STATEMENT BY THE SESSION.

The Session enters upon the New Year with thanksgiving to Almighty God for His manifold mercies in the past, and with increased faith and hope for the future. "God, even our own God, will bless us."

During the whole of the year just closed the diets of Public Worship have been very largely attended. The great numbers who so regularly wait on the stated and special ordinances of the sanctuary, their increasing interest in the means of grace, their devout deportment in the house of God, their enlarged liberality in sustaining and extending the Redeemer's kingdom, are indications that God is graciously visiting us as a congregation.

The little band of believers who meet on Sabbath morning to pray for the good of Zion is making stronger the hands of the Pastor and all our Christian workers. This prayer-meeting has special claims upon all who love our "Jerusalem" (Ps. cxxii.).

The Weekly Prayer Meeting has been comparatively well attended during the year; but "yet there is room." Some new and improved features will be introduced, and it is hoped the interest in this very important institution will increase.

A Friday evening Prayer Meeting for Young Men has been organized. It has been sustained by the young men themselves with great prudence and advantage. The Session affectionately commends it to all of that most interesting class, the younger brethren of the congregation.

The Bible Class continues to be a source of power and blessing to the Church. By gradual increase, the number in regular attendance at present is over 200.

The Sabbath School has made steady and marked progress. During the year a very decided advance has been made in thoroughness of instruction, in direct and personal dealing with the young in spiritual truth, in systematic and enlarged giving for Christ's cause. The deportment and order of the pupils in the various classes have been generally admirable, and the whole conducting of the School very commendable. For this exemplary state of Sabbath School efficiency much credit is due to our excellent Superintendent, Mr. A. J. G. Henderson, and our able and cultured Assistant-Superintendent, Mr. Thos. Caldwell; and as well to every one of the devoted staff of Teachers, who, with a faithful diligence and self-denial that

command the esteem and gratitude of the whole Congregation, are serving the Great Master Shepherd in this most important part of His blessed work.

Special and honorable reference is felt to be due to our present excellent and efficient Choir, which, under the accomplished superintendence of its respected leader, Mr. W. Freeland, is gratuitously leading the praise of God in the sanctuary. The Session notes with great pleasure that almost every member of the Choir is, by profession, a disciple of Christ, and in full communion with His church. To this fact is due, the Session believes, the usually devout and exemplary conduct of the Choir during the public worship of God.

The special aims of the Women's Foreign Mission Association are vigorously prosecuted by a small number of our Christian women. By correspondence with our devoted staff of Missionaries in India, China, and the Pacific Islands, they are quietly diffusing missionary literature, and thus extending a knowledge of the pressing claims of their heathen sisters upon the sympathy of God's people. By systematic giving, and by laboring, like the great Apostle of the Gentiles, with their own hands, they are helping to supply the F. M. Board with muchneeded funds, and thus doing commendable service for Him whose last words on earth were, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature."

The Ladies' Aid Society, under the efficient presidency of Mrs. John Elliott and her energetic staff of officers, has accomplished many good results in its special work. In many instances these ladies have welcomed and cheered the stranger, visited and refreshed the sick, fed and clothed the naked, &c., while the funds for these and other important objects have been raised in such a manner and by such methods as have given pleasure to our people, and at the same time have contributed much to the promotion of brotherly kindness and congregational sociality.

The Session hopes that steps will be taken to make the "Congregational Total Abstinence Society" a felt practical cause of good during the current year.

TWENTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

For the Year 1879.

1st. The Board of Management herewith submit their Financial Statement of the Income and Expenditure for year ending 31st December, 1879, accompanied by the accounts of the Secretary and Treasurer in detail, duly audited, from which it will be observed that the total ordinary revenue amounted to \$3,952.80, which, as compared with that of last year, shows an increase of \$39.88.

2nd. The Sabbath collections amounted to \$1,876.65, showing an increase of \$68.85 as compared with 1878.

3rd. The revenue received from pew rents amounted to \$2,076.15, showing a decrease of \$28,97, as compared with 1878. The amount of pew rent still unpaid at the end of the year was \$540, \$112 of that amount being carried forward from 1878, and \$72 from 1877. The number of pew holders is now 300, representing 788 sittings. The number of sittings now vacant is 199, of these 47 are on the ground floor, and 152 in the gallery.

