ILLEGAL SALE OF LIQUOR.

"Spotters" at Work in East and West and Secure Convictions.

George E. Morrison, provincial officer of the license department, who has just returned from the Montreal River district, reports that in that section the officers of the department have obtained some 30 convictions for infractions of the license laws, and collected over \$2000 in fines.

BRITISH COMPANIES SCORED.

Boys' Fall Fair.

Today and Saturday—afternoon and evening—the sixth annual fall fair of the Broadview Boys' Institute will be held on their grounds, corner of Broadview and Front streets.

The fair, which is exclusively for boys' exhibits, has grown from very small beginnings to the present equal standing to the best county shows, and its many novel features make it exceedingly interesting for visitors.

The exhibits include vegetables, flowers, dogs, ponies, rabbits, pigeons, poultry, canaries and other caged birds, guinea pigs and other pet animals, collections of coins, stamps, postcards, crests, etc., natural history collections such as insects, birds mounted, pressed flowers and leaves, woods, minerals, shells, seeds, and amateur photography, freeland and mechanical drawing, water color and oil painting, penmanship, and all kinds of articles made from wood, leather, paper etc.

The entries exceed 1400. All exhibits must be either the work or property of boys under 18 years of age. The Victoria Industrial School Boys' Band, the Broadview Brass Band and the Highlanders' Pipe Band will assist in the musical features. The boys will give a burlesque circus each evening.

NEW YORK STREET RAILWAYS AND HIGH FINANCE

In the light of the revelations, past and present, regarding the ways and methods of franchise holding corporations, the objections commonly made to public ownership and operation of service monopolies never, formidable seem more than ever futile.

On Tuesday last receivers were appointed by the United States Circuit Court to administer the affairs of the New York City Railway Company, admittedly in an insolvent condition.

The story of the New York City Railway begins in 1902. At that time the Metropolitan Street Railway Company controlled all the surface lines of Manhattan Island, and had a share of \$52,000,000, on which a dividend of 7 per cent. had been paid for two years.



MAY CALL FOR NEW PLANS OF OTTAWA BUILDINGS

Is One of Knotty Problems Which Hon. Mr. Pugsley Will Have to Face.

OTTAWA, Sept. 26 (Special).—The minister of public works has a number of knotty problems to face in connection with the departmental building which is to be erected on the site of the old departmental building.

It will be a question, therefore, with the minister whether another competition open to the world should be arranged for, or following the example of the Government of Alberta, whether selected architects in different countries shall be invited to prepare plans, each being paid a stated sum for his work.

One of these methods must be adopted, and the responsibility of deciding which it shall be rest with Dr. Pugsley.

CHINESE DISCHARGED.

Jesse Reich, accused of perjury in the police court, was acquitted.

IS THIS THE SECRET?

Deputy Minister of Labor and the Hostility to Orientals.

YANCOUVER, B.C., Sept. 26.—W. M. King, deputy minister of labor, after studying the oriental labor question here, makes the surprising announcement that orientals are not employed because they are cheap, but he declares they have superseded the whites in sawmills and like work because of their sobriety and efficiency.

He found some Chinese employed in sawmills at wages of four dollars a day.

ELECTRICITY BY WIRELESS.

Wonderful Discovery is Credited to a French Inventor.

LYONS, France, Sept. 26.—The newspapers here to-day announced that a local inventor had discovered a method of transmitting electrical energy long distance by wireless telegraphy.

BRIDGES ARE DELAYED.

Three big bridges at Watybeag, Waikato and Driftwood, on the line of the T. & N. O. Railway, are delayed because the Canada Poultry Co. have failed to deliver the structural ironwork. A bridge 428 feet long at Watybeag, the material of which was signed for in February last, has not been delivered, and no definite reason can be secured from the foundry company.

Delivery was promised in July, on condition that an extension was given the company from June.

Mr. Gouinlock considers that the stand has now successfully withstood all the tests that could be asked of it, and every respect has emerged triumphantly.

WHY GRANT IS ASKED.

Police Fund is Weak and Others Are Suffered.

The committee of the police benefit fund management have asked the police commissioners to further their petition for a grant from the city council, similar to the grant to the firemen's fund. The matter met with the favor of the board and has been passed on to the mayor.

The basic request is set out in a letter to the commissioners and is the increasing demand upon the fund and the dissatisfaction arising from the grant to the firemen's fund.

It is set out that the only grant ever received by the fund was \$10,000 from the council at the time of its institution in 1882.

