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


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

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LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Funly. —Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, I. Woodward, John Wilson, Esquires; Hon. W. F. W. Owen, Lieutenant Charles Hare, R.N., and John James Robinson, Esq., R. N.

Isaac Woodward. Esq., Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy, belonging to New-Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova-Scotia, which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called BLONDE ROCK, lies 33 miles S. by W by compass, from the Light House. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers; the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between thom.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain White Light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next Light on the coast of Nova-Scotia is placed on the West side of Digby Gat, from Brier Island North-Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the Light is, therefore, chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. A White Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—WHITE—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

BEARINGS AND DISTANCES BY COMPASS FROM THE GANNET ROCK. LIGHT HOUSE :

This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island N.N.W. 3 W. 22 miles. From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. 2 S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock off White Head Island, N. E. 4 E. 7 miles. From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N.N.W. 64 miles. From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N.W. 4 N. 24 miles. To the Southernmost of ditto, called St. Mary's Ledge, W.S.W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N. 1 N. 121 miles.

Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Lighthouse about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. 4 W. 184 miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of Cape Sable Seal Islands, S. and by W. 31 miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.--There are two fixed WHITE lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about 45 feet above high water, and bearing from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished

from all other lights upon the coast, British or American. Both the buildings are painted White. The following are the bearings, by compass, from them, viz.:-

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

- " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. 4 S. 13 miles.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. J E.
- " North-East Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Lighthouse (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these lights into one, as they will be then not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the E. of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly (or 14 points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty charts,* that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. I.edge, is S. W. § S., but the course to be steored must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan, and the plain White Light (American) on West Quoddy Point is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North-East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also, at all times, to enter Head Harbour. It is a fixed White Light. The building is painted white, with a zed cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head-land two Lights are placed, one above the other in the same house, and distant twenty-eight feet. Both Lights can be seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of St. John, having been established above fifty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed White Light, and the Light House is painted red and white in vertical stripes. The Light was enlarged in November, 1846.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of St. John, and to all other vessels having pilots on hoard, as it enables them to enter the Harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed White Light. The house is painted white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco Light.—A revolving White Light is placed on a small rock off Quace Head, shewing twice full and twice dark in a minute. The Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. The house is about 120 feet above the tide mark, and is painted white. A plain White Light.

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SIGNALS

Made at Partridge Island on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of St. John.

One Ball, close, for one square-rigged vessel. One Ball, half-hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels. Two Balls, close, for three square-rigged vessels. Two Balls, separate, for four square-rigged vessels. A Pendant of any colour, for five square-rigged vessels. A Pendant under a Ball, for six square-rigged vessels. A Pendant over a Ball half-hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels. A Pendant under two Balls, close, for eight square-rigged vessels. A Pendant between two Balls, separate, for nine square-rigged vessels. A Flag of any colour for ten or more vessels. [The above are hoisted at the East or West Yard-arm, according to the

[The above are hoisted at the East or West Yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessels first appear in; and when their rig can be made out, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast-head :]

- A Union Jack, for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
 - with a Red Peudant over, for a two-decker.
 - with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.
 - with a White ditto, for a small-armed vessel.
- A Blue Pendant, for a Merchant-ship or Barque.
- A Red ditto, for a Merchant Brig or Brigantine.
- A White and Blue ditto, for a foreign square-rigged vessel.
- A White ditto, without a Ball, for a topsail Schooner or Sloop.
- A Flag, blue and white horizontally, a neutral fleet.
- A Pendant, white and blue, a neutral Man-of-War.
- A Blue Flag, a neutral Merchant-ship.

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- A Red, White, and Blue Flag, an enemy's fleet.
- A Red, White, and Blue Pendant, an enemy's Man-of-War.
- A Union Jack, over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained, or a prize.
- A White Flag over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of trucc.
- A Red Flag pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby.
- A Blue Flag pierced white, for a Steamboat from St. Andrews or Eastport.
- A Red Flag, with a white square, for a Steamboat from Portland or Boston.

A Ball at the masthead, the vessel is on shore, or in distress; should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather, a gun will be fired at Partridge Island in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog-bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather to warn vessels of their approach to the shore.

When the vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive Pendant will be shewn at the Yard-arm instead of a Ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS,

NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level, or it is still water, at about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *chb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes at each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high Southerly winds. For a few days in the spring of the year, the height of water in the River Saint John renders the passage of the Falls extremely difficult.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

The first and most important thing for the farmer in this month is to attend to his horses, cattle and swine. Let them be housed at night and in stormy weather. See that the stables are cleaned, the yards dry and well-littered, the sheds warm and yet well ventilated. If hay is scarce, and labor is cheaper than fodder, it may be cut and mixed with chopped straw, corn stalks, meal, bran, grain or roots; take care, at all events, that no fodder is wasted. Cut up a few potatoes or turnips for sheep, and mix a little salt with them. If there be sufficient snow, haul home wood for fuel and fences Logs may be taken to the mill and made into boards for future use. Repair your tools, vehicles and implements, when obliged to stay in-doors. Thrash grain, clean seeds, and take farm produce to market. Take oats to mill. Take every opportunity of chopping and preparing new land for a crop. This is also a good time for breaking steers and colts, and for making tenons and mortices in fence stuff.

ASTRONOMY FOR THE MONTH.

