The interior was now the most important department in the Government, he had no hesitation in saying that it was the most managed. From quarter to quarter and half year to half year there has been one continual change in regulations affecting trade. He found when he was in that region that about 1,000,000 Dollars had been lost in the Dominion. He at once criticized the management of Canadian land sales, which was driving Canadian land into the hands of the British.

Coming to the Savings Banks, he found that we had borrowed some thirteen millions from the people, paying four per cent interest and one per cent management, making five per cent. In all wealth, some \$175,000,000; paying 5 per cent and receiving one and one-half per cent. He criticized the issuing of the land scribbles, and said it was only by accident that a section was not produced by them. He would refer to the greatly increased cost of living. Ministers and supporters of the present Government, self-congratulatory and self-complacent, if they were able to produce things as cheaply as they could elsewhere, what need had they of a protective tariff? It was because they could not do so that they needed the tariff to shut out foreign goods. Probably the Finance Minister did not bear the complaints of the poor, of men with small families.
