The Union is in a flourishing condition.

Halibuting by Motor.

The Angel Engineering Co. recently installed on the schr. Maple, owned by Penny & Sons, Ramea, a fine 25 horse power gasoline motor, imported from Halifax. The work could not be managed when the vessel was here, so that an engineer was sent up to Ramea to do it. The engine will impart a speed of seven knots to the vessel, reference to which the Telegram had when she was in port. She will go halibuting in the Gulf of St. Lawrence during the winter, and next summer will go on the Banks.

Valuable Mineral Guide

The little pamphlet lately issued by Mr. J. M. Moubrey is a valuable guide to all our fishermen who go to Labrador and have any leisure time to search for minerals. Mr. Moubrey makes reference to nearly all the minerals that are known to exist in Newfoundland and Labrador, and tells in what kind of formation they may be found. Many fishermen on the Labrador as well as in Newfoundland often in their searches on shore come across strange specimens, and as they have no idea what they might be they often throw them away, and it means the throwing away of a fortune at the same time. Anyone reading this little booklet carefully can hardly fall into this mistake. He also shows how to take a sample and how to find the contents and values of the same. The minerals referred to include Mica, Asbestos, Lead, Antimony, Iron, Copper, Gold, Silver and Oil Shale, etc. It is a well known fact that Labrador abounds in minerals. The discoveries have been comparatively few so far, chiefly for lack of knowledge on the part of the men who frequent the coast in greater numbers. Valuable deposits are no doubt passed over every day on the coast of Labrador. Let no man be without the little book issued by Mr. Moubrey, who has done a good deed in giving the public this information about minerals.

Captain Bernier Sends Home Report.

First Stage of Journey in Far North Has Been Successful.—To Try North-West Passage—"Arctic" Will Likely Winter on Herschell Island—Claiming Territory for Britain.

Ottawa, Nov. 24.—Mr. Alex. Johnston, Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, has received a letter from Captain J. E. Bernier, in command of the steamer "Arctic," now in the far north, telling of the first stage of the expedition, whose object is to assert British authority in northern waters. The letter, which was written at Albert, in northern Hudson Bay waters, on August 13, says that the "Arctic" had a fair passage as far as Greenland, where a good deal of ice and fog were encountered. Cape York was sighted on July 27, and Albert harbor reached on August 3. There the first cache was built in case anything might happen. The next objective point was to be salmon river, where it was proposed to build cache No. 2 close to Sir John Franklin's memorials. From here the "Arctic" was to proceed to Melville Island, where the condition of the cache left by Commander Kellett in 1854 would be ascertained, and from there to Winter Harbor, and a small cache would be left in case the ship should be nipped by ice in Melville Strait.

Ready to Try North-West Passage.

Captain Bernier says that the "Arctic" would make an effort to reach Herschell Island before the winter commenced. If it did not succeed they would winter in the best place they could find, and would come back to Pond's Inlet for their mails. The captain says that up to the time of writing everything seemed favorable to the "Arctic's" enterprise. Strong gales from the south indicated that the ice would be broken up.

"I am sorry to say," writes the captain, "that I cannot wait any longer or Scotch whalers. They have been here during the first part of July and raved with the Esquimaux, but so far they were not successful in catching any whales." The captain reports that the officers and men of the "Arctic" were all well at the time of writing. His letter was brought to civilization by Scotch whalers and reached Canada via Scotland.

Herschell Island, which Captain Bernier mentions as his objective point, is located at the mouth of the Mackenzie River, and to reach it the "Arctic" would have to make the North-west Passage. If he has succeeded in making the passage the next word from Bernier will probably come in the Mackenzie River water and overland route.



The Great Appeal

Yesterday we hazarded the guess that the Referendum was the Rock on which the Veto Conference Split. There is no authoritative statement available as to the cause of the failure, and indeed the conferees have declared officially that they will not disclose it. However, thought is free and probability must take the place of certainty. In the absence of direct evidence we are forced to rely on circumstantial evidence, and the latter is by no means weak. We can dismiss the competition in reform of the membership of the House of Lords. The only radical reforms are those emanating from Lord Rosebery and stamped with the approval of the Tory House of Lords itself. The Government has not yet placed before the country any scheme to compete with this.

