THE STATE OF SCHOOL BOOKS AND HOW IT WORKS OUT

(Stouffville Tribune)

A man pointed out to us the other day that he paid more for a scribbling book at a local drug store than it cost to get a text book for his child, the text book being all printed and on as good paper or better than the scribbling book. The inference was that the local vendor made an enormous profit. We soon put the individual right. When you hear some one talking about low prices of text books today don't fail to remind the simple ones who have something to learn, that if they looked into the public accounts they would find the Province is putting up a whole lot of the cost of those books and the price printed on the cover does not represent the cost. J. E. Wetherell, a former high school inspector, gets \$4,000 a year as general editor of text books, and his assistant gets \$1,700. The T. Eaton Co. sells the Public School Readers at the following low prices: Primer 4 cents, First Reader 9 cents; Third Reader 14 cents, Fourth Reader 16 cents. The average person thinks the T. Eaton Co. charges up the loss on publishing these books to advertising. Not by a long chalk. The Ontario Government paid the Eaton Co. last year the net sum of \$198,712.20 to make up for the fair profit on these books, and the Byerson Press, which publishes the Public School History of Canada at 25 cents and the History of England at the same price, was allowed \$45,554.48 as supplemental to the wholesale price. Copp Clark Co was paid \$23,755.50, and the whole amount paid to book publishers was \$269,145.77. We are not sure, but are of the opinion that this work is secured by tender. In any case, don't imagine a primer book in the Public School is produced for 4 cents or that the firms publishing them are out to drop money.

THE NEW MOTOR LAW IN ONTARIO

Following are the principal features of the Consolidated Motor Vehicles Act, which, under the official guise of "Bill No. 72, an act to regulate travel on highways, and the speed, operation and load of vehicles thereon," is now before the Ontario Legislature, and which is expected to go into effect practically as it stands except for some minor amendments.

The redrafted regulations in respect of lamps provides for two white lights forward and one rear light, astern, and no motor vehicle is permitted to carry on the front more than three lighted lamps of over four candle power. And additional lights displayed on commercial vehicles to distinguish the width, or class of such vehicle shall be of green color.

The clause governing the use of parking lights is as follows: "A motor vehicle may show one light carried on the left side . . . in such manner as to be clearly visible to the front and rear for a distance of at least 200 feet, and to show white to the front and red to the rear, provided that such light shall not be displayed while the vehicle is in motion."

The new penalties provided for car owners or drivers who operate machines on which the brakes are not in good order are from \$10 to \$50 for the first offense, and from \$20 to \$100 for the second offense, and from \$50 to \$200 for the third offense. The license of a second offender may be suspended for thirty days. One who offends three or more times may have his license suspended for six months, and may also be condemned to jail for thirty days. For failure to have and use a warning signal penalties of \$5 to \$10, and \$10 to \$25 are provided, for first, second and third offences, respectively, and in addition the license of an offender for the third time may be suspended for thirty days.

The amended section governing speed in cities, towns and villages provides a limit of 20 miles per hour ten miles per hour when approaching an intersecting road, in a municipality, and 12 1/2 miles when approaching an intersecting road, a curve or "blind" section.

The following penalties are provided for infringements of the speed laws: \$5 to \$50 fine for the first offense, and \$10 to \$75 for a second offense, and \$25 to \$100 with imprisonment up to 30 days for a third offense. In addition the license of an offender for the second time may be suspended for thirty days; and that of a party guilty of a third offense may be suspended for six months. On highways without municipal lights a speed of 25 miles is prescribed. Where the rate of speed does not exceed 35 miles the following penalties are provided, \$5 to \$10 for first offense, 10 to \$25 for second, \$25 to \$50 for subsequent offenses. On a third offense a license may be suspended for 60 days. Where the rate of speed complained of is between 35 and 40 miles per hour the



ITEMS FROM FAR AND NEAR

Some Wise, Some Otherwise
Some Newswy, All Readable.

Don't suppose we shall ever see beavers damming a stream, but the other day we did hear a man damming a Ford.

At Toronto Fair this fall a house is to be built in 35 minutes. Yes, and after it is built they raise the rent in shorter time than that.

There are 1,256 patients in the Ontario Hospital for the Insane at London and 400 returned soldiers at the Westminster hospital.

Canadian packers have established a new "side" line. A customs report shows that during the last four years more than 83,000,000 pounds of American bacon have been imported from the United States, cured here and then shipped to England.

