#### Gallantry

The appended official communica tion, has been received by Mr. Fred. Department of Militia, and is a fitting testimonial to the gallantry and daring of a son of Terra Nova, who gave his life in the glorious cause of liberty. Pte. H. Trask also mentioned in this despatch, was the companion of the late Ptc. O'Brien in the deed which won for both the award of the Military Medal.

I beg to quote hereunder the details of the deed for which the Military Medal was awarded your late son No. 3603 Pte Ed. O'Brien, Royal Newfoundland Regiment, taken from supplement to the London Gazette.

"For conspicuous gallantry and "devotion to duty.

"On the morning of the 14th Oc-"tober, 1918, during the advance "from Ledgehem towards the Lys, "almost before the barrage lifted, "these two men dashed forward at "a pill box. A few of the enemy "were leaving the pill box, and as "soon as they saw Ptes. O'Brien and "Trask threw bombs at them but "these two men rushed in and bay-"onetted three of the enemy. They "then went to the pill box and "threw a bomb into it, then enter-"ed it, and captured an Officer and "35 men and 2 M. G's. It was en-"tirely due to the prompt action "and dash of these two men that "the enemy were prevented from "bringing their M. G's into action "and causing heavy casualities."

"On the 14th October, 1918, during "the advance from Ledgehem to-"wards Lys, this man was acting "as Company runner. During the "whole of the day he carried mes-"sages back to Battn. H. Q. often "under heavy fire. Especially "when his Company was held up at "Neerhof during the advance, he "carried messages continually back "to Battn. H. Q. On each occasion "he had to cross about 200 to 300 "yards of open ground swept by "enemy M G, fire."

Please accept my congratulations and assurance of the appreciation of the conduct of your late son.