As to the powers of the Peers' House, there are two schemes before the country; the Government Veto Bill already approved of by the House of Commons, read a first time in the House of Lords, and the second reading side tracked until Lord Lansdowne's Resolutions were passed by the House of Lords. The result of these tactics was that the Lansdowne's scheme is before the country with the approval of the House of Lords and the Tory party, whereas the latter took advantage of the inevitableness of an early dissolution to put their own scheme of modifying the powers of the Peers, and of evading a vote in the House of Lords on the Government Veto Bill, and in these tactics, the Tories were successful.

NO AMERICAN SENATE.

We have already pointed out that the Liberal party is lukewarm about reforming the personnel of the House of Peers; while the Tory party is hot-foot about it. The reason is obvious. The Tory party wishes to strengthen the personnel of the Second Chamber, whereas the Liberal party believe the personnel strong enough already. Many Liberals recognize the risk of strengthening it by making it a Chamber of Statesmen, composed of ex-Pro-consuls, ex-Colonial Governors, ex-Cabinet Ministers, ex-Judges, ex-persistent Chiefs of the Civil Service, and magistrates in the realms of land, finance, commerce and manufacture, with the hereditary weakness practically eliminated. Radicals fear such an Upper Chamber might gain the prominence of the Senate in the United States.

Many prominent peers regard the American Senate as an ideal Second Chamber. This is just what the Liberal party does not want, but it is the reason why most peers are willing to sacrifice their present privileges.

POWERS OF THE PEERS.

If the Lansdowne following had stopped at endorsing the Rosebery scheme, which embodies the features we have just outlined, they would have courted defeat at the hands of the Electors. That course would have

had the appearance of a bare-faced attempt to usurp the predominance of the House of Commons, and would have ended in certain defeat. The leaders were, however, too far seeing to dash their heads against an impregnable rock. They recognized that a reform of membership was insufficient to maintain their credit with the nation. They foresaw that they must curtail their efforts in certain directions to maintain it in others. The fight they put up last year to reject a Budget, they found hopeless. Their case, historically, was bad, and politically rotten. The power of the purse must remain with the House of Commons, and in the Lansdowne's resolutions passed last week without a division they placed on record their willingness to forego for ever the claim to amend or reject a financial measure. This was the crux of the fight last year. The passing of these resolutions put a seal on Asquith's doubtful victory at the polls in January. On this issue the Liberal victory is complete.

THE CRUX OF THE SITUATION.

The Peers have retreated from their financial entrenchment to take up a stronger position on the General Veto Question, and that is why they wish their forces to be strengthened by enlisting stronger men, and dismissing from their ranks in the Second Chamber the indifferent, the weak and the incapable members of the Peersage. At one time, the King exercised a general Veto. This was in the distant past. For two hundred years it has been in abeyance, and may now be regarded as an extinct function of the kingly power. The Lansdowne, the Roseberys, the Tories generally and many Liberals see a future for the Second Chamber in exercising such a function. With a Socialist party organized and in parliament, with a Radical party siding into the preserves of property, they fear the growth of what they call Single Chamber tyranny. They wish, therefore, to be in a position to check socialistic effort by vetoing it for the term of a Parliament, unless the Government see fit to set a mandate from the electorate by means of a Referendum. So far, the Government has declined to do so.

HOME RULE WILL DOMINATE ELECTION.

Although we believe the Veto Conference Split on the Referendum, we believe that Home Rule was the tide which drove it on this rock, and we will give our reasons.

It may be remembered that early this fall the English press, and particularly the Tory section of it, had much to say about the miracle of Self Government in South Africa, where brother Boer and brother Briton were patriotically welcoming the Duke of Connaught, cemented by the miraculous powers of Colonial Home Rule. They showed a disposition to cease their opposition to Home Rule and to advocate not only a settlement of the Veto Question but also the Home Rule Question. They stated the two questions were inextricably interwoven, that the Conference should dissolve, and that another Conference, enlarged in membership and in the scope of its subject, should meet later. The practical meaning of this was

the postponement of both questions until after the Coronation. While the postponement suited the Conservatives, it did not suit the Radicals, the Labour men, and more especially the Nationalists. The latter would not postpone the question, nor could they agree to their policy agree to Lansdowne's Referendum while Home Rule was in abeyance. They determined on forcing the Home Rule issue to the front. Redmond and O'Connor collected a big fund. The Tory press turned a somersault and began the old time denunciation of Home Rule, in spite of their recantation of a few weeks ago, and thus we have the Home Rule issue the issue of the campaign. To-morrow we purpose to discuss Lansdowne's Referendum more fully, so far as it relates to the Home Rule question; and especially why we believe if there is another deadlock, the Peers will give way on Home Rule just as they are giving away their claims to hereditary seats in the House of Lords and to amend or reject financial bills.