Eclipses.-During this month there are two Eclipses, the first of which only is visible in New-Brunswick. As in this case, an eclipse of the Moon is not unfrequently followed, at the next new Moon, by one of the Sun : and the converse of this is exemplified in the present year by the two eclipses which occur in December, when an eclipse of the Sun is followed at next full Moon by one of the Moon. Eclipses of the Moon being caused by the Earth intercepting the rays of the Sun, and thereby casting a shadow on the Moon, commonly happen ut, or near, full Moon. On the other hand, the Sun can be eclipsed only at or near new Moon. Owing to the size of the Earth, the cone of its shadow always projects far beyond the Moon ; but the Moon being comparatively small, the extremity of its shadow does not always reach the Earth, and never covers more than a few miles in breadth.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Continue to attend to the stock: remember that by keeping animals warm, you economise the food which would otherwise be applied to sustain the heat of the body. Curry the cattle and horses. Lice, which accumulate on over-crowded cattle, may now be destroyed by tobacco-juice, snuff, lard, fish-oil or soft soap. Hens will lay all winter, if their houses be impervious to cold winds, and if with their grain they receive a supply of gravel and old mortar. Continue the hauling of fuel and fencing-stuff; cut up as much of the former ss possible, and pile it away under cover for summer use: this seems novel, but the *farmer* will understand, though the *lumberman* may not. Finish the thrashing of grain, and stow it away beyond the reach of rat, mouse or weevil. Prepare for making maple sugar. Take advantage of this season for hauling peat, swampmuck, sea, river or pond mud, for making composts of.

ASTRONOMY FOR THE MONTH.

The Moon.-The physical constitution of the Moon is better known to us than that of any other heavenly body. By the aid of telescopes we discover inequalities in her surface which can be no other than mountains and valleys. She has no clouds nor any other decisive indications of an atmosphere, and on this account it seems impossible that any form of life, analogous to those on earth, can subsist there. No appearance indicating vegetation, or the slightest variation of surface fairly ascribable to change of scason can any where be discerned. A circle of one second in diameter, as seen from the earth on the surface of the Moon, contains about a square mile. Telescopes, therefore, must yet be greatly improved, before we could expect to see signs of inhabitants, as manifested by edifices or by changes on the surface of the soil.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Make maple sugar. No trees of less than twelve or eighteen inches diameter ought to be tapped: they should be bored with an inch auger; all the vessels used should be perfectly clean; the sap should be first strained and reduced by boiling nineteentwentieths of its bulk, then clarified by white of egg, boiled and strained again; boil again, and then pour it into pans till it grains; after this, dry it by placing it in wooden drains filled with gimlet holes. Look well to the cattle, and give those with young an extra feed or mash occasionally. Manure may be hauled from town or elsewhere. Take every opportunity of hauling wood, and of carting manure to the fields. Let the yards be cleaned at regular times and new littered. Early lambs for market should appear in March, but very great care is required to preserve them.

His motion in the Ecliptic, or change of longitude in twenty-four mean and solar hours, averages 59' 8" 33; but about the 31st of December it amounts to 61' 9" 9, about the first of July is only 57' 11" 5. Such are the extreme limits, and such the mean value of the Sun's apparent angular velocity in his annual orbit. This variation is accompanied with a corresponding change of his distance from us; and it appears from alterations in his apparent diameter at his greatest, mean, and least distances are as the numbers 1.01679, 1.00000, and 0.98321 respectively; and that this apparent angular velocity diminishes as the square of the distance increases, and vice versa.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

The farm should be plotted and each field assigned its crop for the year. Manure should be all got out while the hauling is good. The cattle should not be allowed to wander on the road, fields or meadows, which does no good to themselves, and much injary to the land. Let the drains be overhauled and cleared out. Continue the cutting splitting and piling of wood. Prune and remove dead limbs and branches of fruit trees bushes and shrubs. Scrape off moss from apple trees, and cut off black knobs on the plum trees. All kinds of fruit and forest trees may now be safely transplanted. Transplanting must always be done before the leaves are out or after they have fallen; if a tree is covered with leaves when it is transplanted, the evaporation by their surface is so great, that the vital moisture of the plant would be all dissipated before the roots had begun to absorb water from the soil. Break up the garden and sow the early vegetables. Commence ploughing in dry situations and on sod land as soon as the frost will allow.

ASTRONOMY FOR THE MONTH.