Are times hard? Well not so very. The people of this province own 234,457 cars. Of this number 210,333 are passenger cars. The farmers are at the head of the list as owners. We are not so hard up as we think we are.

Charles Hacker, of Council Bluffs, Ida., who sued a railroad for \$4,150 following a collision between his automobile truck and a locomotive, was ordered by the court to pay the railroad company \$1 for damage to the engine.

Government sale of liquor proved so lucrative in Quebec province in 1922 that a reduced price list was forecast by the Provincial Liquor Commission. Profits for the year were \$5,500,000 according to treasury estimates on not yet completed reports.

In the Commons last week, Hon. G. P. Graham said that the approximate amount received from war taxes last year by the postal department was about \$7,400,000, and the stamp tax receipts totalled \$28,000,000, and the increase this year was expected to be one and three quarter million.

Windsor has the only court in Canada, it is believed, that is operated without cost to taxpayers. The annual report of Probation Officer Winter on the work of the Juvenile Court, of which Andrew W. Bowby is Honorary Judge, points out that, although more than 100 cases passed through the court last year, not a cent was contributed by municipalities, the small fines paid by delinquent boys' parents being sufficient to meet operating expenses.

About six thousand immigrants are expected to make new homes in Canada as a result of Salvation Army operations this year. Of these, 300 will be boys of working age and with some preliminary training in farm work, one thousand boys and girls, mostly war orphans between the ages of six and twelve, for whom homes will be found with people anxious to adopt children and two thousand women, mostly domestics. The rest will be men, either farm workers or men adaptable for farming.

In order to trace the adventures of a dollar bill, in the course of a two weeks' circulation, the Chicago Chamber of Commerce recently put into circulation a new bill, with a circular attached, asking every person into whose hands it came to make note of the use he had made of it. By the end of a fortnight, it had been spent 31 times. Five times it had gone in payment of salaries or wages five times for tobacco, five times for cigarettes, three times for meals, three times for candy, twice for mens furnishings, and once for collar buttons, automobile accessories, bacon, washing powder, garters and tooth paste respectively. It had never found its way into a church collection, or a newspaper office.

When one says Greater London spreads over 700 square miles and contains a population of 7 1/4 millions that does not perhaps convey much. Other figures must be added to emphasize the size of the world's metropolis. Within a radius of 20 miles, for instance, from Charing Cross, the centre of London, lives one sixth of the total population of Great Britain. On London buses are carried each year 800,000,000 people, or nearly 2 1/2 million each day. In addition, on the trams in Greater London ride 995,000,000 people each year, and on the Tubes, 700,000,000 exclusive of suburban traffic. These are the figures of the House of Commons Select Committee on London traffic. They give some idea of the traffic problems of London. Yet there is no place in the world where traffic proceeds so smoothly.

GENTLE REMINDERS

It has been said of courtesy that it costs nothing and pays the biggest kinds of dividends. And it does.

Girl Scouts in Rhode Island have developed a new game which, probably to attract wide attention and 100 per cent. curiosity, is called "gossip." The girls are seated in a circle. The leader whispers a sentence to her left-hand neighbor. She passes it on to the next girl, also in a whisper. In that way it makes the circle and the last girl tells out loud what she heard. The sentence at the end of the circle is never the same as when it started and often bears little if any, resemblance to it. This game has a greater moral than most such pastimes. It impresses vividly on the girls the evils of gossip, showing how stories change in the repeating, how something is added, something left out, something twisted. Less unhelpfulness might be evident if every gossip who starts a story about a neighbor could have brought home to her that tale after it had been bandied about by a score or more of persons. Perhaps the persistent character assassins would be awed by the brutality of their crime and restrained. Sometimes when the sewing circle starts talking about absent members, try this game, then cogitate the result before contributing to the morsels of gossip.

That a definite move toward the limitation of pastoral terms for rectors in the Anglican Diocese of Huron will be made at the coming session of the synod in London, which meets on May 14th, is now generally believed by clergymen of the diocese. Rectors of the Anglican church serve churches to which they are assigned at the pleasure of the bishop of the diocese concerned. Since the war, however, and in this diocese, prominent laymen have expressed the belief that the matter of limitation of pastoral terms to six or eight years should at least be discussed. Proponents of the limited term point out that by it the efficiency of churches would be greatly increased. They state that permanent incumbencies tend towards a weakening of interest in church work in the latter part of a rector's service. On the other hand the opponents of limited pastoral terms point to the fact that under the unlimited system the Anglican church is one of the most virile religious organizations in Canada, and that it would be just as logical to call for limited terms in the diocesan see as to limit the terms of pastors.

