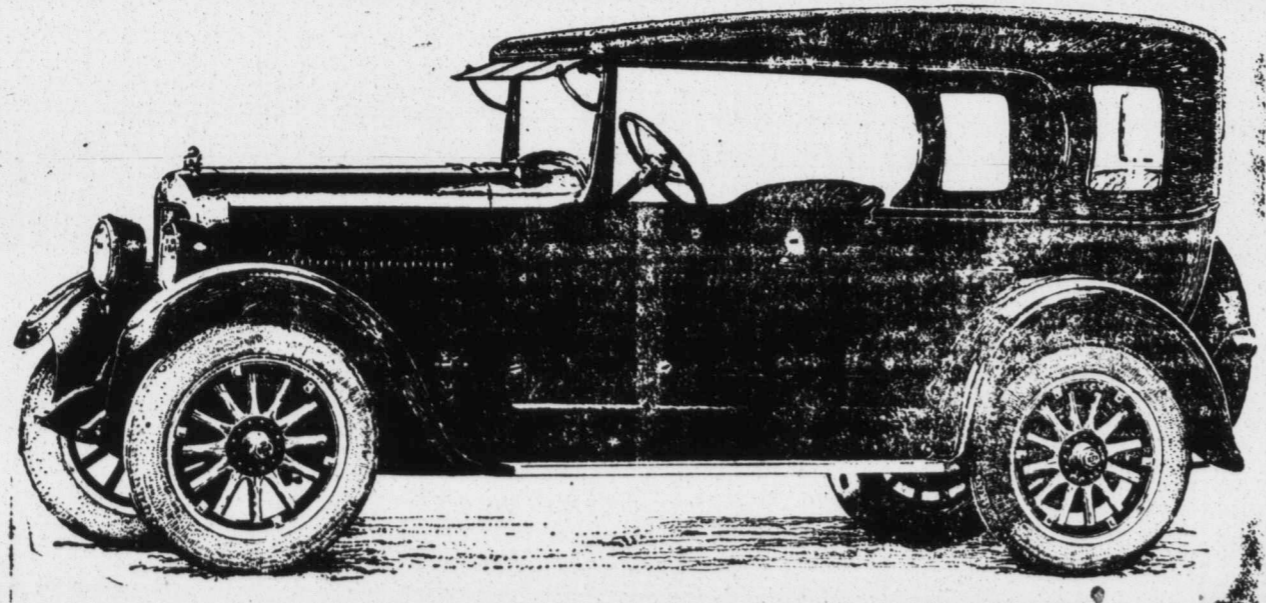

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Editorial

A BOOMERANG FOR

MR. SNOWBALL

We regret exceedingly that our editorial of last week has perturbed Mr. Snowball so keenly. We are given to understand that at Millerton last Wednesday evening he attempted to ridicule our remarks and said that the article in question had been written by a school boy. Well, in-so-far as age is concerned the writer may be classed as a school-boy to Mr. Snowball, but we are satisfied that it does not apply to us intellectually or from a political acumen viewpoint.

Our remarks of last week were true, notwithstanding Mr. Snowball's denial, and in many cases the truth hurts more than anything else. Apparently, in the case of Mr. Snowball, this axiom holds true and he has admitted that fact by his eagerness to attempt to refute it. In the 1921 election campaign, the late Hon. John Morrissey stated, in his Nomination Day speech, that Mr. McKenzie King, then leader of the federal opposition, said "Yes Jack, if the Liberals are elected to power and you are elected for Northumberland, the Newcastle-Tracadie Railway will be built," and the late Hon. John Morrissey said that he would even go further and say, that it would be extended to Red Bank. In our editorial of last week we stated that this promise was made by Mr. MacKenzie King and we repeat it again for Mr. Snowball's benefit.

There is just one of two things for Mr. Snowball to do,—either accept the late Hon. John Morrissey's statement or repudiate it. As for ourselves we are quite prepared to accept the veracity of the statement of the late Hon. John Morrissey.

Northumberland's late representative has gone to the "Great Beyond" and consequently is unable to protect himself against the refutations of those living, but his many friends in this county and province are prepared to defend and substantiate his statements, and they consider the act of one, who doubts or challenges his statements to be, to say the least, a most unmanly and unkind act and not one, which would gain sympathy, support or votes for the person who is responsible for that attack.