Hon. James Baird's 82nd Birthday.

Hon. James Baird to-day celebrates his 82nd birthday, and this venerable gentleman, despite, his advanced years, is still the possessor of good health and surprising energy. Mr. Baird's career since coming to this country is one of which he may justly feel proud. Arriving from his native Scotland, just 66 years ago, he entered the business of McBride & Kerr with his uncle, the late David Baird, afterwards going into the wine and grocery business on his own behalf. By his energy, tact, and ability, his business increased and as the years went by he supplied largely for the fishery, and with success that it developed into the present flourishing mercantile concern in which Mr. Baird is well seconded by his sons, Messrs. Hugh and David Baird. Mr. Baird has always taken the keenest interest in the progress and development of local industries, and is largely interested in the Boot and Shoe factory, Nail factory and Gas Coy., and kindred enterprises which in a great measure owe their success to his efforts. We extend to the venerable octogenarian our heartiest congratulations.

The Fogota Arrives.

The S. S. Fogota, Capt. Baxter Barbour, arrived here at 7.15 a.m. this morning from the northward after a rough and tedious trip. She left here Wednesday night last and from the start had thick fog, heavy rain, high sea and heavy N.E. and N. winds. Owing to the extreme darkness and pall of fog the ship could not run a night time and had to anchor. She did not get into Dog Bay on this account and did not arrive at Change Islands till late Friday evening, leaving again Saturday morning, similar weather was experienced coming south and when she left Change Islands a storm of high wind and sleet prevailed. She was compelled to remain at Carmanville all Sunday night and going north could not get out around Fogota to get to Joe Batt's Arm and Tilton. She could not enter Cat Hr. either and had miserable weather until port was reached. She had about half cargo of fish, oil, etc., and had 95 passengers during the round trip and brought here C. King, Jas. Waterford, F. Saunders, with 16 steerage. She sails north to-morrow.

Fishermen Return to Their Home

By the S. S. Rosalind a number of young men returned from the United States after making good money fishing up there. Since last winter some of them have been busy fishing off Cape Hatteras and Long Island. These men did well and will remain at their homes for the next couple of months, and will return to the States again in February to resume their work.

The Count's mother was Helene Isabelle Moulton, an American, born in Paris. He is now German Minister at Cairo, and was formerly first Secretary of the German Embassy at Washington and in charge of that Embassy during the last illness and for a time following the death of Ambassador Von Sternburg.

(Daily News Messages.) ULSTER MEN TALK REVOLT.

LONDON, Nov. 29.
A meeting of delegates representing every Ulster constituency was held in Belfast, at which resolutions were adopted and a declaration drawn up refusing to pay rates and taxes imposed by a Dublin Parliament or to obey its decrees. Fifty thousand dollars were subscribed on the spot to organise Ulster men into regiments for the purpose of warfare. At another demonstration held in Ulster Hall, Belfast, an overflow meeting numbering 20,000 being held in the open air, Lord Londonderry said that if a Home Rule Parliament were established it might be found that Ulster would utterly decline obedience to law. Sir Edward Carson, former Solicitor General, said they never would consent to their country being sold for American dollars.

SUFFRAGETTE DISTURBANCES.

LONDON, Nov. 29.
The Suffragettes created serious disturbances at a meeting at Lambeth at which Winston Churchill was speaking. After several men had thrown their hats, Mr. Churchill strongly denounced the suffragette tactics and said, "I am told that individuals are to be singled out for violence. If that is their plan, there is only one answer, and that is 'come on'."

BALFOUR UNOPPOSED.

LONDON, Nov. 29.
Among the first members of the new Parliament to be elected unopposed will be the Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, leader of the Opposition, the Liberals having decided not to contest his seat for the city of London.

STOCK EXCHANGE FORECAST.

LONDON, Nov. 29.
On the Stock Exchange the feeling seems to anticipate a reduction in the Liberal majority.

