TWO TORONTO BOYS BADLY HURT THEIR VALUABLE HORSES KILLED

Mounted Riflemen Were Racing, and a Party Riding From Opposite Direction Met Them—Little Building Obstructed View and Horses Came Together Head to Head

Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont., June 20.—(Special.)—A sad accident, resulting in serious injury to S. H. Sutton and Bert Reid, occurred this evening. While the sports were in progress, a number of soldiers, mounted on the track adjacent to Fort George. They were galloping fast, and, in their excitement, and with their heads lowered to their knees, they did not see several other riders, who were approaching at a mad gallop in an opposite direction, on the other side of a small building, which partially hid them from view. Neither saw the other until too late, when one yelled "Look out!" Both swerved their horses, but, in the excitement, one turned his to the wrong side, and the two horses met head to head. Their necks were broken, and both instantly killed.

THE REPORTS ARE CONFUSING BOTH SIDES EXPRESS CONFIDENCE

Canadian Pacific Officials Claim the Strike is About on Its Last Legs, While the Leaders of the Movement Declare that the Battle Has Just Begun—Circular Sent Out by Mr. Shaughnessy Ignored by Toronto Strikers.

The circular sent out by President Shaughnessy of the Canadian Pacific Railway to the striking trackmen, calling on them to carefully consider the situation "before fully abandoning their occupations," reached the local strikers yesterday morning. It had little effect on the men in Toronto, according to what they say. Chairman Wilkinson of the strikers' committee, who asked for and how the circular was received by the men, said: "We simply paid no attention to it. We gave it no thought whatever."

The strikers were in a jubilant mood yesterday, having received some highly encouraging reports from various points on the system as to the progress of the strike. In order to find out the actual state of affairs on the line from Toronto to Orangeville a local striker was sent out this morning. The G.P.R. representative wired the following from Orangeville last night: "I am attending meeting of boys here this afternoon. Almost sold on Toronto, Grey and Bruce section, including Teasdale."

Another man was sent up to London, but up to last night no message had been received from him.

Early in the day the strikers received the following message from the headquarters at Montreal: "Reports received from various points on the system indicate that we have almost made a clean sweep. I do not believe there are 200 men at work on the whole system. The G.P.R. is about over here." Vice-President McNellie, "It has only begun," President Wilson. "You pay your money and you take your choice."

The following message from the president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was received by the maintenance of way employees yesterday, including those who had quit work:

"I have been the circuit issued by the operating officers to the trackmen this afternoon, and, therefore, feel it a duty to urge the men, many of whom have been in the company's service for several years, to consider the situation and to carefully and fully abandoning their occupations. The committee had an interview with me, at which I heard and gave the gravest attention to everything advanced in the interest of their fellow workmen. There has been the slightest warrant for concessions beyond those already made by the company's officers, matters would not be considered."

"The unscrupulous British general," the paper adds, "regardless of his pledge of honor, broke his parole and escaped. He did not, however, profit by his faithlessness, for before he had got within touch of the British lines, the Boers recaptured him, and brought him back to General Botha."

CABINET SHUFFLE COMING

Premier Ross Eager for One Change, Desires Another and Contemplates a Third.

HARCOURT SURROGATE REGISTRAR

Attorney-General to Make Way for Another—Hon. John Dryden to Return to the Farm.

Removal of an Ontario cabinet shuffle are becoming more persistent. Laborers close to the government admit that Premier Ross is eager to make one change, desires another and contemplates a third.

Union Miners, Who Are on Strike, Tried to Enter Pits Where Non-Unionists Worked.

ARMED GUARDS BARRED THE WAY

Superintendent of the Mine Ordered the Guards to Fire—Two Men Fatally Shot

Mattawan, W. Va., June 20.—Today several hundred union miners who were on strike marched in a body against the Marquette mines of this place, where non-union men were working. They tried to effect an entrance, but the operators, with 20 guards armed with Winchester rifles, blocked the entrance. The non-union miners were headed by Superintendent Lambert, and when the strikers warned him he persisted in their attempt to enter the mine. They were fired upon by the guards, and several were killed. The strikers were driven back, and the mine was closed. The strikers are collecting to get entrance to the mine. Serious trouble is expected if they again try to effect an entrance to the Marquette mines. Most of the Signatories Powers, Including the U.S., Have Accepted Invitation

Berne, June 20.—The President, M. P. Reber, announced today at a meeting of the Bundesrat, that most of the signatories, including the United States, had accepted an invitation to a conference on the revision of the Geneva Convention. He hoped the delegates would meet in 1902.

The Geneva convention neutralizes and exempts far as possible from the usual duties of war, all persons, buildings, vehicles, etc., devoted to the care of the wounded and sick.

Difficulties in the Way.

Washington, June 20.—The City Council may not be able to enter into an agreement with Andrew Carnegie for the erection of the proposed \$200,000 public library for nearly a year. 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MRS. BARKER CONTRADICTED

Rev. Mr. Keller Flatly Denies Ever Having Borrowed Money From the Woman, as Stated.

MANY QUESTIONS DISALLOWED

New York, June 20.—To-day's session of the trial of Thomas G. Barker in Jersey City for assault with intent to kill the Rev. John Keller in Arlington, N.J., on Feb. 8 last, began with the expectation that the case would be given to the jury before night.

County Prosecutor Erwin at the opening of court called the attention of Judge Blair, who presides at the trial, to the publication of what purported to be a detailed account by Mrs. Barker of the alleged assault upon her by the Rev. Mr. Keller.

Witness was then asked concerning each item of alleged borrowed money, and in each case he answered that he had not borrowed the sum mentioned. He said that he had never owed Mrs. Barker any money at any time.

What Mrs. Sands Said. Mrs. Elias M. Sands, with whom Mr. Keller boarded, was called by the prosecutor. The defence objected to her testifying as to Mrs. Keller's character, because his character had not been attacked by the defence.

Something New in Railways. Traffic Manager Who Will Divorce Traffic From the Other Affairs of the Roads.

San Francisco, June 20.—J. C. Stubbs, vice-president of the Southern Pacific, who has been made traffic manager of the Harbinger Railway interests, says his duty will be to divorce the traffic of the lines from the other affairs of the roads.