Mr. Snowball in his speech at Millerton laid great stress on the point that only a school-boy would write such an article. In answer to this, we need only say that we were perfectly aware, at the time the promise was made, that it was impossible for Mr. MacKenzie King or any one else, for that matter, to build a railway anywhere in this Dominion of Canada, without first receiving the approval of the House of Commons and the Senate. But this phase of the question was not the matter we had under consideration at the time the article was written. We stated that the promise was made and we have no doubt but what it was made for the purpose of catching votes for the Liberal party, and it probably did get that party a certain number of votes; but the fact that it was impossible for MacKenzie King to build the railway, does not alter for one moment the truth of the statement that the promise was made.

But now that Mr. Snowball happens to be the Liberal Candidate in the forthcoming by-election, he objects to the matter of the King Administration promises, being brought to light and in his usual plausible way attempts to ridicule the party responsible for bringing them into the limelight. Mr. Snowball dislikes the idea of the Liberal promises coming back at him in the way of a "boomerang" but we are not responsible for that. He will have to take this phase of the matter up with his chief, Mr. MacKenzie King, at present Prime Minister of Canada.

Mr. King will be on the Miramichi today and Mr. Snowball will thus be afforded an opportunity to discuss this matter with him, and it might be advisable for him also to inform his Chief—why it was that he did not support the Liberal Candidate, the late Hon. John Morrissey in the 1921 election, after he was defeated by Mr. Morrissey at the Liberal Convention. No doubt Mr. King would appreciate an explanation of his actions in 1921, as would also a great number of Northumberland County Liberals. Nomination Day would be a favorable opportunity for him to explain his 1921 attitude.

He apparently is very anxious to receive the support of Mr. Chas. J. Morrissey, M.L.A., and Mr. Morrissey's friends are just as anxious to hear from him as to why he should even expect to receive it; considering his attitude towards his father in 1921. To the ordinary person it would be most humiliating to have to explain a matter of this kind, but Mr. Snowball not being an ordinary person, the electors will await with interest his version of the reasons he has to offer for his political inconsistency.

It becomes public men to resort to guttersnipe methods in politics and in this particular case, it would have been more becoming and more sagacious on the part of Mr. Snowball to have allowed our editorial to pass without notice, but being amateurish in everything excepting age and egoism he was unable to do so, thereby clearly demonstrating that he is the school boy and not the editor of the Advocate and by such a display of in-judiciousness, in such a trifling matter, has proved his utter incapacity to represent the County of Northumberland at Ottawa.

W.B. SNOWBALL "A LOSER" From reports coming in from the various parishes of the County of Northumberland, it looks as if the Liberal party had picked a loser in Mr. W.B. Snowball. This is one time they have made a mistake and polling day will undoubtedly show that Northumberland wants no more of the King Government.

Residents of the several parishes in which meetings have already been held, report that the reception given Mr. Snowball, while stitutive lacks enthusiasm. Mr. G. Percy Burhill and Mr. Chas. J. Morrissey, M.L.A., are, at the last, only received, but when it came time for Mr. Snowball to speak the audience, became "shilly" and

before he is through they are "frozen to death." Reports say that he re-hashes the same old story over and over again, wherever he goes and it takes him anywhere from an hour and a half to two hours to make his little speech. As a result the people in the audience become painfully tired and in many of the Liberal meetings, it is a common sight to see many persons sleeping and in several instances some of them even resorted to snoring.

The meetings held by the Conservative Candidate, Mr. C. P. Hickey are in a marked contrast to those of Mr. Snowball. Mr. Hickey on his arrival in the halls, is met with an outburst of applause and from start to finish the meetings of the Conservatives go along with a swing. These meetings are not unduly long-drawn out like the Liberal meetings, but the speakers get right down to business, present their side of the case and the people then go home at a decent hour, with something to think about. Unlike Mr. Snowball's meetings; there are no interruptions, such as in Millerton, when Mr. Snowball was taken to task by a prominent citizen of that town and Mr. Snowball was forced to say that "I" (capital letter) "did not hear him say that, but if you say he did I will accept your word."

It is a foregone conclusion that Northumberland is lost to the Liberal Party, and neither Premier King nor Secretary of State Cope can save the situation. As for Mr. Cope, it would be better for the Liberal cause, if he refrained from taking any part in the Northumberland County by-election as many Liberals state that he is just the same to the Liberals of this county as is a "red flag waved before an angry bull."

of the present political situation. I have ultimately come to the conclusion that it is an impossibility for Mr. W.B. Snowball to defeat Mr. C. P. Hickey, unless he receives the support of Mr. Chas. J. Morrissey, M.L.A., and his many friends. I will even go further and say that in my own town of Chatham, Mr. Snowball will be defeated by Mr. Hickey, unless Mr. Morrissey's supporters throw their strength on his side.

