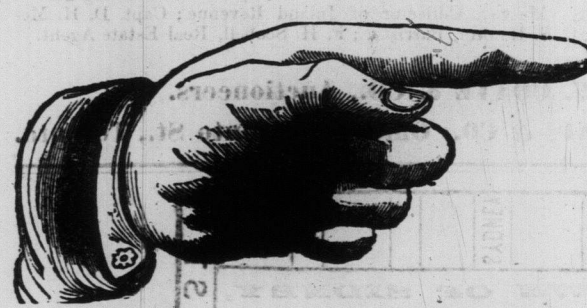

A car of No. 2 choice barley sold at 81c, and No. 3 extra offered at 77c without bid. Western oats offered at 42c, and eastern at 40c. A car of rye was wanted at 80c.