SUFFRAGETTE CANDIDATE.

LONDON, Nov. 29.
The first independent woman suffrage candidate is announced in the person of a prominent advocate, William Mirreless, who will contest a division of Glasgow.

SOCIALISTS OPPOSE BURNS.

LONDON, Nov. 29.
The Socialist party has decided to run a third candidate in Battersea, thus seriously endangering the chances of the re-election of John Burns.

BLACKHAND OUTRAGE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.
A bomb which was exploded in a saloon in the heart of the Italian quarter completely wrecked it and broke the windows in the blocks surrounding it. The owner had received several threatening letters.

STEAMSHIP DISASTER.

STETIN, Nov. 29.
The German steamer Berlin, from Sunderland for this port has not been reported for seventeen days. She is supposed to have foundered in the North Sea.

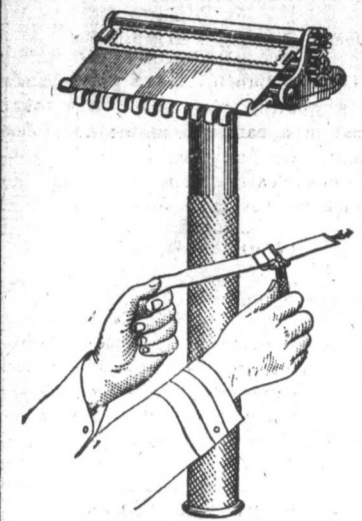
Both Anchors Out.

EVERYTHING QUIET.

Special Evening Telegram. LAREDO, Tex., Nov. 29. According to reports received on both the American and Mexican side of the border, everything is quiet to-day.

ELECTROCUTED IN BATH.

Special Evening Telegram. MILWAUKEE, Nov. 29. Edward Lührig, the 23 year old son of a wealthy coal dealer, was found dead in a bath tub in his home last night. He had been electrocuted by an electrically operated vibrator by which he was massaging his body.

FLOOD SUFFERERS.

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, Nov. 29. The Government has asked Parliament to appropriate \$3,000,000 francs for the sufferers by the recent floods. This includes five million francs for the wine growers, whose crops were ruined.

CAPTURED PORTS.

Special to Evening Telegram. SAN JUAN DELSUR, Nicaragua, Nov. 29. Advice to-day from Tegucigalpa state that the Atlantic ports of Honduras and the Department of Comayagua have been captured by revolutionists under the leadership of former President Manuel Bonilla. Government forces sent to retake the territory joined the enemy.

REVOLVERS SEIZED.

Special Evening Telegram. NEUVO, Laredo, Nov. 29. Postal and Customs officers yesterday seized 300 revolvers which came from the U. S. by registered mail. The weapons had been accumulating for several days. They were returned to this country with the statement that they constituted prohibited importations into the Republic of Mexico.

SAILED FOR ANTARCTIC.

Special to Evening Telegram. CHRIST CHURCH, New Zealand, Nov. 29. The ship Terra Nova, bearing the British South Polar Expedition under the command of Capt. Robert F. Scott, sailed from Port Chalmers for the Antarctic to-day. The Terra Nova sailed from London on June 1st and gradually worked her way south. Capt. Scott, who joined the vessel in New Zealand, hopes to reach the South Pole in December, 1911.

TOLSTOVS WORST ENEMY.

Special to Evening Telegram. ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 29. Count Leo Tolstol publishes a bitter denunciation of Count Tschertkoff, the intimate friend and literary agent of the late Count Tolstol. The son declares that Tschertkoff was the worst enemy that his father had in Russia and the civilized world, and that he was directly guilty of the tragedy at Yasnaya Poliana. The malign influence of Tschertkoff, writes Count Leo Tolstol, caused the premature death of his father, his superhuman suffering and the desperation of his family. But for this literary agent, the son adds, his father would have lived for many years peacefully at Yasnaya Poliana with the family who loved him and whom he loved so devotedly. The article of Tschertkoff was the beginning of the end.

BOMB OUTRAGE.

