# PREMIER ROSS DENOUNCES CHAMBERLAIN'S POLICY

## THREE ACCUSATIONS AGAINST GOVERNMENT BROUGHT BY LIBERAL OF THE OLD SCHOOL.

Pembroke, Dec. 11.—(Staff Special.)—Premier Ross entered North Renfrew today. At last he considers that it is entitled to personal recognition. His visit to the county town will not be forgotten by him. It began well. He drove seven miles from Cobden in an open sleigh in the teeth of a biting wind to the village of Beaufort, where he spoke in the afternoon. A further 10 mile drive brought him to Pembroke, where the principal meeting was held. The physical exertion needed to drive the 23 miles might easily have deterred a much younger man, while the temerity evinced by the Premier in facing the electors whom he has kept out of representation for 500 days was a peculiarly Ross brand.

In the afternoon he said that no election of North Renfrew had been contemplated of the riding being left vacant. He could not repeat the statement at night, for a sensation was sprung when James Findlay, ex-M.P., a retired farmer of Beaufort and Liberal of the old school, protested against the disfranchisement of a whole constituency and accused the Ross government of gross corruption and held the Premier personally responsible for the failure of the referendum to have results. The meeting was under the auspices of the Reform Association of North Renfrew, and was held in the town hall. The hall was filled. Hundreds stood up in the aisles and a hundred found standing room on the floor. The Premier, who felt, excellent voice and spoke with rare effect, in spite of the surprise that the night brought. Washington, Dec. 11.—There were two speeches in the United States Senate to-day on the Cuban reciprocity bill. One of them by a Democrat in support of the bill, and the other by a republican in opposition to it. The opposing speech was made by Mr. Boyd (Cal.), who contended that the United States was under no obligation to give further aid to Cuba, and especially when to do so, we must pursue a course injurious to our own industry. Mr. McCready (Ky.) made his maiden speech in the Senate, and supported the bill as in line with our past magnanimous course towards Cuba, and especially because he believed it to be a step towards the reform and self-governance of Cuba. He referred to the splendid work done by the United States in liberating Cuba from Spanish domination, and said: "We must not mar our great record of magnanimity, of generosity, but must go on and insure to Cuba commercial prosperity and financial success."