Mercury.—On the ninth of this month the planet Mercury attains its greatest elongation from the Sun. It is then $19^{\circ} 22' E$ in the constellation Aries, and crosses the meridian at 1 hour 12 minutes afternoon, and continues an evening star till the evening of the 30th, when it passes to the West of the San. It is so small, and being nearer the Sun than any of the other planets, is so much lost in the splendor of the solar rays, that it is seldom seen, and the telescope affords us little information of its actual condition. Its real diameter is about 3220 miles : its apparent diameter varies from 5" to 12" according to its distance from the earth. The velocity with which it moves in its orbit round the Sun is 109,360 miles per hour.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Set about ploughing the land. Early spring ploughing is the best for sod land, as the frost both pulverizes it and kills the weeds. Sow grass and plant the root crops. Steep and sow the grain crops. Corn may be sown after the grain crops and clover. Turn out the sheep and cattle, but not before the land is tolerably dry and the young grass has appeared. Cart out the remainder of the manure, and clear up the farm-yards. Manure will waste as much in the heap in one season as in the ground, and for the first you get nothing, for the other a great deal. Towards the close of the month the meadow lands may be top-dressed with compost, gypsum or other manure. Mark spots for future drainage. Beets, mangold-wurtzel, and Swedes may be sown with advantage after the other crops. Peas, beans, onions, turnips, carrots, parsnips, potatoes, radishes and spinach may be sown in garden and fields. Cabbages, cucumbers, cauliflower, lettace, radishes, tomatoes and peppers may be planted out. Hedges and shrubs may be trimmed.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Finish sowing and planting. The seed-end of potatoes, cut rather deep, will yield the best crop. Ruta-bagas, or Swedes, may be sown after the potatoes. Four or five ibs, of seed are not too much for an acre-that will allow some for the insect and some for the land. Transplant so as to fill up spots where crops seem to fail. Hoe, or set the cultivator going among the corn and root crops. Weed the garden, the grain and root crops, otherwise it will be fifty times more troublesome later in the season and next year. Weedy fields may be ploughed for summer fallow. Buckwheat land ought to be prepared. The earlier the chopped land can be well burnt the better. Frane, trim and transplant trees. After transplanting, the soil should be rendered mellow and rich by mucking in for a considerable distance around; choose a moist or rainy day for the operation. Remove or destroy insects, lice and caterpillars on fruit-trees. Plant out cabbages. Transplant wild plants, bringing with them a portion of the natural soil.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Hee and weed corn, potatoes and all other crops; run the cultivator through them when the opportunity offers. Buckwheat and even turnips may be sown as late as July. Make early preparation for harvesting; repair barns, vehicles and tools. Get the best tools in the market: a man may earn the extra cost of a good scythe or cradle in a single day's work. Procure a horse rake, by means of which one man with a steady horse can do the work of seven or eight men. Clover should be cut while it is in full bloom. Timothy and red-top do not ripen till a fortnight after clover : they should be cut while the seed is in full milk, and before it is so ripe as to shake out when handled. Weeds should be cut down or rooted out before seeding; transplant cabbages and turnips in field or garden; gather flowering herbs, and dry quickly in the san.

ASTRONOMY FOR THE MONTH.

Mars.—This planet is readily distinguished in the heavens by its dusky red appearance. At midnight, on the 20th, it is about 5° south of the Moon, and crosses the meridian on that day at 3h. 38m. P. M. It is an evening star throughout the year. In it we frequently discern, with perfect distinctness, the outlines of what may be conticents and seas. Brilliant white spots which appear at its poles, have been considered, with some probability, to be snow; as they disappear when they have been long exposed to the sun, and are greatest when just emerging from the long night of their polar swinter. Its greatest and least apparent diameters are 4" and 18", and its real diameter about 4100 miles.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Finish hoeing and weeding, and prepare for grain harvest. Wheat, oats and barley are generally cut in this month: the best ought to be set aside for seed, and ullowed to ripen fully while standing. The grain intended for consumption should be cut while still soft, for not only is the flour better, but there is much less loss and waste in harvesting the crop. Lowland hay may be cut and made into stacks. If there is time, it is much better, at once, to get the low meadow hay beyond the reach of the river than to wait till winter. Make drains where required; gather seed and herbs; destroy weeds wherever they are to be seen; remove balls from potato vines, if thought necessary. Fall wheat may be sowed. If grain harvest be finished, fall ploughing for next season may be begun. A good farmer will be ploughing all summer long. Don't burn too soon, or the trouble will be greatly increased. Great care should always be taken to extinguish fires on new land; besides the real danger to all parties, the penalty, on conviction, for not doing so is £3.

Asterds.—These small planets cannot be discerned without the aid of the Telescope Within the first six years of the present century, four of them were discovered, and since 1845, the number has been increased to fourteen. It is remarkable that this important addition to the solar system had been in some sort surmised as a thing not unlikely, on the ground that the interval between the orbit of Mars and that of Jupiter was much greater than would be inferred from the distances which separated the other planots They are so minute that nothing has been ascertained respecting their physical condition. None of them, except Vesta and Pallas, have hitherto been observed to possess sensible discs, and those only with high magnifying powers. On the last of the month, Vesta crosses the meridian at half after 4 o'clock, A. M.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Carry on the harvesting of grain, corn and root crops. Neglect not fall ploughing for a single day. Draining ought to be gone on with: let the drains be from 30 to 36 inches in depth, and placed about 20 feet apart. Grain may now be field thrashed. Do not take up potatoes until the vines have been killed by the frost, and are perfectly dry; keep them from sun and wet, and allow them to dry before housing; let them be stored away in barrels or binns well protected from air. Early apples may be gathered by hand, wiped, and put away into binns or barrels, taking care not to bruise them: they should be kept in a dry, cool cellar, or upper room, where the temperature is not below the freezing point: should they, by any means, get frozen, they should be kept covered, so as to let them thaw gradually. Trees may be budded in this month. N. E. farmers generally sow grass seeds (not clover) as early as possible after the summer crop. This is, likewise, a good time for the cow to go to the bull. Rams, again, should be removed from the sheep until the end of November or December.

ASTRONOMY FOR THE MONTH.

