Seventh Centenary of Magna Charta.

toric memories. Yesterday was the anniversary of the battle of Naseby, in which the forces of the English Commons inflicted a desisive defeat on the Royalists in the fight for Parliamentary power in 1645. It also marks the triumph of the French over the Austrians at Marengo in 1860.

To-day is the greatest anniversary of all in the history of the fight for English liberty. It is no mere anniversary or even a mere centenary, but the Seventh Centenary of the signing of Magna Charta, which the Barons in arms forced upon King John on the field of Runnymede on June 15th, 1215. Hallam calls it "the keystone of English liberty." It was the greatest of the earlier blows struck for freedom by the Barons, the Church and the people against arbitrary powers which had grown up under the feudal system around the King and his Court followers. Anson says "The importance of the Charter in the history of the royal prerogatives consists in the definiteness and permanence which it gave to the promises of the Coronation Oath. From the moment that John assented to the terms sub-mitted to him by the Barons, the rights of the subject ceased to depend on the power or goodwill of the King. Every freeman was henceforth entitled to freedom from arbitrary taxation and arbitrary punishment, and could refer for proof of his rights not to the vague promises of the Corona-tion Oath but to the formulated de-

This week also includes the centenary of the final overthrow of Napolthe fight at Quatre Bras which marked the failure of Marshal Ney to
drive in the wedge which Napoleon inhe would have succeeded in estabtended to keep apart the forces under Wellington and Blucher, and Friday the 18th is the centenary of Waterloo when militarism under Napoleon was finally overthrown. To-morrow is also the anniversary of Marengo, a place in Bavaria, where George II. gained a victory in 1743. Thursday is St. Alban's Day, the anniversary of the martyrdom of the first Christian martyr in Britain. It is also the anniversary of the battle of Bunker's Hill in 1775, the success of which paved the way to American Independence of Great Britain.

Friday besides being the centenary of Waterloo is the anniversary of the outbreak of the last war between Great Britain and the United States although another war fifty odd years later was nearly precipitated by the ravages of the Albama, built at Birkenhead during the civil war, the anniversary of the sinking of which is on Saturday. Our enemies of those days are our greatest friends of to-day and it is satisfactory to feel that British blood and treasure is to-day as freely spent for freedom and liberty as it was in the days of the greatest struggles whose memory is brought before us this week.





Ventilation accomplishes this by ejecting the spoiled air into the plentiful outdoors where it will be in a minute minority and by bringing into the indoors large quantities of fresh

Ventilation is a great fad nowadays and no modern structure is built without plenty of exits for frazzled atmosphere. WARSHIPS BOMBARD TCHESME.

LONDON, June 14. A report has reached Athens from the Island of Shios, to the effect that two French warships entered the port of Tchesme, Asia Minor, forty Clarke, Mrs. R., Lime St. miles southwest of Smyrna. Accord- Chafe, Mrs. N., Petty Harbor, ing to this report the warships bombarded the telegraph station at Tchesme and sank two sailing ships. The bombardment lasted forty minutes. THE LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, June 14. Germany to-day claimed another decided success along the eastern line Dyke, J. W. northwest of Mosciska, in the region Dickenson, J. H., Boncloddy St. Sieniawa. The German report said that along the line extending over forty-three miles, the entire positions of the Russians were taken, Drensfield, B. and that 16,000 prisoners fell into their hands. The Russian official report, however, only mentioned the locality where the action took place, in a paragraph which declared that the Austro-Germans, after heavy losses in the region of Mosciska on Friday and Saturday, did not resume the of-

According to Petrograd, the Austro-Germans have made another crossing of the Dneister, where a brilliant cavalry charge resulted in a local Russian success; but no claim is made that the invaders were pushed back across the river. Crossing the river at this place may not be a Gosney, Ernest, card' serious affair for the Russians, as it Gabriel, Miss Mary Ellen. is remote from Lemberg, and an ad-

vance from it might expose the Austro-German flank. In the Western front the French continue their battering tactics against the formidable German positions, with some assistance from the Belgians, who have thrown a battalion across the Yser east bank, where south of the Dixmude railway bridge they destroyed a German blockhouse. They claim they have retained the position, despite the German counterattacks. Berlin claims that the French suffered a severe defeat on their front north of Souchez. Paris admits the loss of German trenches previously captured in that sector.

Full returns of the Greek elections re not yet available, but triumph of M. Venizelos, former Premier, seems certain. The continued illness of the Greek King may prevent the victory of the war party from having any immediate results.

Britain, which braced itself for the hock of the announcement of the ssue of another \$1,250,000,000 in the war budget, must wait another day, as the Commons rose this evening without Reginald McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, having made

the expected announcement.

SUBMARINE BASE DISCOVERED. 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
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
