Dominion Revenues SEGOND BROTHER Show Big Increase

For Five Months \$12,000,000 Greater Than For Same Period of 1917

Ottawa, Sept. 12—An increase of over twelve and a half million dollars in the revenues of the Dominion for the first five months of the current fiscal year ending August 31st, is shown by the financial statement for the month of August issued today by the Department of Frinance. The increase is encouraging because of the fact that customs collections have fallen off by approximately seven million dollars.

A jump in miscellaneous receipts, including a number of the new war taxes, from \$6,808,987 for the April-August period 1917 to \$16,877,979 for the same period this year makes up for the loss in customs revenue and provides three millions of the twelve and a half millions increase. Despite the enforcement of the prohibition measure excise revenues have increased by over one million dollars, and government railway receipts are higher.

The total revenue for the five months period is \$118,850,020 as compared with \$105,785,600 for the same period last year.



AS TO AMERICANS HERE

Reference to the registration obligations of United States citizens now in Canada, contained in a Canadian Press despatch from New York in the morning papers, is misleading, said H. S. Culver, United States consul, today. Mr. Culver agreed that those citizens who are planning to return to the United States to report at their former homes within the sixty day period allowed are under no obligation to register in Canada must register with the nearest consul, and thus make themselves subject to the regulations of their own country. Otherwise, at the expiration of the time limit, at the end of this month, they will be liable to be drafted under the Canadian military service act, recording to the terms of the international treaty which deals with this situation.