Jupiter.-This is the largest and most magnificent of all the Planets, its absolute diameter being no less than 87,000 miles. Its apparent diameter varies from 30" to 46." It is, moreover, dignified by the attendance of four moons; and thus presents a beautiful miniature of the solar system. These Satellites were discovered by Galileo, and were among the first fruits of the invention of the Telescope. The first astronomical solution of the great problem of "the longitude" dates immediately from their discovery ; and by examining their eclipses, Bradley determined the aberration of light, and consequently ascertained the enormous velocity of that wonderful element. Jupiter is further remarkable by having its disc crossed by dark bands or belts, which are observed to vary in breadth and situation, though never in their general direction. During the months of April, May, and June, of the present year, it is favorably situated for observation. It continues an evening star till the 21st of November.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Continue draining, fall ploughing, and securing corn and root crops. When potatoes are to be stored in the field, a dry, sandy spot should be chosen, on which they are to be laid in heaps, then put a layer of straw over them; thatch them carefully, and cover the whole with earth: two small orifices should be left, the one at the top, and the other at the bottom; these should be closed with a wisp of straw, and opened occasionally, to permit the access of fresh air. If the soil of the field is a wet clay, a ditch ought to be dug round the spot where the roots are to be laid. Turnips may be either stored in a root house, or in pits three feet in breadth, and covered with straw and earth as above. Cull out the choicest animals for breeding and for use; sell or fatten the remainder. Trees may be set out for the ensuing spring as soon as the leaves have fallen, and the buds are fully formed. Small seedlings, however, are best transplanted in the spring Fruit trees may now be propagated by layers or cuttings.

ASTRONOMY FOR THE MONTH.

Saturn.—This planet presents a more wonderful and beautiful appearance than any other member of the Solar system. Besides being attended by no less than eight satellites, or moons, it is encompassed with two broad, flat, extremely thin rings, concentric with the planet and with each other. The satellites of Saturn have been much less studied than those of Jupiter, being far more difficult to observe. The discovery of the eighth is quite recent, (Sept. 19, 1848,) having, by a remarkable coincidence, been made on the same night by Prof. Bond, of Cambridge, U. S., and Mr. Lassell, of Liverpool. During this and the two following months it is favorably situated for observation. On the first of October, it is in conjunction with the Moon, in the neighbourhood of the constellation Taurus, and being then near Opposition, its motion is retrograde.

AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Stock now requires increased attention: they should be stall-fed for the winter, if possible, or put up in yards with a warm aspect, and with sheds attached, whereto they can resort in stormy seasons: they should be supplied with plenty of water and salt, and fed about three times every day, and curried regularly. 'The sow may be taken to the boar in this month, and the ram allowed to return to the flock again. Let thefarmer keep out of the woods, for farming is not a branch of lumbering, nor are active lumberers likely to make thrifty husbandmen. Once for all, let the farmer forswear the woods. He may now thrash grain, and take his produce to market; the good wife ought to have her quota ready of cheese, butter, fowls, hams, sausages, mittens, socks, cloth, wool, and feathers; these are all as good as money in town. Let all accounts be settled and debts paid. Every farmer ought to keep a book wherein he records his operations, and notes the effect of different kind and quantities of manure, seed, &cc.; the returns under each method ought to be recorded by measure and weight. The crops for each field ought to be arranged not only for the ensuing summer, but for several years in advance: let there always be a systematic rotation of crops on the farm; let every one take in and study an agricultural periodical, and strive to combine science with practice—practice with science.

ASTRONOMY FOR THE MONTH.

Neptune.—The discovery of Neptune marks in a signal manner the maturity of astronomical science. It was first detected by Dr. Galle of Berlin, Sept. 23d, 1846, in the very spot indicated by the independent theoretical researches of Leverrier and Adams, who suspected certain small irregularities observed in the motions of Uranus to be due to the disturbing action of an exterior planet. Hitherto, the situation of Neptune in the ecliptic has been so little favorable for seeing it with perfect distinctness, that nothing very positive can be stated as to its physical appearance. Its diameter is about 42,000 miles. To two observers it has afforded strong suspicion of being surrounded with a ring very highly inclined. And from the observations of Mr. Lassel, M. Otto Struve, and Prof. Bond, it appears to be attended by one, and very probably by two statellites—though the existence of the second can hardly yet be considered as quite demonstrated.

The Collegiate or Grammar School of York receives an annual allowance of £375 (besides the services of a French Teacher) from King's College, and is placed under the control of a Committee appointed by the College Council.

The supervision of the other Grammar Schools is vested in Boards of Directors and Trustees, appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. The Government allowances are, £150 to the Saint John School, £50 to the School in charge of Mr. Sivewright, in Northumberland, and £160 to each of the others, on condition that the inhabitants pay the further sum of £50 to the Teacher.

The general management of the Parish Schools is by Act of Assembly, 10 Vic., chap. 56, vested in the Lieutenant-Governor and Executive Council, as a Board of Education. The average number of Schools in the Counties has heretofore been limited to nine for each Parish; but the number may be increased to thirteen in any Parish, provided the whole number in the County does not exceed the established average. The Government allowance to the Teachers is £30 per annum for Teachers of the First Class; £22, Second Class; and £18, Third Class. The emoluments, exclusive of the Government allowance, range between £20 and £100, the general average being about £30.

In cases where pilots shall be detained on board of vessels under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand from the masters of such vessels 10s. per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid. Coasting vessels going from one part of the day of Fundy to nother, (except square-rigged), British steam-boats, or British vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the above rates.—For removing any shit¹⁰ or vessels not exceeding 100 tons, 7s. 6d.; over 100, and not exceeding 200, 10s.; over 200, and not exceeding 300, 15s.; over 300, 20s.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SAINT JOHN AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

THE Directors of the Saint John County Agricultural Society have now to make a Report to the Society of their doings for the past year.

By the Treasurer's account, now submitted, it will be seen that the receipts for the year have been—from subscriptions, £59 3s.; and allowance from Government, £177. The expenditures have been—£15 for premiums at the Exhibition; £44 to the Golden Grove Society; £104 7s. to the Loch Lomond Society; £21 for premiums on field crops; £39 5s. 7d. for prize books at last year's Fair; £40 7s. 9d. for printing Norton's *Elements of Agriculture* and the Society's Reports and handbills for the last three years; and £17 for premiums at the Ploughing Match.

