HE FUTURE OF THE CANADIAN PACIFIC.

'An official copy of the report of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company for the year ending June 30, 1902, has reached The World office, and a magnificent report it is. Gross earnings of \$37,500,000, net earnings of \$14,000,000, and a clear surplus of nearly \$8,000,000. not including a revenue of \$4,500,000 from land sales, certainly constitute a showing that must cause to water the mouths of all holders of C.P.R. stock. With such a brilliant balance sheet as the company displays it is no wonder the bulls have been able in a few months' time to advance the price of the common shares from below 90 to above 140. No wonder, in short, that the stock has experienced a remarkable boom, and that there appear to be elements of a further boom in it yet.

Great is the Canadian Pacific Railway. The World was one of the first in the country to point out its immense possibilities, and we don't believe that these possibilities are half realized by most people yet. When we take into consideration the present rapid development of the Dominion we cannot but extend the future of the road beyond the limits that we had previously conceded it-almost unlimited tho those limits were.

But at this stage of the C.P.R.'s abundant prosperity The World would make bold to make one or two suggestions which we think vital to the continued success of its system.

When the C.P.R. was built and when the contract was made between the government and the syndicate a certain standard for the road was set out in the contract. It was in substance to be a road of the average railway equipment of those days. But that was 25 years ago and since that time railroading has been enormously developed, and an up-to-standard example of the modern American railroad to-day is the New York Central or the Pennsylwania railroad. Or, to come nearer home, the G.T.R. is the best road we have in Canada as far as standard is concerned, and the Grand Trunk everybody knows has been spending enormous sums of money in late years and at the present time to bring its road and equipment up to what we will call for short, the 20th century standard. This means that the efficient railroad of to-day is one that has spent in actual cost of its roadbed and equipment a sum of money ranging from \$50,000 to \$100,000 per mile, a road that has the very best ballast, the very best kind of steel rails, the very best kind of steel bridges, has double tracking, and above all has rolling stock of this century. And when we speak of rolling stock we include engines and cars of all kinds. For instance, on the New York Central the other day one of the modern locomotives on that system drew over 100 loaded cars with ease. As we said before, the Grand Trunk is reconstructing its entire system on the 20th century basis. It has been spending enormous sums of money in straightening out the curves and cutting down the grades between here and Port Hope. It has double-tracked the entire main line in Ontario, and it has now under construction, we are told, a scheme which will do away with the worst of all the grades on the system, namely, the one between Toronto and Port Union, known as the Scarboro grade. Everything in the way of railroad equipment has changed in the present century or is about to change, and the progressive railroad must be a 20th century one, not one of the 19th century. The Canadian Pacific Railway is absolutely not a 20th century railroad, and is not up to modern American standards. The question we propose to ask the Canadian Pacific is, what do they propose doing in the way of modernizing that great railway system? They have received enormous grants from the Canadian people in the way of land and cash subsidies, they have received special privileges, they are in fact in partnership with the government and the people of Canada for the establishment and maintenance of a trans-continental system. The Canadian Northwest is proving to be possessed of almost unlimited resources from an agricultural standpoint. British Columbia and our possessions on the Pacific ocean promise to develop enormous commercial relations with Asia, Australia and all the other side of the Pacific ocean. The Canadian east is growing in importance, and Canada is certainly becoming a great power on the North American continent, and the Canadian people of world-wide influence. All this being the case the Canadian Pacific must be made a railroad up to the new standard and worthy of the country and of the people, who are practically in partnership with it. True, the earnings of the road could stand dividends higher than 5 per cent. per annum, and the enormous and growing receipts from the land sales could be easily distributed among the shareholders. But we do not take such a course to be in the true interests of the shareholders, or in the true interests of the country. What is required is a clear and distinct statement from the directors and from the shareholders that they intend to modernize the Canadian Pacific by reconstructing on the lines of the 20th century standard of American railroad, that they intend to devote all the enormous revenue of the road to that end, that they intend to double-track it, to steel-bridge it, to cut out all the curves where possible that can be cut out, and cut down all the grades at the earliest possible moment, that they intend to have the rolling stock modernized, and especially the motive power made modern, and that they will not rest content until there is at least a double-track line from the Pacific to the Atlantic, connecting all the great Canadian cities and ports and giving an outlet to all the various sections of Canadian industry to the Atlantic or to the Pacific, as the moment may call for. The World trusts that the directors and shareholders will be satisfied with a 5 per cent. dividend until all the reforms in this direction can be carried out, and that the public, who are inclined to speculate in this stock, will come to see that the present dividends ought not to be exceeded as long as the necessities of the road demand so much in the way of improvements. Were the directors of the Canadian Pacific to come out now and make a clear cut declaration on the above lines, a great impetus would be given to everything in Canada. Outside nations and our own people would come to see that we had in this country a high standard of railroad development, that we intended to make our great national highway as good as any other on the continent, and one result of this would be that an enormous impetus would be given to the iron and steel industry in this country, to the steel rail industry in this country, to the car building industry, and the motive power industry. We would have shops scattered all over the country for the construction of cars and locomotives, and we would have rolling mills started in this country on a scale not hitherto contemplated, and every other road in the country, the G. T.R. included, would have to follow suit, and a new impetus and a new measure of prosperity would come to this country in a way never dreamed of by those who had the courage and who had the enterprise to undertake the construction of the Canadian Pacific under the most discouraging circumstances.
