

How Cheese is Made.

Cheese is the dried curd of milk. This curd, or casein, which is held in solution in the whey under natural conditions, or so long as the milk is fresh, has the curious property of coagulating under the influence of an acid. Lactic acid, formed in the ordinary process of souring. Curd is formed in the first stage of licoation by the action of the gastric acid of the stomach. Lemon-juice is often used to make curd for cheese-cakes.

In cheese-making, "rennet" or "Prunet," is used—a preparation from the stomach of the calf; or, in some countries, principally in Holland, a weak solution of hydrochloric acid is substituted for the rennet.

Although the broad principles of cheese making may be said to apply to all varieties of a particular class, the cheese of each country has certain distinguishing characteristics. That of Cheshire and Wales has a crumbly texture and a deep yellow colour, produced artificially by the addition of annatto. Cheddar cheese, although similar in shape and size, is less crumbly, and usually of a pale color.

The methods employed in making these well-known varieties of cheese are almost identical. They are usually made of whole milk, unless the milk is very rich in cream, in which case the night's milk is skimmed before adding that of the morning.

A properly-equipped dairy is provided with a jacketed milk-vat, so contrived that the milk may be surrounded with either hot or cold water. By this means the temperature of the milk is raised to a suitable heat, usually about 70 deg. Fahr., and the rennet is added. The temperature is then raised and maintained at a higher level, until the curd is firm enough to cut.

Many-bladed knives greatly facilitate this part of the work; but some little practice is necessary to enable the worker to wield one successfully. After cutting, the fine particles of curd are stirred continuously until the necessary degree of firmness is obtained, and these are then allowed to sink to the bottom of the vat, where they remain in warm whey until sufficient acidity is developed.

When the right point is reached, the whey is drawn off, the curd is broken up, covered with warm clots, and kept thus until ripe enough to be

salted and put into cheese-moulds. The cheese remains in the mould under pressure until sufficiently firm to support its own weight, when it is trimmed and ironed into a good shape and then transferred to the drying room. Here it remains for months being turned every day, so that an moisture contained in the cheese is evenly distributed.

The whole process is extremely simple; but success depends on the amount of acidity developed during the various stages of the work. The curd is allowed to become to acid, a hard cheese is the result; if not sufficiently developed, the cheese is too crumbly, and consequent wasteful.

Stockholm, the capital of Sweden, contains about 400,000 people, almost all of whom are related to some one in Illinois. It is situated in the southern part of the country on a mass meeting of islands and peninsulas and its suburbs are navigable in all directions.

The ocean traveler, who visits Stockholm, leaves the Baltic and travels through flocks, swarms and creys of islands, until he suddenly holds a handsome city approaching rapidly out of the water from around a corner of land. This is Stockholm. It puts its best foot forward towards the sea, like New York, Naples and Venice, but it backs up its advertisements with a handsome city behind. Stockholm is not cursed with billboards, vacant lots or shanties and isn't burned down for several centuries.

Stockholm was founded about 700 years ago on a small island, and as it grew it annexed islands, straits, peninsulas, archipelagos, lakes, rivers and other geographical features with great industry. The city has more ridges than Copenhagen, but has not one in for canals and gondolas like Venice. Stockholm has no need of canals. It has enough water already, the easiest thing in the city to find is water, and the hardest is a street that doesn't have to use a bridge, fast of the millionaires of Stockholm are ferry-men.

Stockholm has broad, fine streets, fifth handsome public buildings on them, and is as well behaved as a young ladies' seminary in America. Very few Swedes have time to break the law. They are too busy breaking records. Stockholm entertained the Olympiad in 1912, and ever since then has been training up in a body for the next meeting.

Ocean steamers come up to Stockholm's docks and her factories fill them full of iron, steel and safety matches. The city is a summer resort or half the year and there are nearly upwards of half a million buildings, each one reaching down to a heat of water more beautiful than Long Island Sound, and not so thickly infested with millionaires. There are many quaint and ancient houses in Stockholm, and many quaint and ancient customs in the city. Its government, for instance, is honest, and its restaurants serve food without tango music.



The Budget.

The Iniquitous Ten Per Cent. Put On Again—Last Year \$380,000 Was Taken Off. This Year \$650,000 Has Been Put On.

