He admitted that France was entitled to security, but said that the only difference of opinion was regarding methods. If armaments were piled up as before the war, then the same catastrophe was inevitable. Until other peoples reduced armaments Great Britain could not put herself in a weak position, but when there was some sort of common mind among the European peoples, the chance for the reduction of armaments would come.

The Government believed in the idea of a large entente or concert of Europe—it might even be called a League of Nations—a practical, organized body, which would result in security. He was not going to suggest any breach in the continuity of policy by which Great Britain had been working for her own defence, but that did not necessarily mean the piling up of armaments. ground as the Prime Minister in the

Marquis Curzon, former Foreign Secretary, who followed Viscount Haldane, admitted that there was no trace of socialism in Haldane's speech, and the apprehension with which he had viewed the formation of a Labor Government had been sensibly relieved. He admitted also that Lord Haldane had enunciated the soundest principles on the question of disarmament. Lord Curzon, however, declared that the recognition of Russia without guarantees was the greatest mistake in the world.

The House of Lords presented an unwonted, curious appearance, with only a handful of peers on the Government benches. Lord Birkenhead made an amusing speech, criticizing the Labor peers and the Labor policy. Paris Somewhat Skeptical

ATTACK IS RENEWED

Maddened Mobs of Infuriated Citizens Chase After

Separatists-49 Dead. BY CARL D. GROAT

(British United Press.) Berlin, Feb. 13. - Bloc ighting has broken out between Separatists and Germans loyal to the Reich in Pirmasens, Bavarian Palatinate, according despatches received here today. Herr Schwab, Separatist leader, was lynched by a mob of infuri-

Twenty of Schwab's followers were burned to death in the city hall. The Separatists had taken refuge in the building, which was stormed by the loyal Germans and set on fire.

ated loyal Germans.

Maddened mobs of infuriated citizens continued to hunt down Separatists throughout Pirmasens today.

Wherever ferreted out, the Separatists were killed or badly beaten. Despatches received here up to noon said a total of 49 were known to be dead at that hour. The Separatists had 28 killed and the citizens 21.

Start Concerted Attack. Trouble began late yesterday, when citizens of Pirmasens, reinforced by the fire department, started a concerted the fire department, started a concerted attack on Separatists. Provided with plentiful supplies of ammunition, the Separatists rallied and fired heavy volleys, wounding many of the attackers, who were armed with rifles, picks, shovels and axes.

The Separatists barricaded themselves in the City Hall, a grim fortress like an old castle. They held off the attackers until the citizenry, heavily reinforced with city guards, renewed the attack with vicious energy.

Firemen flung ladders against the City Hall and climbed up in face of Separatist fighting as they attacked. The attackers could make little progress against the almost impregnable building. They, therefore, set fire to the building. As the dense clouds settled smotheringly through the building many of the Separatists fled from the death trap, but 20 remaining inside were burned to death.

While the Separatist funeral pyre that had been a City Hall was still flaming, the mob, now lost to blood lust, launched a city-wide hunt for Separatists, rooting them out of beds and house to meet sharper pumishment or death wherever found.

Dies in Flames.

Later reports from Pirmasens said Schwab, after being beaten almost to death by the mob, died in the flames. Evidently the Government commis-sar, who fell into the hands of the mob during the murderous orgy, was manhandled fearfully and then driven back into the furnace-like City Hall, where his comrades had taken shelter and were roasting, there to die himself,







The lecturer mentioned the several steps necessary to maintain an open channel in the St. Lawrence for navigation throughout the year, as closing off the ice flow from the Great Lakes and other lakes, employing ice-breakers, injecting steam at certain-strategic points where bad ice conditions prevailed, constructing dams to drown out rapids and practically make a ship channel canal of the St. Lawrence.

Icebergs.

The speaker traced the formation of icebergs from the fjords of Greenland and of their slow movement of 10 to 30 miles a day in their southern trip and occasionally of bergs becoming grounded and taking two years before reaching Newfoundland.

By means of a chart in which the area covered by icebergs became gradually wider to its southern extremity in the Atlantic Ocean below Newfoundland he argued that the northern route, by requiring a shorter distance through the danger zone of bergs, was safer than the route to New York and American ports, which some attempted to prove the safer route.

Farther north there were fewer icebergs, and they were larger and easier to see and confined to a comparatively narrow path, whereas as the icebergs moved southerly they disintegrated into smaller pieces which were largely below the surface and, scattered over a larger area, were more dangerous to navigation.



TUBERCULAR PATIENT.

Climatic treatment has always been of great assistance to the person suffering from tuberculosia. Even a change from the crowded city to the open country is often a great aid.

The real value of a suitable or mild climate is the opportunity it gives the patient for out-of-doors life and activity in the fresh air. But living the real hygienic life is as great a safeguard as certain mild climates.

Aside from mild, airy living quarters, tubercular patients, or those who are trying their best to avoid any such infection, must carefully consider their diet.

One thing must always be carefully

diet.

One thing must always be carefully thought of in this connection. The tubercular patient is most always the victim of a lack of appetite. Therefore, the food prepared for him should be a "tempting dish," one that cannot be refused.

The body is subject to great loss or wasting away of tissue in this disease. The necessary diet should aim to keep the date of the vegetable oils, together with bacon fat and cod liver oil are valuable.

To keep up weight and provide for the body tissue waste, use fresh lean meats, plenty of milk and eggs. Bread and butter is good tubercular fare. Avoid ples, sweets and excessive drinking of coffee or ice water. Take smoking.

### NOTIFIABLE DISEASE MORE THAN USUAL

There were 52 cases of notifiable diseases in the city and county of St. John during the month of January, and already this month there have been 26 cases reported to the Sub-district Board of Health. The list for January included 21 cases of diphtheria, 16 of scarlet fever; two of typhoid; three of measles; two of chicken pox, and eight of tuberculosis. The typhoid cases occurred in the South End and were of a very mild type. The cases reported this month included seven diphtheria, seven scarlet fever and 12 measles. The number of notifiable diseases has so far been much above the normal.

SENT TO JAIL FOR THEFT.

A few days ago George Langdon and Frank Crossman were taken into custody and held for the Moncton police on the charge of stealing a horse and sleigh from O. W. Fraser, a stable proprietor at Moncton. The horse and sleigh taken from Moncton were traded at Fair Vale, near Rothesay, and the two young men drove into the city with another rig when they were captured. The two were taken to Moncton by an officer sent from the railway town, and in the police court there on Monday Langdon was sentenced to a term of nine months in jail, while the sentence of Crossman was deferred pending his good behavior. Langdon is 26 years old and belongs to Brookline, Mass., while his companion was only 16 years old. The latter's youth was taken into consideration in the case.
