





FRENCH BECOMES BUOANT.

LONDON; To-day. Despite the fact that thousands of Frenchmen are laying down their lives and thousands of wounded are arriving daily from the front the Parisians, says the Paris correspond-ant of the Daily Telegraph, are re-gaining some of their customary buoyancy of spirit.