Yesterday afternoon, Minister Cashin delivered his Budget Speech and disclosed the new taxation which had been foreshadowed in the Governor's Speech. It will be remembered that last session the Government took off \$380,000 in taxation, and it was generally felt that the Government would not be able to make two ends meet in consequence of this reduction and abnormal expenditure continuing at the same time.

taxation, the Finance Minister intends to make a net increase of \$680,000 in taxation for next year. Instead of making a general reduction of taxation, the Government propose to put on \$250,000 more than they took off last year. The changes in duties are as follows: On imported cask ale, etc., the increase is 40c a gallon. On imported cask ale, etc., the increase is 40c. Beaver Board has \$5 per M. put on it.

The duty on brown goes up a cent a pound. On alcohol, ethyl, cordials, brandy, whisky, gin, there is an increase of duty of a dollar a gallon. On rum 80c. The ad val. duties on tobacco are dropped an 10c increase is made in the specific duty.

Manufactured tobacco .35c a lb. Cigars .30 a lb. Cigarettes .12 a lb. Crude petroleum for fisheries and trade boats is put on the free list. The following increases in excise on local manufactures are proposed: Local Ale .7c a gal. Tobacco 4c a lb. Butterine .1c a lb. Cigarettes \$1.72 a lb.

It is proposed to give a drawback on sulphur used in making sulphite pulp, etc., when exported. A ten per cent increase in the duty on all dutiable articles, except coal including a ten per cent increase on the increase mentioned is made. For instance there is a specific increase of 80c on rum. This will make the surtax will make a total increase of 88c a gallon. There is no increase in the ad val. duties on Ready-mades, etc., which remains at 45 p.c. But the surtax of ten per cent will make the duty on readymades 49 1/2 p.c. an extraordinary protection for a factory, already doing well.

As we have already mentioned, the feature of the Budget is the net increase of taxes by some \$650,000. Some \$380,000 were taken off last year and now every cent of taxation has been put on again with a quarter of million extra. We are now faced with a renewal of the iniquitous ten per cent, out of which the Government hope to extract \$220,000 a year by putting an extra ten per cent on everything available. The increase in taxation is \$650,000, crediting them with the \$400,000 taken off the net result of Morris financing is an increase of a quarter of a million in taxation over the taxation as it was before the 1911 reduction.

Cable News.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. In Parliament yesterday, replying to a question, Asquith stated he would be glad if financial business could be accelerated as to render possible an explanation and discussion of the government's proposals regarding the Home Rule Bill before the close of the financial year, March 31. He further promised to give all necessary facilities for expediting business, and said that if this was done an early statement on the Home Rule situation could be made with the House in Committee on Supply.

WASHINGTON, To-Day. The Mexican situation was broadened yesterday when Coahuila Garret at Nuevo Laredo was instructed to enquire into the hanging by Mexican "federal" of Clemente Vergara, American citizen. The Consul at present with the State Department is demanding the body of the dead American from officers of the Huerta Government in the vicinity of Hidalgo, Mexico, where Vergara was killed. Yesterday the American Consul at Chihuahua "as instructed to insist that Villa permit the delivery of the body of Benton to his widow for burial where she may wish. Villa up to late today had not replied to the last request of Benton for the surrender of Benton's body, but it is understood that British Ambassador Rice for the present will be satisfied if there is an opportunity or an autopsy which would determine whether Benton was shot by a pistol bullet or by rifle bullets from a firing squad.

Assaulted by Two Scamps. About 9.15 last night as David Donnelly, of McFarlane Street, was returning to his home he was attacked by two scamps in Queen Street. One of them dealing him a blow in the side of the head which felled him to the ground, while the other filled his pockets, taking therefrom his money, keys and many other things on his person at the time. Young Donnelly is but 15 years of age, and is subject to attacks of epilepsy. His aggressors were much older and bigger than he and the blow dealt him the effect of bringing on one of these attacks, and while their victim was writhing on the ground, the cowards got in their work of plunder, and left him helpless in the street. The lad Donnelly can remember little of the occurrence, as the blow rendered him unconscious, except that when he was coming to he made an effort to scream for help only to find that he had been gagged. He was picked up later by his brother and another young lad named Doyle who took him to his home where he spent a restless night. The same young lad was stabbed on Tuesday for Baile's and which was reported off Cape Spear in the ice yesterday morning.

ETHIE REPLACES CLIDE.—Capt. O'Reilly, officers and crew of the s.s. Clide arrived by last night's train from Placentia to take charge of the s.s. Ethie, which is being sent to take up the service in Placentia Bay. Inter-Colonial Hockey.

CITY Vs. HALIFAX.

Visitors Win by Narrow Margin--Home Team Accepts Plucky Defeat--Three Goals Each At Full Time--Halifax Scored the Winning Goal--Locals Handicapped by New Time Arrangement--3,000 People Present--Fast and Clean Game--splendid Ice and Unbounded Enthusiasm.

