Any stranger coming into this town for the first time cunnot fail to be impressed with the neat appearance of the residences with their well-kept premises, and the general tidiness and brightness of the business section of the town But Truro was not always thus; and it was paint that first began to transform an unattractive and unprogressive provincial town into one of the prettiest and most enterprising of our Canadian towns. The story, as we have heard it, is that many years ago Truro was expecting a visit from the Prince of Wales, and to prepare for the reception of so distinguished a guest, the people set about to improve the appearance of their town.
