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





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Fred Whiting of Daily Graphic Arrives by the Empress From Shaho.

He Witnessed Many of Heavy **Battles Fought in Present** Campaign.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

Frederick Whiting, war artist and correspondent of the Daily Graphic, of London, who arrived by the steamer Empress of China from the front, went on to Eastern Canada this morning. Mr. Whiting is the last of the British correspondents to leave the Shaho position before Mukden, he having remained in the trenches before the fortified posi-tions of Kuropatkin until December 26. Mr. Whiting does not consider that the present movement reported in the despatches of the last few days, is the beginning of the great struggle that must take place for Mukden. In his opinion the action was more or less of he nature of a reconnaissance in force The Japanese have strongly fortified the

the nature of a reconnaissance in force. The Japanese have strongly fortified the position they took up after the battle of the Shaho, and are comfortably set-tled in winter quarters, living snugly below ground for the most part. The Russians also are strongly fortified, and although the Russian outposts were con-tinually attacking and there was un almost constant rattle of musketry from different points along the long line, the big action, which will probably be the decisive battle of the war, will not take place until a break occurs in the wea-ther. The weather now has frozen the country up and made the ground like irou. Trenching is impossible, and any force leaving the fortifications in which they settled down would suffer very se-verely, as no defensive works could be carifed out while fighting. The trenches occupied by the Japa-nese forces which Mr. Whiting accom-panied, are built on a system which en-gineers who have seen them regard as the most scientific seen to date. THE AGREEMENT RE WATER-WORKS. CANNED SALMON.

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