Special Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Nov. 29. A kidnapping case of five years ago is believed to have led indirectly to a bomb explosion in the early hours to-day which shook up one of the most thickly populated blocks in New York, did extensive damage and created a panic in the neighborhood. The bomb exploded in the doorway of the Bella Trinicis saloon, in the heart of the Sicilian settlement on Elizabeth Street. It completely wrecked the saloon, the front of which was blown violently inward, badly damaged adjacent stores, hurled sleepers in the tenements above from their beds, and cracked windows for blocks around. Francisco Leberbera is the owner of the saloon. He had left the place about half an hour before the explosion occurred. To-day he gave the police a theory as to what lay behind the outrage. About five years ago, he said, his son, Pietro, then six years old, was kidnapped, and he has never heard from him. The police were notified, and Pietro, later assassinated in Italy, worked on the case. The Italian saloon keeper received many threatening letters stating their revenge.

Will Defend Dunlop.

Mr. W. R. Howley has been engaged to defend operator Dunlop, now in jail at Harbor Grace, on remand, charged with shooting Dr. Pritchard. The preliminary hearing was held to-day before Magistrate Oke.

Constable McGrath who resigns from the police force to-morrow goes carpentering with Mr. W. J. Ellis; and Constable Pitcher, who also leaves will go to Boston to reside in future. Two recruits have been taken on to supply the places of these men, and two others will join the force next month.

Will Open New Hall.

Lieut.-Col. Rees, S. A., went to Curling by the express last evening where he will open a new Hall and organize a new Corps. He will also open a new barracks at Channel lately completed by the residents there, and one of the largest of its kind on the West Coast. He will return to town by Saturday's express.

Men Seeking Work.

Some sixty fishermen came up by the shore train last evening from Carbonear Harbor Grace and other places and joined the Bruce express at Brigus Junction. Most of them left for Sydney to seek work with the mining companies, while a few left for Grand Falls.

Roman Arenas.

They Were Not Mere Rings as Those of the Modern Circus.

The arenas of ancient Rome were not, as some people suppose, mere rings or ovals, such as may be seen in the modern circus. They were broken up and varied in character according to the nature of the fighting to be done or to the caprices of those in authority.

On one occasion an arena might resemble the Numidian desert, on another the garden of Hesperides, thick set with groves of trees and rising mounds, while again it pictured the great rocks and caves of Thrace.

With these surroundings the combatants advanced, retreated, encircled their adversaries or kept wild beasts at bay on occasion offered or as their courage or fear suggested. Men combated not only with the more common brutes, but with such monsters as elephants, rhinoceroses, hippopotamuses and crocodiles.

On other occasions flocks of game, such as deer and war ostriches, were abandoned to the multitude, and in some cases the arenas could be turned into lakes, filled with monsters of the deep, and upon the surface of which naval engagements took place.

A Man Who Inspired Marryat.

A London newspaper reminds us that another link with the past has been broken. The last sea-rover, sailing, of course, mild filibusters in far seas and junk pirates in China, has departed.

"Memories of the exciting days of the fearless sea rovers and buccaniers, known in more recent days as filibusters, are revived by the announcement of the death of Thomas Brown, a native of Cleve, Norfolk, in the neighborhood parish of Beckham, at the age of eighty-eight. Brown was the last survivor of the 'Royalist Expedition' to Sarawak, in the island of Borneo, which resulted in the owner of the yacht Royalist, Sir James Brooke, becoming first white Rajah of Sarawak in 1841. Previous to this Brown had sailed in a vessel bound for the China Sea under letters of marque, and after much fighting his captain was captured, and, by Imperial decree, sentenced to the awful death known as silencing to pieces. At the same time an Englishwoman named Noble fell into the hands of the Chinese, who put her in a cage, and sent her around in triumph through several Chinese provinces.

"When Brown finally returned to Yarmouth he had many interested auditors of his tales of piracy and bloodshed in the Archipelago, and Captain Marryat, the novelist, spent many hours with him while he recounted his blood-curdling experiences."

A Marriage for Money.

One of the mercenary marriages which turned out happily was that of the second Duke of Richmond. He was married to Lady Sarah Cadogan as part of an agreement that her father's gambling debts should be cancelled. Lord March (as he was then being) eighteen and the bride thirteen. 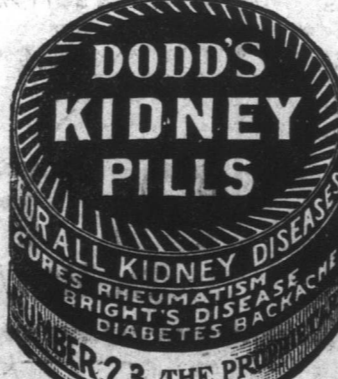

The case against one of them was dismissed, he having had no part in the attack, while the others were fined \$10 or 30 days each for their offenses against each, or an aggregate penalty of \$20 or 60 days for each one.