The Directors of the Mechanics' Institute having requested the co-operation of this Society in getting up an Industrial Exhibition, the Directors, in conjunction with the Provincial Society in Fredericton, offered premiums for agricultural implements and produce, to the extent of thirty pounds, and the Directors have to report that the Exhibition was most successful in its results, far surpassing anything of the kind that has ever before been attempted in the Province, and giving evidence that our mechanics and farmers are quite able to supply all our wants, both as to quantity and quality. Implements were exhibited in great variety, and in quality and price superior to anything imported, and showing that if the home market is not supplied with home manufactures, it must proceed from other causes than want of ability.

It is proposed that another such an Exhibition should be held in Fredericton in October of next year, and all the County Societies have been invited to assist and compete. It is intended that this Provincial Exhibition should also embrace a Cattle Show; and it will be for the consideration of the Society whether the usual County Fair and Show might not for next year be dispensed with, and competitors requested to exhibit at Fredericton.

Fairs and Cattle Shows were held at Loch Lomond and Golden Grove, reports of which have been published. Premiums were also awarded both by the County Society and those branch Societies for field crops.

It will be necessary that some arrangement should be made to obviate a difficulty which has arisen with regard to premiums offered by these different Societies.

It frequently happens that the same persons are members of all these Societies, and compete for the premiums offered by each, thus causing three different sets of Judges to be at the very arduous labour of inspecting the same crops.

The Directors would suggest as a remedy that the Golden Grove Society be open only to members residing within a certain defined district, and the Loch Lomond Society to take in the remainder of the Parish. A Society is already established in St. Martin's, and it is expected that before another year there will be a Parish Society in Lancaster. Those Parish Societies might each have a Show and Fair, contined to its own members residing within its own district, and to the County Society night be left the distribution of premiums for general field crops, open to all members of Parish Societies.

The Exhibition at the Mechanics' Institute having come in place of the usual Show, the Directors offered premiums for a Ploughing Match, which was held in the Parish of Lancaster on Friday last. Eleven competitors came forward, and it is creditable to the County to have to say that there was not an inferior ploughman amongst them.

The award of premiums, although the Judges were known to be thoroughly competent, gave the *usual* satisfaction; that is, those who were first, thought that full justice had been done, while the rejected were persuaded that there could not have been fair play. be the Ste

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thoroughly hought that there could As it is highly necessary that not only the Judges but the ploughmen should be familiar with the rules by which good ploughing is distinguished from bad, the Directors here insert a definition of what constitutes good ploughing, from Stephens' Book of the Farm :—

"Want of attention is the great bar to young men becoming good ploughmen; and if they do not acquire the art when comparatively young, they will never do so at an advanced period of life. It is a want of attention at first that makes some ploughmen bunglers all their days, and the great majority exhibit but mediocre attainments. It is well known that the horses of a good ploughman suffer less from the work than those entrusted to an awkward and unskilful hand, and that a material difference will be found in the crops of those ridges tilled by a bad ploughman, when compared to any part of the field where the operation has been judiciously performed.

"The proper form and position of the furrow slice are essential requisites in good ploughing. The furrow slice should always be of such dimensions, and laid in such position, that the two exposed faces in a series of slices should be of equal breadth, and any departure from this is a positive fault. Laid up agreeably to this rule, furrow slices will not only present the maximum of surface to the atmosphere, but also contain the maximum of cubic contents.

" Correct ploughing possesses these characteristics :- The furrow slices should be quite straight, for a ploughman that cannot held a straight furrow is unworthy of his charge. The furrow slices should be quite parallel in length, and this property shows that they have been turned over of an uniform thickness, for thick and thin slices lying together present irregular horizontal lines. The furrow slices should present to the eve a similar form of crest and equal surface, because when one furrow slice exhibits a narrower surface than it should have, it has been covered with a broader slice than it should be; and when it displays a broader surface than it should have, it is so exposed by a narrower slice than should be upon it. The furrow slices should have their back and face parallel. The ground, on being ploughed, should feel equally firm under the foot at all places, for slices in a more upright position than they should be not only feel hard and unsteady, but will allow the seed to fall down between them and be buried. Furrow slices in too flat a state, always yield to the pressure of the foot, and they cover each other too much, affording insufficient mould for the seed. They should he over at the same angle, 45 degrees, thus presenting crests in the best possible position for the action of the harrow. Crowns of ridges formed by the meeting of opposite furrow slices should neither be elevated nor depressed in regard to the rest of the ridge. The last furrow slice should be uniform with those of the rest When the last furrows are ill made, the open furrow cannot be of the ridge. proportionately cleaned out, because if the space between the last furrows is too wide, the open furrow must be made too deep to fill up all the space; and if too narrow, there is not sufficient mould to make the open furrow of the proper size. If the last furrow slices are laid too flat, the open furrow will throw too much mould upon the edges, and thus make them too high."

The crops in the County have this season been generally above an average. Hay was everywhere, especially on uplands, an excellent crop. Wheat was good, weighing, in all cases, heard from over 60 lbs. per bushel, and subjected to neither rust nor weevil. Oats were well filled and early ripened; and improved varieties being now in common use, the average weight raised in the County is probably considerably over 40 lbs. per bushel. At the Shows, samples were exhibited weighing 47, 48, 49, 50 and 51 lbs. per bushel—a weight almost unprecedented.