In conversation with influential Liberal friends here, I have been impressed with the great influence, which Mr. Morrissey has, and it is an acknowledged fact that Morrissey is the man, who carries the great Liberal strength of this county today. Here and There

More than one hundred and fifty teachers from the Far North arrived in Edmonton, Alta., recently bringing with them fur robes to the value of approximately \$500,000.

Fanny Secord, the largest wood-on-saw in the world, was launched recently at the Wallace shipyards, Vancouver, B.C. She is 1,000 tons burden and has 900,000 feet of British Columbia lumber in her make-up. The saw is to be used as a sawyer for a great pile-driver for Sydney E. Jenkins Company.

Two dinosaurs have been located in the Red Deer Valley, Alta., near the Canadian Pacific Railway line this summer, by the University of Toronto expedition, composed of four scientists who prospected for several weeks in the gorge and are packing up the prehistoric monsters for shipment to the Royal Ontario Museum. Another skeleton has been located by the Geological Survey of Canada.

One of the outstanding features of Canadian trade with the Orient during the past year or so has been the remarkable increase in wheat flour exports. Imports of Canadian wheat flour into Hong Kong in 1923 were the largest on record, showing an increase of 100 per cent in volume over those of 1922. The figures and values were: 1922, 79,585 barrels, valued at \$126,050; 1923, 191,821 barrels, valued at \$249,044.

Zane Grey, the famous novelist, recently caught a 758 pound tuna fish, constituting what is believed to be a world's record. The sea monster was successfully conquered after three hours and ten minutes of grilling endeavor off the Nova Scotia coast, and towed into Liverpool harbor. Mr. Grey's prize is a species of the blue fin family. The record before this catch was held by J. K. L. Ross, the well-known Montreal sportsman and financier, who caught a 710 pound tuna.

One of the most remarkable achievements in art printing yet produced in Canada and one which finally disposes of the idea that such work cannot be satisfactorily handled by Canadian firms is found in the new booklet issued by the Canadian Pacific Railway dealing with the forthcoming 1925 Round the World cruise of the company's steamship "Empress of France." The booklet contains 40 pages of text and color illustrations, the latter exquisitely combining many brilliant hues in a number of highly imaginative designs.

Canadian Pacific gross earnings for July totalled \$14,883,677 as against \$15,677,235 for the same month last year, a decrease of \$794,158. But in order to meet this reduction, operating expenses were reduced by \$1,963,695, those for the month being \$12,544,135, as compared with \$13,607,802 for July, 1923. Thus the net earnings for the month were \$12,320,440, or 10 per cent more than the same month last year. The operating expenses for the month were \$1,223,917, or 10 per cent less than last year, operating expenses an increase of \$1,223,917.

### HEADING FOR THE FINANCIAL ROCKS

The serious decline in the national revenues which began with the announcement of the King Government's fiscal proposals last April was accentuated during August. That is to say the longer these are tried the more unfortunate the results. Returns issued by the Department of Customs and Excise show that during August customs collections were \$2,106,199 less than during the corresponding month last year, while the excise taxes brought in \$3,966,661 less, making the combined decrease \$6,072,860.

It is also announced that during the first five months of the current fiscal year the revenue from these two sources fell off to the extent of \$26,112,326 as compared with that for the corresponding period in 1923. In other words Honourable J. A. Robb has lost during five months more revenue than he told Parliament he expected to lose during the whole twelve. In customs revenue alone he has lost \$8,652,358; whereas he estimated that the loss would only be \$1,225,000.

The situation would not be so bad if expenditure were falling at the same ratio. But instead of doing so, it is mounting. During the first four months of the fiscal year the increase on both current and capital account was \$7,700,000. In other words, during the first five months of the fiscal year the Government has gone behind to the extent of approximately \$34,000,000. And the end is not yet. At the present rate of going there will be a deficit on this year's operations of \$60,000,000.

The notion that good times are just around the corner, and that the corner will be soon turned, is all nonsense. The truth is that conditions will get worse before they get better. On this there is very general agreement. White Honourable J. A. Murdock stoutly defends the Government's tariff policy; some time ago he came to the conclusion that there would be considerable unemployment this winter, and so he called a conference at Ottawa to discuss the situation. Well, he got the surprise of his life. Criticism of the Government's tariff and other policies became so strong that he concluded that he had better head it off by ruling it out of order, and he did so. After having realized his mistake, he allowed a full expression of opinion, and heard some more straight talk. The chief point hammered home was:—"How can you expect to have anything but unemployment as long as you permit the cheap goods of other countries to be dumped here thus depriving our own people of work."

