Sir Wilfrid Laurier, amid cheers and shouts of applause, assured the C.M.A. at their annual banquet at the King Edward last night, that he was not to be stampeded into denouncing the treaty with Japan, The treaty was not yet two years old; it had proved largely beneficial to the farmers and manu-facturers of Canada. He would do nothing in a panic, he would investigate and perhaps appoint a commis

The banquet hall was taxed to its full capacity. Among the distinguished guests were: Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. William Paterson, minister of custome; Hon. Sydney Fisher, minister of agriculture; His Honor the Lieu-tenant-Governor, and Hon. J. P. Whittenant-Governor, and Hon. J. P. Whitney, prime minister of Ontario.

Sir Wilfrid was received with great enthusiasm and his speech was interrupted by frequent rounds of applause. In responding to the toast of "Canada and the Empire," proposed by G. T. Blackstock, K.C., in an eloquent plea for closer union between the states of the empire, the premier recalled that years ago he had attended the banquet of the C.M.A. Since then the C.M.A. had become a permanent fixture in the Dominion of Canada.