Potatoes, although early struck with the rust in the tops, ripened well; and when dug, the roots were found to be very little affected; and in this County the crop is much better and more abundant than it has been within the last seven years. 'Vurnips and carrots, owing to the cold, wet season, will not generally yield over half a crop.

It is worthy of notice, however, that in one or two instances, where the land was drained, subsoiled, and manured with equal proportions of well-rotted manure, guano, and bone-dust—say twenty single loads of manure, two cwt. of guano, and fifteen bushels of bone-dust—and the weeding and stirring up of the soil properly attended to, the produce of turnips and carrots was as good as in the most propitious of seasons. The principal cause of the failure of these crops is the improper application of the manure. Stable manure should never he used in the green state for turnips and carrots, but should be removed to the field early in spring, and turned at least twice before being put into the drill. Carrots especially will be a much surer crop, if grown on land which had been heavily manured the previous year for potatoes or turnips.

On such a field, after a deep ploughing in the fall, a cross ploughing in spring, followed by a deep grubbing with the subsoil plough, or grubber, a heavy crop of carrots may be expected, with the aid only of about three cwt. of guano.

A bonemill has been erected in the Penitentlary, where arrangements have been made either to grind hones on hire, or to supply bonedust. The value of bonedust as a manure is little known, and therefore little appreciated, in this country; but when it is known that the average crop of wheat of the State of New-York at this time does not exceed 12½ bushels per acce, and that of Ohio, not more than 15 bushels; and that thirty years since, the former averaged 30 bushels, and the latter 35 bushels per acce, and that the *parting with* phosphate of lime from the soil without renewal, is the chief cause of their inability to produce their former ratio, which, is proved by the old quantities having been raised when phosphate of line has been used,—when this is considered, together with the experience of the last thirty years in England of the effect of bonedust in restoring worn-out lands, it is to be hoped that farmers generally will avail themselves of this opportunity of adding fertility to their fields.

A tile machine was also imported by this Society, under the direction of Government, and is staticned at the Penitentiary, where tiles will be made to order.

So much has been written of late years on improvements in agriculture, that the subject may be considered pretty nearly exhausted. All that can well be said on it is already before the public in Professor Johnston's report, and in the very useful publications of the Provincial Society of New-Brunswick, of which Professor Robb is the efficient Secretary.

The Directors would at this time desire to draw the consideration of farmers but to one point, which they consider of vital importance, and that is, to the alarming increase of white weed and yellow weed, or the ox-eye daisy, dandelion, and buttercup, in the hay-fields of the country.

Such is the prevalence of this pest, that in the senson of the flowering of plants, instead of a healthy green, the whole country is becoming chequered with white and yellow, and Timothy and clover are rapidly giving place to masses of weeds, which, while they exhaust the soil, afford but little nutriment to stock.

While it is admitted that the seeding of those weeds causes them to spread over all descriptions of soils, and to infest alike the fields of the good and the bad farmer, yet there cannot be a doubt but that this evil is mainly the consequence of the general system which prevails of cutting grass for hay too long in succession; the common practice, as is well known, being to cut grass from five to ten years without breaking up the ground, and often without top-dressing.

It is now becoming evident that on this system farming cannot be conducted profitably, and it is the duty of all who desire prosperity to endeavour to find a remedy.

Science and practice alike concur in pointing to a ROTATION OF CROPS as the foundation of good husbandry, and the rotation found to be most suitable to the general circumstances of the country is as follows :--- A will and besic crop his be n expe A

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ed profitremedy. ROPS as itable to First year, broken up from fallow—Oats. Second year, with manure—Roots. Third year—Wheat or Barley, with Grass Seeds. Fourth year—Hay. Fifth year—Pasture or Hay. Sixth year—Pasture.

As by this system, with the arable portion of the farm in six divisions, a farmer will have each year two fields in grain, one in roots, such as potatoes, turnips, and carrots, one or two in hay, and one or two in pusture, it has been found that beside a progressive improvement in the quality and capability of the soil, the crops will be in exact accordance with the requirements of the farmer's family and his stock, and the manure with the fields; it is hoped that a general attempt will be made to break from the gin-horse track of a had system, and adopt that which experience has proved to be profitable both for the present and future.

MODE OF SAVING AND MAKING MANURE.

In compliance with the terms on which the Saint John County Agricultural Society have offered a premium for the most economical mode of saving and making Manure, I hereby transmit to you my mode. My harn stands on a side hill, under which is my vault for saving and making manure. The cattle stand immediately over the vault. The floor of the barn is perfectly tight, with a little inclination to one end, to conduct the urine into a puncheon placed for its reception. In the first place, I deposit a quantity of muck in the bottom of the vault, then spread a layer of stable manure, mixing the horse and cow manure well together; I then spread another layer of muck, and saturate the whole heap with the urine and house slops, which are also collected in puncheons fer that purpose. I then put on another layer of manure and of muck, and so on until I fill the vault, when I turn the whole heap over, and use it for top-dressing and for my crop. My manure heap is never exposed to either the rain or frost.






I think there is no part of husbandry in this Province that requires the farmer's attention more than saving and making Manure; yet there is no part of husbandry so much neglected, which is much to be regretted, for, with manure the farmer can do every thing—without it, he can do nothing. The Flemish farmers, who, it is acknowledged by a great many, are the most industrious people in the world, call manure the God of Husbandry. But, Sir, if you have travelled over as much of this County as I have, you have seen that very little other manure is made than that made in the barnyard, although it abounds with all sorts of material for making compost, and every facility for increasing the manure heaps.