Mr. Tom Moore, President of the Trades and Labour Council, whom indeed the Government had made a C.N.R. Director, protested that the unemployment situation in Canada now amounted to a crisis and demanded a special session of Parliament this fall to deal with it. Unemployment and consequent privation are worse far than when the 300,000 who have left Canada were still with us. Does anyone imagine this situation can be taken care of by forcing the erection of Public Works and thus adding further to our deficits. This plan would not give work to 25% of those who must have work.

The fact is that the King Government has simply gambled with the future of the country having launched on a policy the consequences of which it little realized. Worse still, it apparently did not care as long as it secured sufficient support from the Progressives to enable it to carry on. It is carrying the country to a crisis.

### GENERAL ELECTIONS IN GREAT BRITAIN

Quebec, Sept. 11.—That the Russian Trade Treaty may cause general elections in England as a result of the strenuous opposition it is bound to meet in the House of Commons, was the opinion expressed by G.G. Dawson editor of the London Times in an interview Dawson is on a vacation in Canada and may travel to the United States after a trip to the Western Provinces. Though a Conservative himself, Mr. Dawson said that he had always been in favor of giving labor a chance in power, and personally he could see no reason for repenting of this decision. The Labor government had made many mistakes as they were bound to do through lack of experience. The people were surprised over their last budget but considerable opposition is expected to be given the next budget, the government having had plenty of time during the year it has been in office to draw up by the Baldwin administration. There was great anxiety in England over the Russia Trade Treaty which had been rushed through without due consideration by the British government and this in turn was proving adverse to trade conditions and causing a consequent

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ent increase in unemployment with a very bad winter facing the country.

There still remained the question as to whether Ramsy MacDonald intends seeing the Treaty through thus bringing about a battle in the House of Commons which would oblige him to go to the country in a general election or whether it really was only a pacifier to the more extreme laborites. The Irish boundary question appeared very dangerous when Mr. Dawson left England and he learned just before sailing that the Imperial Government had decided to call a special session of parliament on the 30th of September, when it would introduce a bill which would authorize it to appoint a commissioner to act in the interests of Ulster on the Boundary commission. This was necessary in view of the fact that Ulster refused to appoint a commissioner. The British parliament will thus reassemble a month earlier than was scheduled, the end of October being the ordinary period for its gathering. One thing certain, Mr. Dawson stated is that no party in England wishes to go before the people in a general election over the Irish situation.

### THE HAUNTS OF BIG GAME

**Sportsmen Are Anticipating the Hunting Season in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia**

The big game hunting season is near at hand. On October 1st the season for moose will open in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and sportsmen are getting down their rifles, overhauling camp duffie and arranging their railway routine to the various localities.

According to advices received at Canadian Railway headquarters many non-resident sportsmen will hunt in the Eastern Provinces this season.

Many will go as usual to North ern Ontario after moose and deer. Others will go to Quebec Province where wide domains of forests interspersed with lakes and connecting rivers offer the huntsman countless features of a fall outing.

The forests of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia also invite the hunter for they vie with the larger provinces in the abundance of big game, and have a certain advantage of being more readily accessible, particularly to those not desirous of taking a prolonged outing and hitting the harder trails.

An early fall outing in the Canadian woods is something well worth while. The game is there. The moose comes to the "call" while the deer are quite abundant. The trails of the guides are often by some placid lake where the animals feed on the lily pads. Connecting rivers unite wonderful lake chains, affording the finest of canoeing. There is the trek by day and the callings or the still hunting—and the night under canvas; or better still, in the comfortable log camps of the guides. No matter how great the pressure of modern business there is still in the breast of man the love for the forest primeval and the passion for the chase.

### Dominion Sells \$90,000,000 AT 4 P. C. in New York

The Canadian Government, it is announced, has sold to the Chase Securities Corporation and Bayer & Company of New York City, \$90,000,000. One year 4 per cent. treasury gold notes, due Sept. 15, 1925; the proceeds of which are to be used in connection with the retirement of maturing treasury bills exceeding the amount of the new issue.

The treasury bills were, it is understood taken over at par. They form part of the \$2,000,000; approximately, of obligations coming due this year. These consist of Victory Bonds amounting to \$107,000,000 which fall due on Nov. 1 and \$91,000,000 of treasury bills.

The balance between the ninety million dollars sold today and the ninety one million dollars of treasury bills maturing will be met out of cash.

A domestic loan will, it is expected be floated to meet the maturing \$100,000,000 Victory Loan. Final decision in this regard have however not been reached. The maturing treasury bills bore an interest rate of 5 1/2 per cent. In this sale therefore the Dominion Government will gain in interest rate to the extent of one and one-quarter per cent. Maturing Victory Bonds bear an interest rate of 5 1/2 per cent.
