

Sporadic discussions crop up every now and again in the public press under such title as "Who Reads the Bible?" or "Is the Bible Interesting?" and then we go to church and come away with the conviction that very few persons read the Bible as though it were worth reading, and not one in a hundred can make it sound interesting, says a writer in Answers Can we wonder, then, that few read the Bible, and that fewer still find it interesting, much less inspiring?

Yet there are great exceptions to this sweeping generalisation. I shall always cherish the memory of the 27th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, the vividest sea story in literature. Robinson Crusee contains no such passage. Clark Russell or Frank Bullen never reached this pitch of realism. Conrad labors far behind. The reader brought all the scene be-





# Power of Japan.

Japan's great battleship Negato is fast approaching completion at the naval dockyard at Kure, and will

This ship has about the same disacement as Great Britain's famous battle cruiser Hood, though she is not so long and therefore has less space to armor. In offensive and defensive power the Negato is superior to the Hood. The main battery consists of ten long 16-inch guns as against the eight 15-inch guns of the Hood. Speed and length have been sacrificed to give the Negato superior armor protection to the Hood, or any other vessel afloat

No exact details are available on the subject of the Negato's armor, but the Japanese have, for several years past, been studying both submarine and aerial protection in addition to protection against plunging shell fire. Huge sums have been spent in the course of their experiments, which have been conducted with characteristic Japanese thoroughness and efficiency. The Negato embodies the result of these experiments.

The Mutsu, a sister ship of the Negato, is to be completed in 1921. Two other ships, the Kaga and the Tosa, are under construction. There is some doubt as to the particulars of these latter ships. There is said to be a controversy over their armament. It is proposed to arm them with either twelve 16-inch or eight 17-inch guns, and there appears to be some opposition to arming them with the shortlived, slow-firing 18-inch guns with their great range and punishing power. The Japanese ordnance experts received their training in England and the introduction of an 18-inch gun into the British service is kown to have had a marked influence upon the

### To Surpass the Hood.

In addition to these ships the Japanese are building four battle cruisers that, it is said, will be superior to the Hood and the United States ships under construction.

Their programme calls for twentyfive scout cruisers in 1924. Five vessels are complete, each having a great cruising radius. In future wars Japan means to take the offensive as the best means of defence. This carries the scene of battle far from Japanese shores and in this way the offensive gives greater security than any other form of warfare. The plan of operation is to conduct a dashing offensive with all the naval power she can muster and to leave the problems of home defence to the ships of the second line. Her navy is at present carrying out this

The battle fleet, consisting of four dreadnoughts carrying twelve 14-inch guns, one dreadnought carrying twelve 12-inch guns and four battle cruisers of twenty-seven knots speed carrying eight 12-inch guns, is absolutely free of the problems of home defence. Five scout cruisers and all of the destroyers in the navy of over 1,000 tons are

### with this fleet. For Home Defence.

Home defence is maintained by submarines, destroyers and aircraft. For Japan this is an ideal arrangement. The submarine is in its element in the warm waters of the Japanese islands and when the submarine is aided and protected by the destroyer it becomes doubly dangerous. A number of destroyers between 500 tons and 1.000

ons are building for this purpose. Japan has been somewhat backward in the air. This is not a result of national disregard of this potent military factor but rather from her isolated position and her remote theatre of operations in the war. At present both the army and navy are experimenting with and building aircraft. The Imperial Diet has made vast sums available for this purpose. An aircraft carrier, typed after the British ships of that kind, has been laid dwon by the Uavy to keep the battle fleet supplied with an air force in any theatre of operations.

### Ross Confident of Cup Challenge Scheme.

TORONTO, August 2.-It will not be the fault of Mr. A. C. Ross, of Nova Scotia, if there is no race for the America's Cup in 1921. When seen to-night Mr. Ross stated that he was wiring the New York Yacht Club again in case his previous message had failed to reach them. "I wired from the train at Prescott," he said. "handing the message to the porter who promised faithfully to see that it was sent, but to avoid any possibility of miscarriage I am sending an-

other wire to-night." Optimistic enthusiasm radiated from Mr. Ross when speaking of his scheme of having a national yacht race for the cup in 1921 and the possibility of defeat he considers too remote to even be considered. The problem of raising the necessary funds he does not consider offers any difficulty.

"I had a man tell me to-day," he said, "that he would gladly give \$1,000 towards having a share in such a project, and he was not a man of means either. My idea would be to limit the amount any man could subscribe to \$1,000 so that the man of small means who could only give one dollar could have a share in the yacht. I would rather see the mass of the people put a dollar each into the scheme than a few men subscribe the required amount by hundreds of thousands."

Such a scheme as this is not a new idea of his, Mr. Ross stated, as the thought of having such a yacht race has been in his mind for the past thirty years ever since the "Thistle" was defeated. Canada has the money to finance the project, the men to build the boat, and the men to man her, and there is no reason so far as Mr. Ross can see why the America's Cup in 1921 should not find a permanent home in Canada. Mr. Ross in his first telegraphic challenge to the New York Yacht Club, gave the names of the Royal Cape Breton Yacht Club, Sydney, and the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron, Halifax. He is a life member of the Sydney Club, but is not a member of the Halifax organization, and therefore had no authority to challenge on its behalf. R. N. S. Y. S. officials say, however, that any feasible plan for challenging for the America's Cup would naturally have their heartiest co-operation.

### Negroes Create Rumpus.

Miami, Fla., August 3.-Florida National Guardsmen were called out last night to protect the city from disorders threatened by 400 negroes natives of the Bahama Islands and British subjects who have been aroused over the death of Herbert Brooks, one of their number charged with assaulting a Miami white woman.

Brooks was arrested at Ormond Florida, Saturday, and reported have been killed in a leap from train taking him to Jacksonville for safe keeping, but the other negroes said to believe instead that he died at the hands of a mob, made a demonstration and threatened to obtain vengeance when his body was returned to Miami. Troops were patrolling the negro residential section last night.

1.-Any person who sets out, makes or starts a FIRE for any purpose whatever, between the Fifteenth Day of April and the First Day of December, in or near woods, or without selecting a place free from dry trees, underbrush or other inflammable material in which to make or start such FIRE, or fails to remove all such dry wood, brushwood or inflammable material within a distance of ten feet from such fire in every direction, or fails to completely extinguish the same before leav-

2.-Throws or Drops any Burning Match, Ashes of a Pipe, Lighted Cigar or any other burning substance.

3.—Or fails to totally extinguish any camp fire before breaking camp, shall be liable to a Penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$400, or imprisonment for a period of twelve months.