The initial game of the much-talked of and anxiously looked-forward to series of hockey games between the Halifax and City teams was pulled off at the Prince's Rink last night in the presence of upwards of three thousand spectators and terminated in the home team going down to defeat, after a strenuous battle. The match took place under the most propitious circumstances. The exhibition served out by the players was creditable, particularly as it was so clean and not at any time did it assume a tinge of what might be termed in hockey parlance as roughness. The rink was never as much crowded with people before on a similar occasion, as standing room was at a premium and throughout the match the wildest enthusiasm prevailed. Winter and Stick kept bombarding the goal. McDonald's skates got broke and he had to dock for repairs. On resuming the City continued their rushes and Winter and Stick combined. The latter gave a neat centre and Winter being on the spot banged the equalizer amidst vociferous applause.

Excitement and enthusiasm vied with each other facing off again. Both sides waxed warm but the first period of time closed without further scoring.

When the teams came together again Higgins replaced Pinsent, as cover, and proved a fine substitute. The City were playing well together and worrying their opponents until Winter by a clever bit of stick-handling scored the second goal to the delight of the City supporters.

The visitors displayed their best and endeavoured to attack the city goal but frequently were frustrated by Parsons and Herder who were in vulnerable. HEALTHY AND UNHEALTHY LIGHTING.

Gas. It may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:--

Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this amongst other reasons that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.

I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days, was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hour dinner, but which, with the march of civilization, had the illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian D. Lewis, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—Nov 11

LONDON, Feb. 25.
It is reported that the South African Labour leaders, who arrived at Gravesend on the *Umgeni*, were persuaded after much parleying to disembark.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 25.
Sir Lionel Carden, who has left for New York, says he expects to have an opportunity to tell President Wilson much regarding incidents similar to the Benton case.

SYDNEY, N.S., Feb. 25.
The jury to-day found Frank Haynes guilty of the murder of S. B. Atkinson. The court charged strongly against the prisoner. Sentence will be delivered to-morrow morning.

GLoucester, Feb. 25.
Better conditions for American fishermen in Canadian and Newfoundland waters, will be sought by a delegation of Gloucester fishing captains and business men, headed by A. Riatt, former assistant Secretary of the Treasury, at a conference with Secretary Bryan to-morrow. The fishermen claim that the regulations governing licenses and bait are burdensome, and suggest the detaching of a revenue cutter to the fishery grounds to act as a hospital ship.

LONDON, Feb. 25.
Five suffragettes were charged with obstructing the police during last night's demonstration in Parliament Square—Laurence Housman, author and artist, Henry Nevinson, war correspondent; Mrs. Thomas, wife of a Welsh coal magnate, H. D. Harben and Miss K. Halz. The magistrates ordered them all bound over in a bond of \$25 each to be of good behaviour for six months' imprisonment. They all refused to enter into the bond. Housman made the usual speech.


WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.
Last night it was officially announced that the American Consul at Chihuahua reported that Villa refused to deliver Benton's body, but will permit the widow or relatives to view the remains. 





Shipwrecked Crew Arrives by Stephano.

The s.s. Stephano, which arrived in port last evening from New York brought Capt. John White, mate Banfield, cook A. Reid, and seaman John Colino, Joseph Mitchell and D. Reid of the ill-fated Tobaccat. Rescued by the oil tanker Leda, as previously stated in the Telegram. The story of the voyage and loss of the vessel, as elicited from members of the crew is as follows: The Tobaccat left here for Burin on Oct. 11th, and after a two days' run arrived there and discharged a cargo of salt, sailing from there again for the Mediterranean with codfish from Hollar and others. The vessel reached Gibraltar in 18 days, and there received orders to proceed to Alicante, which port she reached 7 days later. The work of discharging at Alicante occupied a week, after which she sailed for Santa Pola, to load salt. Sailing from there on Christmas morning the vessel reached Gibraltar in two and a half days, and after a delay of a few hours set sail for home. After leaving Gibraltar stormy weather was experienced which continued until Jan. 17th, when the northern edge of the Gulf Stream was reached. On Jan. 17th, the vessel had all her canvas carried away, as well as her boom and gaffs. A new mainsail was bent but was quickly torn in shreds and the Tobaccat was forced to drive before the storm. During the storm a large square rigged vessel passed the Tobaccat, but paid no heed to their signals of distress, and on the next day a steamer, that was bound eastward, stood by her for an hour, and the vessel was driven about at the mercy of the storm, and on the 22nd of January, when 190 miles off the Western Islands, she was sighted by the oil tanker Leda, which bore down upon her. A lifeboat, commanded by the first officer of the Leda, was launched, and despite the terrific sea that raged, the crew of the Tobaccat were picked off and taken on board the Leda where they received ever kindness from the officers and crew. They spent fifteen days on the Leda which took them to New Orleans where they were looked after by the British Consul, and later sent to New York, where they joined the Stephano for here. The seamen of the Tobaccat speak in praiseworthy terms of the kindness received from their rescuers, and all those whom they met before reaching home. Though they lost all their clothing, the men at all well, and are none the worse for their trying experience.

