The Earth giving up its Dead-

The Earth giving up its DeadPrivate letters from Valparaiso, and other ports subject to the recent terrible commotion, give many facts and incidents not alluded to in mewspaper accounts heretofore published. One writer reports a singular and horrible sight that occurred in Arica, on the south side of the ruined city:

As the earth opened and yawned, there came up five hundred mummies, who stand in long lines facing the sea, every one of the skeletons in perfect preservation—the hands doubled up and supporting the chin—the knees drawn up, and the feet supporting the fleshless body! This must be one of the most frightful sights possible, and quite beyond description. The spot where the mummies now stand was once an old cemetery—some ninety ago, it is said—and these skeletons are doubtless the fabled Inoas and Indians, who either buried themselves alive or were interred in this manner. They correspond exactly to the old mummies of the Inoas which I described in a former letter as among the curosities to be seen at Lima. As the ground

COST OF WAR.—It is stated that since the peace of 1815 Great Britain has spent-on her military and naval establishments, and the interest of the national debt (for-past wars), the encormous sum of 2,597 millions of pounds sterling; in the present-year, 1868, the cost of the army and navy is more than 28½ millions; the interest of the national debt is more than 26½ millions; and the outlay for fortifications—£530,000; making a total expenditure, for one year only, of 55½ millions. This is at the rate of £152,583 per day, or £6,356 per hour, or exactly 100 guineas per minute day and night throughout the year, on account of war expenditure. The remaining 15 millions of the nation's annual expenditure (about 70 millions) suffices for the civil government and all other expenses.

The Prohibition Cattle Order.—At a meeting of the Board of Agriculture on Friday, it was resolved: "That the Board having ascertained that the cattle disease has almost if not entirely abated in the Western States, and as no danger need be apprehended from the transportation of American cattle through Canada, would recommend that the Government do remove the prohibitory order on and after the 1st of October, and would as a matter of precaution suggest that competent persons be appointed at Detroit and Poit Huron for 30 days, to Inspect all cattle before being shipped through Canada, and to see that the railway companies use proper disinfectants, and that the Secretary do forthwith send a copy of this resolution to the Minister of Customs.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

PER ATLANTIC CABLE.

Paris, Sept. 25.—The Moniteur publishes the following news from Spain:—General Paira, commanding the Royal troops, is massing his forces to attack Seville. The men are in good spirits. Cantelli has been appointed Minister of the Interior, and Kazzive, Minister of the Public Works.

The following official announcement has been received from Madrid: "Catalonia, Aragon and Valencia are quiet."

Paris, Sept. 24.—The Moniteur has the following: "The revolution in Spain makes no headway. The people are indifferent or averse to the project. Active measures are being taken by the government for the suppression of the sub-filling. The insurgents in Andalusia are retiring before the advance of the Royal troops."

The rumoured rising of the republicans in Calabria is denied.

London, Sept. 25.—Advices received this atternoon from Spain indicates that the rebels are especially strong on the seaboard, on the North Western coast. They hold possession of the fortified seaport towns of Cerunna, Pontevedra and Vigo and the mouth of the Lambre river in the Prevince of Corunna. Two regiments of Royal troops sent from Madrid to put down the insurrection at Cadiz are roported to have revolved while on the royal authorities give an account of the affray at Santander. They report hat after a sharp fight the rebels were worsted and took refuge on the fleet in the harbour.

The veteran observer of the Times says there are 100,000 people in New York who are a burden upon society without being of the least use. He dafms that the tendency of population to cities in America is greatly on the incresse. Between 1850 and 1860 the population of the principal towns in the United States increase 51 per cent, while the agricultural population increased only 34 per cent.