Six years ago, when I joined your Society, I was as deficient in these arts as any man, but I soon found that I must increase my manure heap, or that I could not go on farming on the rotation system. The first increase I made to my manure heap was with bog earth, and I follow the practice up to the present time, as I find it the best article for all purposes of making manure that I can discover, without paying out money. I sent you a statement of my mode of making compost of bog earth three years ago, which you published in the St. John *Courier*, and I will now acquaint you with the method I follow at present.

I have the bog earth raised one year before being mixed with any thing, as muck is so long excluded from the atmosphere and sun that it requires a year's frost and sun and air to absorb the sour water properly out of it, to make room for the rich liquids it is to receive in tanks and elsewhere. I keep my cows in the barn at night, and place dry







muck behind them to absorb the liquid manure. The cow stable is cleaned out every morning, and the manure is mixed once a week with one load of rich earth to three of manure. Clay loan is the best, if it can be got, to mix as compost, as there is a retainer in clay that other earths are not possessed of. In addition to this, I have in rear of my dwelling house a tank sunk that holds thirty common cart loads of dry muck; this tank is fourteen feet long, seven feet wide, and six feet deep; it is made of three-inch plank, with hackmatack posts, and is properly canked and payed to hold water. When this tank is filled with the dry muck, there are conductors that convey all the slops from the kitchen into it, us well as all the chamber lye and the soap suds from an outside kitchen; the hearth ashes are likewise put into it in a dry state. In about a month, when the tank gets pretty well filled up with the liquid, it gets into un acid state, and in a few days will ripen and be ready for removal, which is easily known by a disagreeable odour and an increase of yellow flies. In the spring and fall of the year it requires five or six weeks to ripen, as the weather is not so hot. To prevent surface water getting in, the tank has a covering, which is easily removed when required. I can make at least one hundred cart loads of good powerful manare by this tank in a year. I have the manure removed to a large shed at the end of my cow stable, the bottom of which is in the shape of an amphitheatre, from which no liquid can escape. I add one load of earth to three loads of tank manure, which, in the fall of the year, will cover the floor of the shed about four feet deep. The manure from the cow stable is thrown on the top of this through the winter, and spread evenly over it. The roof of the manure shed is constructed so as to admit the rain freely, which washes down the liquid into the compost; but the sun and wind are excluded.

I have a piece of ground, about a quarter of an acre, which was so poor that it would give nothing but weeds. In May last I ploughed and harrowed it, and then put on six loads of tank manure, unmixed, to try its strength. I sowed it with barley, harrowed it well, and rolled it. I never saw ranker barley, and I am happy that you saw it, so that you could judge for yourself.

Therefore, tank manure is clear gain—its fertilizing ingredients always went to waste heretofore. To make this manure it requires neither horses, cows, pigs nor sheep, nor any other animal, but the mere slops of the house. Yours, &c.

MISCELLANEOUS SELECTIONS.

USEFUL HINTS FOR FARMERS.—Rake up leaves from the woods as they fall, and put them in the compost heaps. Cart headlands to the manure shed. Have a good supply of materials suitable for bedding near the stables. Do not attempt to fatten more cattle than you can fully supply with food, or they will not afterwards flourish well, even if fully supplied.—Young cattle cannot be brought up in flesh at an outlay which will pay if neglected early.—Get all the night-soil you can, and mix it with headlands, &c., for the compost heaps. Wet compost heaps with solt lye from the soap boilers, if you can get it. Use half a bushel of refuse solt to every cord of compost, to prevent re-germination of weeds, grubs, &c.

To DESTROY WITCH GRASS.—A correspondent of the New England Farmer, in describing the operations on the milk farm of Mr. Adams, of Medford, Mass., mentions the following as the method adopted to get rid of the witch grass on a field badly infested with it, and which could not be killed with the plough. "Last year the land so encumbered was fenced off by itself, several bushels of corn was sown broadcast to the acre, and ploughed in, and fifteen or twenty hogs turned into the enclosure. They immediately began to root for the corn, and with the most untiring industry turned the soil over again. A few weeks after, corn was again sown and the land ploughed, and the hogs again rooted it over. Then the operations were again repeated; and this year no witch grass is seen."

This is turning the industry of swine to good account. They will work industriously and perseveringly, either in turning over the compost heap or destroying witch grass, for a *fair compensation*.

k indusestroying WEEDS AND MANURE.—The common practice of Larying weeds and vegetable matters, under the idea of their speedy conversion into manure, is altogether an absurdity, which has been lately proved by the experiments of ingenious botanists. They do not enrich the soil, while they tend to choke it up; whereas, if

they were burned, and their ashes collected, they would not only make an excellent manure, but the earth would ultimately become clean from weeds. In dry pastures dig for water on the brow of a hill; springs are frequently nearer the surface on a height than in a vale.

VALUABLE INVENTION FOR FARMERS.—Mr. Charles Bishop, of Norwalk, Ohio, has invented an improvement in ditching machines, whereby the old spade method of ditching by manual labour is entirely thrown into the shade. His machine is worked by horse-power, and is provided with a revolving excavator, the shaft or axle of which lies in the direction of the length of the ditch. The ditch is cut of a semi-circular form, and deposits the cut clay, or other kind of excavated earth, in a box, from whence it is delivered at one side on the road by scrapers attached to the endless chain. The machine being propelled forward by a friction wheel or roller, moving in the ditch, and operated by the excavator shaft.