The matter of W. K. Morrissey vs. Capt. Geo. Winsor for having 22 beaver skins in his possession and illegally obtained, Mr. Blackwood was heard for the defence, and the court intimated that after consideration of the evidence judgment would be rendered a few days hence.

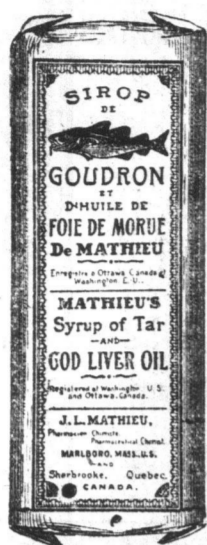

The Evening Chit-Chat

Several years ago, when I, a very young newspaper woman, was precariously subsisting on the pittance of a 11y small stipend that my first paper deigned to consider me worth, a young newspaper man on the same paper came to me, and with great embarrassment, blurted out that he was in a terrible mess financially.

Now, for several weeks I had been saving every penny that didn't have to go towards my actual living expenses for a suit—the first thing of the sort I was to buy with my own earnings. I had the suit all picked out. It was a dark blue serge and it was to cost fifteen dollars, and I had nine dollars saved towards it.

He didn't pay it back the next day. Nor for very many pay days thereafter. You can imagine my anguish of spirit when the purchase of that beloved and much-needed suit—I wish you could see the funny little coat I was wearing—was delayed. But being a little fool, even that anguish wasn't powerful enough to make me go to the man and ask for the money.

Finally, several months afterwards, he came and told me his father wanted him to leave the newspaper business. He said his family was wealthy, but he had been on the outs with them, and that they were going to get him a place in the diplomatic service. He paid me four of that five dollars.

I never saw the other dollar. I have never seen him twice since, but he never spoke of it. Perhaps you think this is a queer story to publish, but I'll explain to you how I came to tell it.

I had always thought, until recently, that my experience was a unique one, and that man was set apart by his absolute lack of sense of honor from the rest of the world of men.

But within the last year, there have come to my ears a half dozen stories of men who have borrowed from women and never paid back the loan.

One young lady was visiting at the home of friends of her family. The son of the house, who entertained her most royally, professed a temporary financial embarrassment, owing to a delayed check, and borrowed seventy-five cents of her "just for the day."

He never paid it back or even spoke of the loan.

Now I am not one of those people who thinks it the unpardonable sin for a man to borrow money from a woman.

But for the man who borrows money from a woman, and then betrays her unwillingness to refer to the subject, I don't pay back the loan—well, my dictionary hasn't words to fit him. And, as for the girl who loans money to a man, I'd like to say two things to her.

First, if it is a large sum, she should take a note. That isn't a sign of suspicion merely of common sense.

And, second, if he fails to pay it back within a reasonable time, I think she should ask him for it, and if that does no good, I think it is her absolute duty, for the safety of other women, to pillory him by telling what he has done.

the modest figure of £2,000; but the tour in India in 1905 cost a large sum, although the exact total has never been published, as a good deal of the expenditure came out of the Royal purse. Parliament voted £20,000, while the cost of altering the Renown was borne by the Naval Estimates, and most of the ceremonial charges by India. The total probably came to about a quarter of a million pounds.

This was not so much as that incurred by King Edward's visit to India as Prince of Wales in 1875. This tour was arranged by Sir Bartle Frere, who was kept busy for seven months making all the arrangements. Parliament voted £60,000 for the general expenses, which Sir Bartle said was quite inadequate, as the presents to native princes amounted to nearly that sum, and he asked for £100,000. This was not forthcoming, so he made the best of matters by going to Lord Northbrook, the Viceroy, who induced the Indian Treasury to grant another £10,000 to the presents fund.