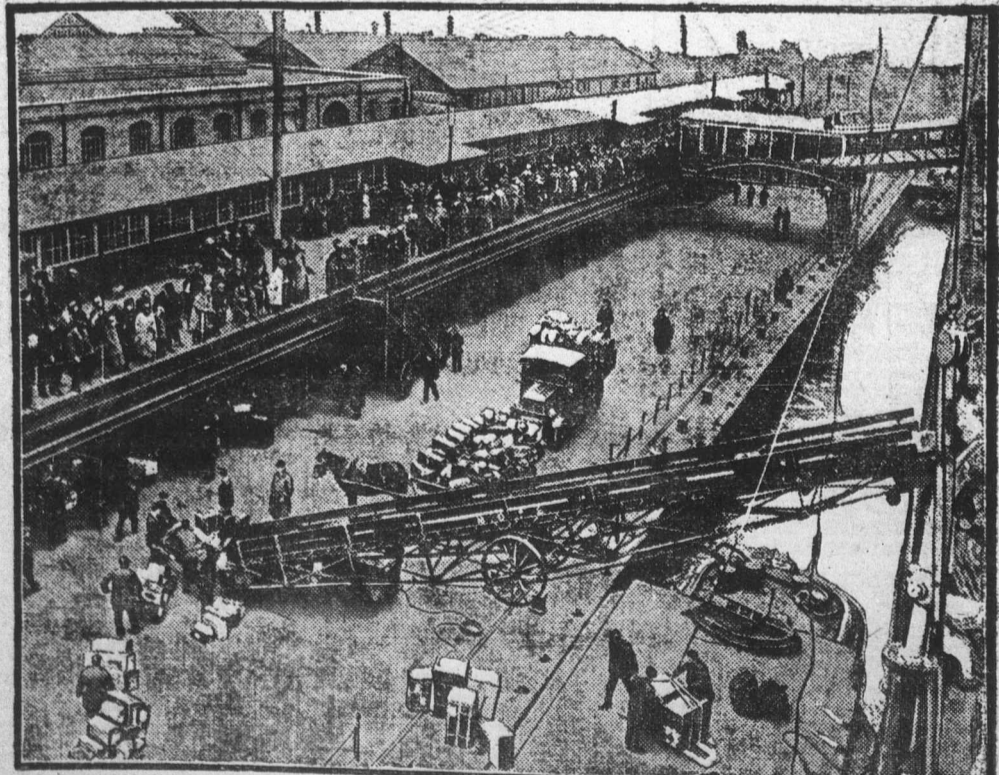

New Canadians Start For Canada



A Busy Scene at the Liverpool Dock.

THE facilities for handling outward bound passengers are as perfect and speedy as any in the world. As will be seen from the picture above of future Canadian citizens boarding the "Montcalm", the travellers pass from the street and railway station levels to waiting rooms on the dock side, and crossing the bridged wharf, board the ship by the saloon deck where they are received and assigned to quarters. Their baggage is handled from below and with despatch. A travelling belt carrier operated by an electric dynamo eliminates the necessity of many noisy and slow moving winch hoists which, when used and not too carefully operated, are the cause of many trunks and boxes being damaged, so that the baggage is carefully loaded and distributed almost as quickly as the passengers are received. It is usually planned to have all the passengers aboard at least half an hour before sailing time, and the gangway is down for their reception about three hours before that time unless special trains are scheduled to arrive earlier. As for other dock-side facilities, the Montcalm commenced to take on coal and discharge cargo, mostly package freight, at six o'clock of the morning of a recent arrival. By 2.45 in the afternoon she had taken 1,000 tons of coal into her side bunkers, and at the same time she was unloading 1,700 tons of freight, this being discharged by 7.15 the same evening.

ALL FIELD SEEDS TO BE OFFICIALLY GRADED

The Seed Control Act, administered by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, is undergoing amendment at the present session of Parliament. The amending Bill, after receiving the approval of the Agricultural committee has had its second reading in the House of Commons. The original Act provides for the compulsory grading only of timothy, alsike, red clover, and alfalfa. The grades of these seeds recognized are "Extra No. 1", "No. 1", "No. 2", "No. 3", and "Rejected". The amended act will extend compulsory grading to all kinds of grass and clover seed, flax, sorghum, millet, wheat, oats, barley, rye, corn, buckwheat, sunflower, field peas, field beans, and vetches. Provision is made for including seeds of other kinds of farm crops. The Bill also provides for the optional grading for commerce of field roots and garden vegetable seeds. Farmers selling seed on their own premises will not be required to grade seed grain. Grass seed and clover seed, however, sold from the farm must have been officially tested and graded on the basis of a control sample.

