As for the Liberal leadership in the House of Commons everything points to Mr. Herbert Henry Asquith, member for East Fife, and Secretary of State for the Home Department in the Gladstone-Rosebery Government, which began with Mr. Gladstone's Premiership in 1892, and ended under Lord Rosebery in 1895.

Mr. Gladstone long regarded him as his ablest leutenant in the House of Commons. Second son of the Rev. William Harcourt and grandson of a former Archbishop of York, he was born Oct. 14, 1827.

In 1851 he left Cambridge University with high honors, and three years later he was called to the bar at the Inner Temple. In 1858, he unsuccessivily concested the Kirkcaldy Burghs, and 10 years after was returned to the House of Commens for the City of Oxford in the Liberal interests.

He was elected purfessor of international City of Oxford in the Liberal interests.

He was elected professor of international law in Cambridge University in 1869, and in 1873 was appointed Solicitor-General, on which occasion he was knighted. This office he held until the resignation of Mr. Gladstone's Administration in February, 1874. When Mr. Gladstone returned to power in 1880, Sir William Harcourt was nominated Secretary of State for the Home Department.

on going down to Oxford for re-election, he was defeated by his Conservative opponent, but at this juncture Mr. Plimsoll, member for Derby, then a sure Liberal seat, resigned by accepting the Chiltern hundreds, whereupon Mr. Harcourt was chosen one of the representatives of that borough. He went out of office with his party in June, 1885, but on the return of the Liberals to power in January of the following year, he was made Chanzellor of the Exchequer. He was re-elected for Derby at the general elections of 1885 and 1886.

Mr. Harcourt went out of office again on the downfall of the Gladstone Government in July, 1886, but returned to it as Chancellor of the Exchequer in August, 1892, when Mr. Gladstone reassumed power and held this portfolio throughout the life of the Gladstone-Rosebery Government, which fell in June, 1895. In the general election of 1895 Mr. Harcourt was returned for West Monmouthshire.

Thornton of New York, Can Go Up Head as the Boss Fakir.

HE WORKED PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

Even Got an Audience With the Pope, When He Disclosed His Scheme-How He Was Caught.

Washington, Dec. 13.—The most audacious nterprise for many years is that of Amasa Thornton, who went to Rome a few weeks ago, and asked the Pope to appoint him trustee of all the church property in the Philippine Islands, which amounts to more than \$200,000,000. He has been exposed as an impostor, but not until he gave the church authorities in this country a revere ervous shock, and hurried Archbishop Keane back to Rome from a much-needed and much-relished vacation. Thornton is not even a Catholic. He is a ward politiclan of New York, with a reputation for originality and a thirst for fame. He has made politics his business for several years, and until recently was an active member of Mr. Platt's machine, but he had a fallof Mr. Platt's machine, but he had a falling out with the "easy boss," and is no longer admitted to his confidence. Mr. Thornton advertises himself as a lawyer, but no one has seen him in court for many years. He has had considerable experience as a lobbyist around the New York City Hall and Capitol at Albany, and has occasionally appeared in Washington in the interest of legislation before Congress or centracts in the departments. One of the New York Congressmen renarked his afterneon that Thornton was "a man of mysterious habits, and no visible means of support," and suggested his mission to Rome was a speculative enterprise. If he failed to be appointed trustee 'e would at least have the satisfaction of getting his name in the newspapers.

He Went to White House.

A few weeks ago Mr. Thornton called at the White House and was given an audience on the supposition that he was a genuine agent of the Catholic Church. He went to the State Department, where, at the request of Senator Murphy, he was given the ordinary letter of introduction to Ministers and Consuls abroad, which is furnished to American travelers upon application from Senators and Representatives. He appears to have used this letter to secure an interview with Archbishop Corrigan, who gave him credentials to Cardinal Rampolla upon the Supposition that he was an agent of the Government. Thus he shrewdly played "both ends against the middle," is sporting men say. He also called at the Apostolic Legation in this city, but did not obtain any encouragement. On the contrary, he excited some suspicion, but was not considered a person of sufficient consequence to be mentioned in communications to the authorities at Rome.

REIGN OF TERROR IN PEKIN. The Story That the Emperor is Being Poisoned Corroborated.

Moscow, Dec. 13 .- The Moscow Board of Tea Merchants has received a coblegram from its correspondents in China telling of the reign of terror in Pekin. Arrests are of daily occurrence, and suspected sympathizers with the Emperor's reform ideas are banished when they are not summarily executed. According to this despatch Kuang-Hsu, though de facto emperor, is ailing and it is thought is suffering from the administration of some slow-acting poison. The representatives of the powers thus far have been unable to check the cruelties of the Empress Dowager or to mitigate her misrule.