At the House

Petitions were presented by Mr. Moulton from Petites asking for telegraph extension; by Mr. Targett from Hampneys for various public matters and by Mr. Coaker from Plate Cove for a road.

The House then went into Committee on Ways and Means and the Finance Minister presented his annual Budget.

ELECTIVE COUNCILS.

Mr. Kent then moved certain resolutions in relation to the administration of local affairs in the Colony. Continuing, Mr. Kent pointed out that the Resolutions he submitted ought to accentuate the need of some reform in the spending of public moneys throughout the Colony. He did not propose any legislation on them at present but simply asked that the attention of the House be directed to the matter and that some steps be taken at the next session of the House to deal with the question. Several attempts had been made from time to time but for some reason or other none of them had been carried into operation. It will be noticed that the first resolution provides that the Colony should be divided into a fixed number of administrative districts whereby the local affairs of such would be controlled and spent by Elective Road Boards. He had referred to this matter before in the House not only for the administration of local affairs of the districts but also for judicial purposes. The present system regarding Road Boards is deplorable and, he thought, should not be allowed to continue. Road Boards are appointed under the Road Commissioners Act which empowers the Governor in Council to appoint six Commissioners. Advantage had been taken of the Act in some places and worked out with success, but in other places were unsatisfactory because members of Road Boards were appointed through political influence with the Government in power. That system has prevailed for many years back and caused a great deal of discussion. The time has arrived to face the question and we need a more practical method than this in regard to the handling of the local affairs of the different districts in the country. The adoption of the elective system would give members of the Boards a personal interest in the management of local affairs, create a rivalry in getting better results and members would take a pride in seeing that all moneys would be judiciously spent. He questioned, he said, was not free of difficulties and that was one of the reasons why he wished to place the matter before the Legislature at this session in the hope that some legislation will be brought about next session to provide for the proper organization of the country's affairs along the lines suggested and in the meantime proper machinery could be devised to overcome the difficulties. He pointed out that in 1897 the question of Government of local affairs and the division of the country into districts for the election of local councils was dealt with, an Act passed but never availed of. The following year a new Government came into power. The Act was amended but still was not carried into operation. He again emphasized that the Resolutions he moved were not meant in any spirit of contention but simply for the purpose of accentuating the prevailing chaotic conditions and hoped that some remedy will be made.

The Prime Minister.—He said he was in entire sympathy with the resolutions and that the thanks of the whole House was due to the hon. leader of the Opposition for the very reasonable and convincing form in which he had brought to our notice the resolutions which were mainly for the purpose of accentuating the need of reform in this particular branch of the civil service. He said the Government would give the matter great consideration and endeavour to provide legislation for carrying out what was embodied in the resolutions. The great difficulty was in allocating grants on a per capita basis and abuses existed such as political proclivities, but assured the House that everything possible would be done by the Government to bring about measures for the proper administration of public moneys throughout the Colony.

Mr. Coaker spoke exposing a number of abuses in connection with the expenditure of grants by Commissioners.

The Speaker then left the chair until 8 o'clock when the discussion on Elective Road Boards was resumed by Mr. Coaker. The following also took part.—Messrs. Emerson, Mr. Jen-

nigs, Mr. Hallyard, Mr. Grimes, Mr. LeFevre, Mr. Targett, Mr. Devereaux, Mr. Woodford, Hon. J. R. Bennett, Mr. Moulton, Mr. Downey, Mr. Winsor, Mr. Hickman, Mr. Lloyd, Mr. Currie and Mr. Stone.

The resolutions were approved of in the whole and passed.

The loan and pension bills were read a second time and goes into Committee to-day.

The report of the Superintendent of the General Hospital was tabled by the Colonial Secretary.

Notice of resolutions dealing with the train-ferry service was given by the Prime Minister after which the House adjourned till the usual hour this afternoon.