LIME IN OLD GARDENS.—Old garden soils which have been very liberally manured, sometimes become sour for want of an alkali, and in such cases the use of lime and even of quicklime is judicious. The decomposition of feetid matters is thus secured, and the acid products of previous decompositions are neutralized, while the soil is rendered more pulverulent, and less inclined to cake from extreme heat or moisture.—Working Farmer.

To MAKE HENS LAY.—The South Carolinian says a neighbour states, that hog's lard is the best thing he can find to mix with the dough he gives to his hens. He says that one cut of this fat as large as a walnut will set a hen to laying immediately after she has been broken up from sitting, and that, by feeding them with fat occasionally, his hens continue to lay the whole winter.

CATERPILLARS.—Burn the branches of the vine; put the ashes to soak for three or four days in water, with which water the plants affected. To destroy the green caterpillar on mignonette, or any other sort of catterpillar, slug, or worm, put some unslaked lime into a pail of water, let it stand half an hour to settle, and then pour the water on the mignonette, which will not be injured.

SNAILS.—Sprinkle common salt over the ground infested by snails, which will almost immediately destroy them.

TO PROTECT GRAIN FROM RATS.—An individual of much practical experience informs us that green "ELDER" deposited in and about the mows of hay and grain, will prove an effectual preventive against the depredations of mice and rats. These animals are frequently very destructive in their ravages; and if a remedy so simple and easy of attainment is efficacious, it deserves to be known and remembered by all. We have long known that the stalks and leaves of the common mullein will drive rats from their haunts. There is something in the odour of this plant that is as disgusting to their ratships as was the leek to ancient Pistol—they "cannot abide it."

TO GET RID OF COCKROACHES.—Mr. Samuel Tewkesbury, of Nottingham, in a letter to the Manx Sun, says, "I beg to forward you an easy, clean, and certain method of eradicating those loathsome insects from dwelling-houses. A few years ago my house was infested with cockroaches (or "clocks," as they are called here,) and I was recommended to try cucumber peelings as a remedy. I accordingly, immediately before bed-time, strewed the floor of those parts of the house most infested with the vermin with the green peel, cut not very thin from the cucumber, and got up half an hour later than usual to watch the effect. Before the expiration of that time the floor where the peel lay was completely covered with cockroaches; so much so, that the vegetable could not be seen, so voraciously were they engaged in sucking the poisonous moisture from it. I adopted the same plan the following night, but my visitors were not near so numerous—I should think not more than a fourth of the previous night. On the third night I did not discover one; but anxious to ascertain whether the heuse was quite clear of them, I examined the peel after I had Inid it down about half an hour, and perceived that it was covered with myriads of cockroaches about the size of u flea. I therefore allowed the peel to lie till morning, and from that moment I have not seen a cockroach in the house."

To REMOVE FLIES FROM ROOMS.—Take half a tea-speonful of black pepper, in powder, one tea-speonful of brown sugar, and one table-speonful of cream; mix them well together, and place them in the room, on a plate, where the flies are troublesome, and they will soon disappear.

How SHOULD CREAM BE KEPT?—This question is often asked, and is answered in different ways. We say that cream is sweeter when kept out of a damp cellar or well, than when kept in it. Cream is kept best in a cool back room above ground, or chiefly so. It ought to be stirred daily, while it is kept, otherwise mouldy particles gather on the surface of the pots.

Milk also set for cream, yields more cream when it is placed above ground than when placed in cellars, and rises sooner also. Any one may prove this by a trial of both modes. Much is said about keeping cream sweet, but cream perfectly sweet is not easily churned. It should undergo a change in order to make good butter. The act of churning produces a chemical change in the cream, and though the cream may have a sour taste, the butter is not necessarily sour-the nature of it is changed in churning,

A room above ground, on the north side of a large building, well shaded with trees, is a better place for setting cream than any damp cellar that we have ever seen. In such a room the cream will all rise in thirty-six hours.—that is, all that is really valuable.—Mussachusetts Ploughman.

ELDER OINTMENT for Burns, Cuis, Sores, &c.—After peeling off the outside of the elder, scrape off the green bark that is under, and stew it in lard till it is crisp; then strain it in a jar, and put it away to heal a blister or burn, or an old sore.

FINE CEMENT TO MEND BROKEN GLASS OR CHINA.—Garlick stamped in a stone mortar, the juice whereof, when applied to the pieces to be joined together, is the finest and strongest cement for that purpose, and will leave little or no mark, if done with care.

How TO CURE A COLD.—Of all other means of curing colds fasting is the most effectual. Let whoever has a cold eat nothing for two days, and his cold will be gone, provided he is not confined in bed, because by taking no carbon into the system by food, but consuming that surplus which caused his disease by breath, he soon carries off his disease by removing the cause. This will be found more effectual if he adds copious water drinking to protracted fasting. By the time a person has fasted one day and a night, he will experience a freedom from pain and a clearness of mind, in delightful contrast with that mental stupor and physical pain felt by colds. And how infinitely better is this method of breaking up cold than medicines !

To MAKE BOOTS WATER-PROOF.—Melt 3 oz. each of rosin and beeswax, and stir in 1 pint of boiled oil, and heat all well together; when partly cool, add 3 oz. of oil of turpentine. Apply hot with a brush.

GRAIN CARES.—Beat to a cream three eggs and one table-spoonful of brown sugar; stir in five table-spoonfals of rye flour, three of wheat flour, two of corn flour, a little salt, and milk enough to make a thin batter; bake it on a hot griddle, and butter while hot.