Philadelphia, Dec. 13.—Three vessels sailing from this port before the big gale of two weeks ago have not been heard from, and are believed to have been lost. They are the schooners Howard H. Hanscomb for Providence, the James B. Pace for Boston and the Ida H. Mathis for Lynn. The four-master schooner Mathias Borda, Capt. Ezra Norton, which sailed Nov. 26 from Portsmouth, N.H., for Philadelphia, is believed to have foundered, with all hands. The schooner City of Augusta, from Boston to this port, is also missing.

The Borda carried a crew of nine men, the Hanscomb nine men, the Pace eight men, the Mathias seven men and the City of Augusta eight men, involving in all the sacrifice of 41 lives. Probably Been Lost.

Petitions were forwarded to the Federal Government, urging the necessity of giving prompt assistance to the railway bridge at or near Quebec, and of transferring the terminus of the Intercolonial Railway to Quebec when the bridge is completed.

CORTES MAY BE DISSOLVED

Premier Sagasta Said to Be Con--No Commercial Treaty Between

Madrid. Dec. 13.-It is asserted here that the Premier, Senor Sagasta, will obtain a royal decree dissolving the chambers before ratification of the peace treaty. The i-official Correo announces that Senor asta, before asking the Cortes to ratify treaty, will confer with Senor Montero A. President of the Spanish Commission.

The past 11 months \$80,069,800, and exports decreased \$29,046,000. the treaty, will confer with Senor Montero Mos. President of the Spanish Commission. SPANIARDS GLAD TO HAVE PEACE.

A General Feeling of Relief Has Followed the Signing of the Treaty at Paris.

Madrid, Dec. 13.—The news that the peace treaty at last has been signed is a great releast to the whole nation. Since it first became evident that Spain had no alternative but to yield all, the general feeling has been one of impatience to have the peace negotiations over with. There is much difference of opinion here as to the manner in which Montero Rios and his colleagues have conducted the negotiations. The Cortes will meet Jan. 1 to consider the indemnification of the Cabiner for the cession of the Philippine Islands.

The Spanish soldiers and Government functionaries in the Philippine Archipeiago are to be brought home immediately. The Government is inclined to approve the acts of Capt.-Gen. Rios, apart from his failure to respond to orders for evacuation. The Government's fear of a military coup d'etat is plainly seen in the orders which have been issued to the police to keep close watch upon all generals who have returned and may return from Cuba.

The American-Canadian Commission held a separate meeting and adjourned until Friday. The American members then held as separate meeting and adjourned till to day.

No Treaty for a While.

Washington, Dec. 13.—For some time to come the United States and Spain must get along without any treaty to regulate commerce between the two countries. An effort was made at Paris to secure an arrangement with the Spanish Commissioners looking to the revival of the old treaties until they could be replaced by others, but this having failed, no negotiations for new commercial treaties would be undertaken before ratification of the peace treaty.

built a great circular wall of granite and brick and many feet in thickness. This was filled with eight million gallons of water. The tank was surported by eight great steel uprights, 212 feet high. The water in the pit fitting against the tank made it "gas tight." A gang of men were at work under a foreman, Elling the pit with water to make the first "water test." The great tank, with a gas capacity of 3,600,000 cubic feet, and costing \$300,000, seemed to withstand the test well. The representatives of the company and the foreman in charge were congratulating themselves upon the success of the work. The laborers were even beginning to gather up their tools to knock off. There were many people on the streets, and crowded street cars were coming and going. Fifty or more men in the factory adjoining were finishing up their tasks.

Then, suddenly, and without a moment's warning, came an awful crash. The men below had scarcely time to fly from beneath the failing walls ere they were picked up by the mass of rolling water and hurled hundreds of feet away. Into the basement, the first and second floors of factories and tenements rushed the angry floods, and with them went death and destruction.

men were washed out of the flats from the first floors and almost drowned.

Mary Anne O'Connell and her little 4year-old sister, Catherine, were seated at the front window on the second floor of No. 335 Avenue A. Before they could turn to flee a rush of water struck them both, smashing them through the door and carrying them half a block distant. Both were terribly injured, the little one perhaps fatally.

Henry Fuldner was taken up bodily and carried almost to 21st-street. His son was also carried out of his office by the water, but was caught in the debris, and, but for the timely arrival of some workmen with axes, he would have been drowned.

Andrew Wendt, one of the killed, was near the base of the tank when it collapsed. He was caught by the rushing waters and borne an almost incredible distance, His mangled and almost naked body was found against an elevated railroad pillar at 21st-street and First-avenue, more than a block away.

The work was exceptionally hard, because of the freezing of the water, and the men moved about covered with ice. The work of digging for the bodies was abandoned later in the night, as it was deemed best to wait for daylight owing to the danger of the walls falling.






