PRESIDENT KRUGER IS COMING DOWN.

Continued from Page 1. South Africa. In the meanwhile Great Britain is keeping up a clamor of arms for the domestic purpose of quelling the demands for activity and hastening the Boers.

Arms From Italy. London, July 9.—A special despatch from Rome says that the German steamer Reconquista has sailed from Naples with 10,000 rifles, 500 tons of war material and 500 mules for the Transvaal.

KRUGER MUST. The situation has not changed and will not change until Milner's Claims are Granted.

New York, July 9.—Henry Norman, in cableing The Times, says: "President Kruger has begun to make expressions, but it is impossible to tell whether his latest scheme gives the franchise to the Uitlanders after five, seven or nine years. In any case, it does not approach what Sir Alfred Milner called the 'red line'.

Must Give a Guarantee Also. "My belief is that unless within a few days Kruger not only accepts the British demands but also gives satisfactory guarantees that they will be carried out to a considerable proportion of the first Army Corps, now stationed at Adersfort, will be embarked, and the other military steps mentioned last week will be taken.

Only One Outcome Possible. "Students of the situation from a military point of view should keep their eyes upon Letting's Neck. This is the strategic point at which the railway runs in the tunnel between the Cape State and the Transvaal. The last plan on which the territory beyond the tunnel is Charlesstone, and the practical advance on the Cape side would be made from here; therefore, the Cape will be given no opportunity to seize or blow up this strategic tunnel. Only one outcome is possible."

Aburdly Insufficient. London, July 9.—According to the Johannesburg correspondent of The Daily Mail, the Outlanders regard the Transvaal Government's proposals as "aburdly insufficient."

TWO OPINIONS. Schreiner Looks for a Settlement, But Sir Gordon Sprigg Says Returns are Inadequate.

Cape Town, July 9.—The Hon. W. P. Schreiner, Prime Minister of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, says the Cape Government regards the Transvaal reform proposals as adequate and calculated to ensure a permanent settlement.

Kruger Dailying to Gain Time. London, July 10.—All the despatches from Cape Town and Johannesburg of the week in papers concern to the complexity and uncertainty of the Boer proposals, and the fact that the Outlanders are profoundly dissatisfied with the Cape proposals.

ADVANCE TORONTO.

When the next census is taken Toronto will prove to be a city of goodly proportions. The population beyond doubt will be shown to be well in excess of two hundred thousand, notwithstanding that it suits a certain stripe of politicians at the present juncture to put it at a good deal less. It is important as are the growth in population, the material development of the city, are not the only elements that have to be taken into account in considering the future of the city. As residents of its political capital and trade centre, we owe the province and the nation the duty of words, it is our duty to be in the front of the line. A free ferry and such conveniences are of local import. The wider duty lies in extending the system of transportation, in making the city take on the appearance of a well-to-do and thriving metropolis, in centering within its confines every possible accommodation that can be required by the most extensive movements, and in providing perfect facilities for trade and commerce. Whenever we are deficient in any of these things we are deficient in duty, not alone to ourselves, but to the province and to the country at large. Our weakness is a very common and ordinary one. We are too prone to extravagance, both in time and money, in dealing with the lesser and local matters of civic concern, and too slow and too hesitating in seizing the larger opportunities that offer. In no single branch of civic control have we kept pace with the growth of the population and the progress of the material interests of the city. Great schemes have been mooted, much discussed and then allowed to become only a memory. Lesser schemes have been engaged the attention of the Council during many weeks, and have then been abandoned. Money has been frittered away in numberless vain things, in small amounts, but in the end the encouragement of enterprises either worthy or unworthy, which should have been left to the carrying out of private sources. Toronto has got beyond small matters, and now requires to husband its revenue to the most judiciously, and to aid in the carrying out of undertakings that will benefit not a class or a section but the whole. In the quarters of the old City Hall it was perhaps impossible to break entirely away from old associations, from ancient traditions, from many customs and partial mania. It is now, however, and imposing building on Queen-street, we shall at least hope for better things, for a larger grasp of the situation, for an improved appreciation of the position of the city. In one or two instances recently we have noted signs of improvement. It did not take years to settle the deal with the Sunlight Soap people, nor did it take weeks to replace the building lately destroyed by fire on the Exhibition grounds. No practical step has yet been taken to expend the \$100,000 voted by the people for expenditure on market improvements; neither has anything definite been done towards increasing the facilities of our growing live stock trade; but, as we have seen, in other parts of the former instances has filled us with expectation that with the taking possession of the new civic pile an era of greater municipal energy will set in.

SLAVE TO PLOCARPINE.

