
Referring to the advancing price of foot-wear, the Montreal Gazette says: "The advancing cost of leather and other material that enters into the making of boots and shoes is forcing the price up gradually, and dealers are out with the statement that a general boost is coming shortly. Shoes for which \$5 is now the price will cost \$6 very soon in the retail shops, and other grades will be increased in proportion. The causes of the advance are many. Wages are higher than form-erly and there is a greater amount of leather being used. In this latter con-nection some blame is placed on the auto-