Half a Million in Gifts. People in England thought that the £60,000, together with the £52,000 which came out of the Naval Estimates, was too much, and there was actually a meeting of protest in Hyde Park. Even Mr. Fawcett protested in the House of Commons, but public opinion became reconciled when it was seen that the Prince was not merely having a holiday at the country's expense. Presents to native princes ate up the nice little sum of £40,000, which was really very small when we consider it was generally estimated that he received gifts worth pretty well £500,000, one Maharajah offering him a jewelled sword worth £12,000, while English shopkeepers and manufacturers netted some £250,000 out of the presents sent from England. The total cost of the trip was considerably over £300,000.

£35,000 for an Honor's Visit. Everyone remembers the spectacular trip of the Kaiser to the Holy Land some ten or twelve years ago. As Messrs. Cook arranged that tour, the exact cost has not been made public, although it is reported to have amounted to no more than £5,000. But the Kaiser can be lavish when he likes, and his visit to Hohenzollern a year ago cost £35,000, although he was only there for one hour.

Royal visits to foreign countries are usually borne by the King's own Privy Purse, although if he is engaged in national business he may receive a grant in aid. For instance, when King Edward and Queen Alexandra went to Scandinavia, Parliament voted £3,068. Queen Victoria's last trip to the Continent cost £4,383, exclusive of £1,300 incurred by the Master of the Horse.

Six British battleships of the "Royal Sovereign" class, launched between 1891 and 1892 and having a displacement of 14,150 tons, have been stricken from the navy list and will be sold. These battleships were included in Naval Defence Act of 1889 and comprise at present the fourth division of the Home Fleet. The battleships condemned are the "Royal Sovereign," "Repulse," "Ramillies," "Resolution," "Royal Oak" and "Empress of India." The latter is the "hoodoo" ship that rammed and sank the "Victoria." It is to be noted that these ships are the last ones that mounted 13.5 in. guns before the adoption of the 12 in. weapon and they are being thrown on the scrap heap just as the 13.5 in. gun is reintroduced in the British navy.

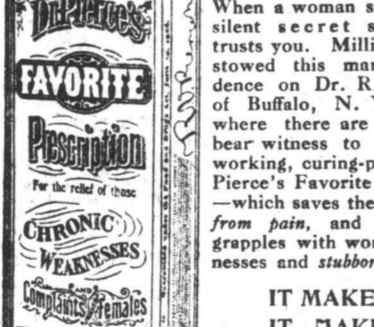

Household Notes. To use up coal dust pile it carefully on a piece of paper and lay it on the fire. In this way it can be burned without smothering the fire.

Ink stains on handkerchiefs, etc., may be soaked out in milk, but the sooner they are dealt with the more easily will they be removed.

The best way to peel onions is to hold them under water during the operation. Then cut up a raw potato to remove the odor from the hands.

A pinch of soda added to the boiling water in which cabbage or cauliflower is cooked improves the flavor and prevents much of the offensive odor.

A tasty way of using left-over boiled rice is to put a piece of butter in the frying pan and adding the rice when the butter sizzles. Fry until brown.

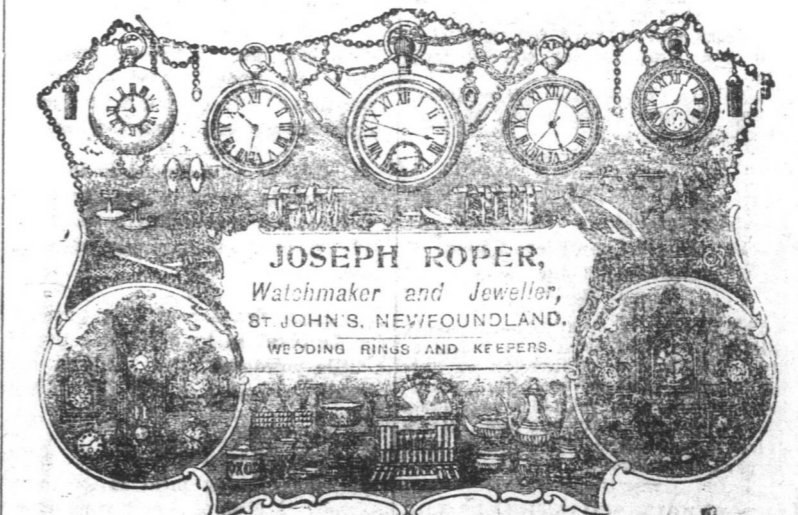
