General Stoessel Said to Have Been Willing to Surrender the Fortress as Far Back as Early Last August.

London, Jan. 11 .- The correspondent at Port Arthur of The Daily Mail says that on Jan. 8 twenty Japanese were killed by the explosion of a contact mine inside the forts, and two mines in the town also exploded.

The Daily Telegraph's Port Arthur correspondent says that, according to stories by prisoners, the real defender of the fortress was Major-General Kondratenko, commander of the 7th East Siberian Rifle Brigade (who was killed Dec. 15), and that had he lived it is probable the fortress would not have surrendered.

Gen. Stoessel, the correspondent adds, was inclined to surrender as early as last August. The garrison, he con-cluded included 10,000 Poles, who were lifferent fighters.





The appointing of a permanent comnission to deal with the level crossing problem in Ontario comes within the

lature's jurisdiction. This was the substance of a letter from City Counsel Fullerton, read at yesterday afternoon's session of the board of trade council. The letter accompanied

yesterday afternoon's session of the board of trade council. The letter accompanied a communication from Mayor Urquhart, in which the latter, after expressing his full accord with the action of the board's committee, stated that he was securing Mr. Fullerton's opinion. The mayor stated therein his agreement with the view that there should be established some permanent plan for doing away with level crossings.

The enclosure from the city solicitor was rather of an interesting character, inasmuch as it contained the expression of legal opinion, that application should more properly be made to the Dominion parliament than to the local legislature. Mr. Fullerton took his stand under paragraph A, sub-section 10, of section 92 of the B.N.A. Act, which sets forth that railways connecting a province with any other or others, or extending beyond the limits of the province are excepted from the exclusive jurisdiction of the provincial legislature, and are within paragraph 29, section 91, and, therefore, within the legislative authority of the Dominion parliament. "I am of opinion," concluded Mr. Fullerton, "that appointments should be made and the jurisdiction defined by the parliament of Canada."

The annual election of the board's officers will be held before the end of the month. The incoming council, it is stated, will push the level crossing agitation to the utmost. These new members were yesterday added to the board: William B. Brown, proposed by David Plewes, jr., and J. S. Meyers by R. L. D. Taylor.





the year just closed the shipments had fullen to 2.114,659, at a value of \$14,379,545, or an average price per box of \$6.80. The figures quoted indicate that the loss to the shippers is not so much owing to the quantity as to the price obtained. The season of 1904 in the Province of Ontario was an ideal one for the dairy interest in many respects. The continued moisture thruout the summer, coupled with the ccol temperature, was especially favorable for a large production. In the month of May cheese manufactured in the Province of Quebec sold as low as 61-2 c. per b., but it is questionable if at any time this low figure was reached in the Province of Ontario.

A remarkable feature of the dairy situation last summer was the satisfactory and uniformly steady prices prevailing for butter. In the City of Toronto the highest grade of bo'h dairy and creamery butter was eagerly sought of the content of the province of the content of the content

Toronto the highest grade of bo'h dalry and creamery butter was eagely sought after and commanded splendid prices. And this is true of every large centre of trade in Canada. It is in the inferior article that the excess of supply over demand occurs, and in no line of industry is this more noticeable than in that of butter and cheese. The public are very discriminating and the individual butter maker can easily make or mar his career. That the season of 1904 has proved unprofitable alike to the maker and shipper of cheese is unfortunate, but it is one of the vicissitudes of trade. At the present time indications favor higher prices before the advent

favor higher prices before the advent of new cheese. Vermin on Hogs.

Hogs often suffer very much from vermin. Lice are introduced from neighboring herds, and the losses in feeding are often severe especially amneighboring herds, and the losses in feeding are often severe, especially among young pigs, when death is sometimes a secondary if not an immediate result. When very numerous, lice are a very serious drain on vitality, fattening is prevented, and in case of exposure to disease the lousy hogs are much more liable to contract and succumb to it.

Vermin are most common around the cars, inside the legs and in the folds of low, on track at Toronto. the skin on the jowl, sides and flanks.

In light and isolated cases they may be destroyed by washing the hogs. In semilling. Peas-Peas, 67c to 68c, high freight, for vere cases, however—especially where the whole herd is affected, thoro spray-ing or dipping should be reso ted to. In Rye-Quoted at about 75c to 76c outside. In nearly all cases, if a sow is not bred until she is a year old, she will be better developed and produce better results.