As against this the firemen have been given \$10,000 to start. On an emergency call \$25,000 was added by the council and a like amount added by public subscription, and lastly, a grant of \$7500 per annum for 10 years, or \$219,000 at 4 per cent.

The firemen pay only 5 per cent to support the fund, while the police assessment is 7 per cent.

The police membership, with claims against fund, is \$38, while the firemen membership is \$100,000.

The letter in no way criticises the position of the firemen's fund, but asks that a like generosity.

It is also mentioned that the city contributes about \$7000 annually to superannuated school teachers who have been subject to no assessment.

A CITY HOSPITAL.

If the hospitals insist on the city paying 70 cents a day for city patients instead of 50 cents, as at present, "it simply means," according to Dr. Sheard, "that the city must establish a hospital to take care of the sick poor."

Talks to Both Sides.

On board steamship Lusitania, Sept. 25 (10 p.m.), by wireless, via Cape Cod, Bay and Front-streets, the most congested in the city, and reports: Number of people 15,887, of whom 11,326 are adults and 4521 children. There are 2800 families and they live in 14,123 rooms. There are some large hotels in the district, and these, when the census was taken, had 1765 inmates.

Dr. Sheard thinks that the congestion is not so deplorable as described by the advocates of single tax and municipal tenement houses.

Plumbers Keep No Records.

The case against Fred Armstrong of breach of the alien labor law will continue to-day. Yesterday Gordon Ritchie testified that the master plumbers' section of the Employers' Association kept no records. He admitted having sent a copy of letters to the union plumbers, and that the question of bringing a foreign labor into Canada had been discussed, but nothing was done.

J. C. Merrick said he knew nothing of a bond for \$10,000 entered upon by six of the master plumbers, including Armstrong, for the importation of labor from the United States.

MINING DEVELOPMENT

All the Working Mines Are Operating at High Tension—Camp Notes.

COBALT, Sept. 26.—(From the Man on the Spot).—Cobalt Camp, with its working mines and associated enterprises, today gives employment to a small army of men.

The greatest activity prevails over the camp, and the properties clustering around the south end of Cobalt Lake leads one to believe that this is probably the busiest spot in the Township of Coleman.

We find not only the development of mines, but railway construction and the erection of the buildings for two concentrating plants.

The Nipissing, McKinnley-Darragh, Cobalt Lake, Silver Queen and Town Site are doing a lot of work.

The Railway has gangs at work on the construction of the Kerr Lake spur line, and also blasting the balance of the rock in the cut, where the railway management will be able to erect a new and more modern yard room.

The Murguey and Cobalt Concentrator companies have started work on the building for their respective plants.

The former will build at the south of the cut on the Town Site side of the Nipissing, 90 feet and 10 feet high, and the latter on the north side of the cut, 100 feet high.

The new concentrating plant is at work, and a few tons of concentrates are treated per day in the concentrator, three tons per stamp.

Stamps are used here instead of rolls. The equipment practically consists of a crusher, the stamps and the Willey table.

This company is intending to install another concentrator and the cement foundation has been laid.

It will have a 15-ft. capacity. Vein No. 7 is looking well and this entire property is now in shape to make steady shipments of rich ore.

At the Nipissing, it may be predicted that within the next few weeks some great advances will be made.

MANUFACTURERS' VIEWS ON THE ASIATIC PROBLEM

Would Be Unpatriotic to Impel Empire—Relief for Woolen Industry.

One of the most important and significant discussions of the whole convention of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, centred around a resolution made at yesterday morning's session expressive of the attitude of the association on the Japanese question.

The preamble set forth that it is the desire of all intelligent Canadians that this country should build up a trans-Pacific trade with Asia; that the Anglo-Japanese treaty has already done a great deal towards the development of trade with Japan and that its abrogation would be disastrous to existing relations which have to be maintained. In view of these considerations the association resolved to recommend that the Dominion Government, while giving due consideration to all interests in Canada, should hurriedly take action towards the abrogation of the treaty which stands to-day as a basis of the friendly alliance between Great Britain and Japan.

The resolution was carried by a very large majority. Apparently the remarks of J. Kennedy at a previous session and the decadence of the woolen industry had set the association to thinking deeply on the matter, for yesterday morning it was made the subject of a resolution which will be submitted to the government, wherein it is stated that some important business of the woolen industry of the Dominion has been lost during the past ten years, throwing many hundreds of work people out of employment and causing serious loss of invested capital, and asking that the government take immediate steps to fully investigate the needs of these industries and to adopt such tariff measures as will enable them to develop satisfactorily.