LARGE SUM OF MONEY FOUND IN OLD TRUNK

True Particulars of the Ann McNeill Will Case, Concerning Which Much Public Interest Has Been Aroused as a Result of the Remarkable Discovery.

Considerable publicity, and most of it of a sensational and erroneous character, has been given by the London daily papers to the finding of \$4,225 in cash in an old trunk owned by the late Ann McNeill, who died recently leaving quite a substantial estate. The facts of the case are these: Miss Elizabeth Jefferson, orphan, who has been with the McNeill family for the past fifteen years, was left nothing by the will of the late Miss McNeill, who left a residue of her estate to Mrs. Annie McKnight. Realizing Miss Jefferson's just claim for recompensation in view of her services as nurse and in caring for Miss McNeill and her late sisters and brother, Mrs. McKnight agreed to divide the residue of the estate evenly with Miss Jefferson. The household and personal effects of the deceased were also evenly apportioned, among them an old family trunk containing old clothing. The contents of the trunk as agreed went to Mrs. Knight, who upon subsequent investigation found hidden therein a bundle of Traders Bank bills amounting to \$4,225. Mrs. Knight immediately told Miss Jefferson of her surprising discovery and handed the cash over to the executors to be included in the assets of the estate, the residue of which is to be evenly shared by her and Miss Jefferson. This is a true outline of the case, which has been the subject of public talk for some time, and will correct some false impressions that have been given as a result of distorted stories in the daily press.—Strathroy Age.

LATE ADAM R. IRONSIDE

It is our sad duty to chronicle the death of another pioneer of Enniskillen Township, in the person of Adam R. Ironside, of con. 13, east. The late Mr. Ironside was the eighth child of Mr. and Mrs. John Ironside, deceased, both of whom were born in Scotland and emigrated to Canada, settling first in Plympton Township, where the subject of this sketch was born on Jan. 29, 1864. From Plympton, he with his parents moved onto a bush farm in Enniskillen in 1875 and set about the heavy task of clearing the land. With great tenacity and perseverance they succeeded in building up their present fine home which passed on to the deceased at the death of his parents. The late Mr. Ironside was a man very widely known and for years operated a threshing outfit in connection with farming. He was a man of great intelligence, being widely read and a splendid conversationalist on every modern topic. He was an ideal husband, a kind father, a splendid neighbor and a great community leader, whose place as such will be hard to fill. He was a very active member of Prosperity Farmers' Club and took an active interest in politics, being a staunch liberal. In religion he was of the Presbyterian faith. He was married twice, first to Agnes Ferguson and later to Miss Jennie Smith. He leaves to mourn his loss besides a very wide circle of friends, his widow and six children, Mrs. Norman Webb, Petrolea; Mrs. George Howlett, Margaret, John and James at home. He also leaves two sisters and two brothers, Mrs. Wm. Seymour Detroit; Mrs. Jas. Ferguson, 11th con. Enniskillen; Wm. of Camlachie, and John of Midland. The funeral was held from the family residence lot 31, con. 13, on Sunday, April 8. It was largely attended and many, owing to the almost impassable conditions of the roads, walking long distances to pay their last sad respects to their old friend. 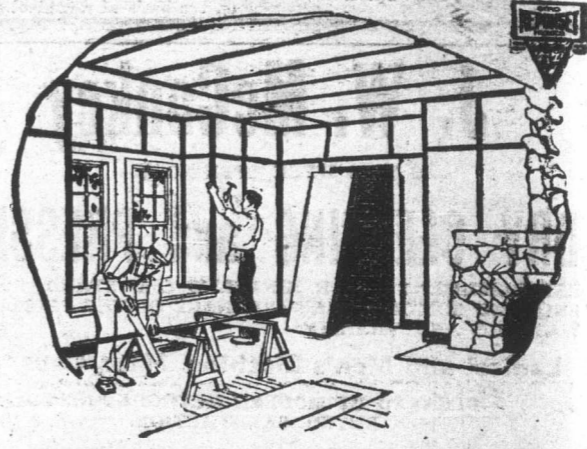

The meeting adjourned to meet again in the council chamber of the Forest Town Hall next Monday evening, April 30th, when the opening dates will be allotted and work on the schedule started.
