





Equinoctial Storms Are Myth Says Weather Bureau Expert

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28—"Equinoctial storms" are a myth and have no standing in meteorology. They are "line squalls."

"There is no maximum of storm frequency, according to statistics, either in this country or in Europe, close to the date of either equinox," according to the American Nature Association which publishes an extended statement on the point in Nature Magazine by C. F. Talman, of the United States Weather Bureau.

"Of course in the long run many storms do occur about these dates, just as they occur at all other times," the writer points out, "but thers is no scientific reason for supposing their occurrence can be connected in any way with the sun's passage over what the schoolboy described as a 'managerie lion running around the earth."