Harlem Druggist Has Acquired a Habit, Said to Be Unique, for the Peculiar Drug. New York, July 8.—Thomas Fraser, a druggist, has acquired a unique habit, which, according to the physicians in Harlem Hospital, has no known parallel. Eight years ago he was treated for Bright's disease in St. Luke's Hospital, where he received injections of pilocarpine, which at times with morphia and cocaine. After he was discharged he continued the use of the drug. He was taken to Harlem Hospital yesterday suffering from its effects. Dr. Fraser, who is treating him, said last night: "We find that Fraser is a slave to the drug. He is unable to do anything without the aid of pilocarpine. His arm is full of sores made by the needles he requires an injection of pilocarpine. Half an hour after the injection he must take two grains of morphia, and half an hour later three-quarters of a grain of cocaine. The physician has acquired the pilocarpine habit. The drug pilocarpine when taken inwardly constricts the blood vessels."

FOR A NATIONAL MUSEUM.

The Laurier Government Seems to Have Money to Burn—Here Goes \$500,000. Ottawa, July 9.—The supplementary estimate to the appropriation of \$500,000 towards the construction of a national museum in the grounds surrounding the Parliament buildings. GOLD STANDARD FOR INDIA.

Blue Book Announces That There Will Be No Reversion to a Silver Standard.

AN UNRESTRICTED GOLD COINAGE.

British Sovereign as Legal Tender and the Rupee Rate to Be Fixed at 16 Pence. London, July 8.—The report of the Parliamentary Committee on Indian Currency, just issued in the form of a blue book, approves the decision of the Government not to revert to silver standard. It argues that it would be impossible to maintain the status quo permanently, and, therefore, recommends that the rupee should be introduced as a legal tender, and advises that the Indian rupee be allowed to coinage without restriction, on the same terms as the Australian pound. Finally, by a majority of votes, the committee recommends fixing the rupee rate at 16 pence. The report says, in conclusion, that the establishment of a gold standard is of paramount importance to the material interests of India, not only to promote extending trade, but to encourage the influx of capital.

ANOTHER MEDICAL TRIUMPH.

German Investigators Claim to Have Made a New and Wonderful Discovery in the Prevention of Disease. London, July 8.—An important discovery which is likely to bring about a revolution in the methods of treating disease has just been published by Professors Rudolph Krumm and Oscar Lowy. It is a discovery which, if it is not entirely new, is certainly a great advance on what is known technically as the "Bacillus anthracis," a ferment which, when inoculated into animals, is infected with the germs of anthrax or spenic fever, is able to entirely neutralize the latter's harmful effects. The hope is also held out that by "improving the methods of producing immunity from disease, human and animal ailments may in the future obtain protection from every species of natural infection. The only way to obtain the ferments of certain disease-producing organisms in the present state of knowledge is to introduce them harmlessly into the human body."

The new discovery appears to form a natural sequel to the method of treating diphtheria by means of the so-called "antitoxic serum" which was introduced in 1894, and has been so successful during the past five years. According to statistics in a recent issue of the "British Medical Journal" the serum was used in 1907 cases where the mortality was more than double, viz., 34 per cent. If the new method of treatment be as useful in coping with typhoid and plague as it is in diphtheria, it will be a great advance on the methods of the late M. Pasteur, to whose genius the modern methods of therapeutics owe so much. For in 1881 he showed that inoculating harmless germs along with the anthrax microbe the latter's virulence was completely averted. This discovery, taken in conjunction with the others, opens out a new vista for possibilities in the treatment of disease. After all, the time sung by the poet: when all diseases will be "quenched by science," may not be so hopelessly far away.

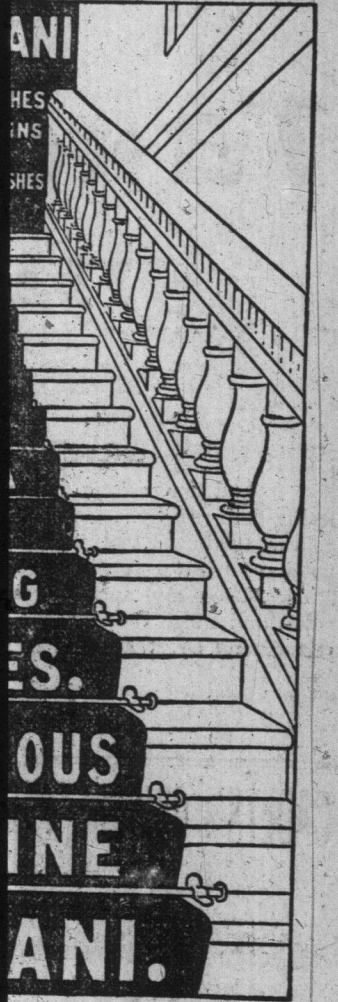