4th. As authorised by motion at last annual meeting, we continued the "Envelope System," from which a revenue of \$622.51 was derived. While thanks are due to those who have sustained the system, yet, as it is not more generally

5th. As the paint on the outside woodwork of the manse had become very delapidated, we have had it renewed. We have also found it necessary to expend a considerable sum on the boulevards fronting on Queen's Avenue, in order to have it in keeping with the neighbourhood, which expenditure we hope will meet with your approbation.

6th. The thanks of the congregation are due to the Ladies' Aid Society for the generous gift of \$100, the full amount required to make the alterations in the pews in the gallery—alterations which have been under the consideration of the Board for years.

7th. The Managers, in conclusion, would desire to acknowledge the goodness ef God to us during the year that is past, and that He has enabled our esteemed Pastor to overcome the large amount of work devolving upon him. We would also draw your attention to the efficient labours of the members of the Choir in promoting the proper conduct of the service of praise.

8th. The six Managers, whose term of office now expires, are John Ferguson, Joseph Atkinson, Alex. Purdom, John Jones, John G. McIntosh and John Ross, who are eligible for re-election.

REPORT OF THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

In submitting this, their First Annual Report, the Ladies' Aid Society have much cause for thankfulness on account of the general interest manifested in its work and objects.

Three Social and Literary Entertainments were given in the Lecture Room under the auspices of the Society, which, while greatly augmenting its funds, have also afforded an excellent opportunity for friendly intercourse amongst the "members and adherents" of the congregation.

Considerable effort has been put forth by the Society to find out and visit the many strangers who unite themselves with the congregation from time to time.

As will be seen by the Manager's Report, the cost of the alterations made on the seats in the gallery was paid by this Society.

As it was found both expensive and inconvenient to rent the dishes required for socials, &c., we thought it better economy to purchase, which has been done at a cost of \$42.17.

In the meantime the poor have not been neglected, many having been visited and encouraged by kind words of sympathy. Five families have been assisted materially during the year, \$35 having been expended in this way. In future, we hope to be able to devote more time and attention to this branch of our work.

Our membership for the past year numbered ninety-one—twenty being the average attendance at our regular monthly meetings.

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION, 1879.

In submitting this, the Ninth Annual Report, the Committee, on behalf of the Congregation, desire to express much thankfulness to God for the success which has crowned the labors of the Association during the year.

Notwithstanding special sums raised for the reduction of the Home Mission debt and other missionary objects, your Committee have the pleasure of reporting a very considerable increase on the income of the previous year.

From a glance at the list of contributors, it is, however, quite evident that a very large proportion of the congregation has not yet been called upon by the collectors. There are some 450 families connected with the congregation, and nearly 700 members on the communion roll, while only 275 persons are subscribers to the schemes of the Church. Under these circumstances, your Committee feel confident that were the staff of collectors so increased that all those who do not now give anything for the support of missionary operations could be called upon, the amount now collected would be very largely increased.

Those who have year by year subscribed since the formation of the Association, and have so largely contributed to its success, will, we trust, be encouraged to further effort, and thus by their example stimulate others.

He who said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," honors His people in permitting them to be co-laborers with Him in the extension of His kingdom; and He will surely reckon with those who, living in the enjoyment of all the blessings which the Gospel brings, remain deaf to the cry of those who are "perishing for lack of knowledge."

The Annual Meeting of the Association was held in the Lecture Room on the evening of Wednesday, 21st January—Rev. J. A. Murray, President, in the chair.

The Secretary submitted his report, showing that the sum of \$922.58 had been collected, being an increase of \$180.67 over the previous year.

The report was received and adopted. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the Collectors and Secretary for their valuable labors. The amount for distribution was apportioned to the various schemes of the Church, and the undermentioned Officers, Committee and Collectors for the year 1880 duly elected:—

REPORT

OF THE

Sabbath School Association

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, 1880.

The annual meeting of the Office-bearers and Teachers was held on the evening of January 19th, 1880. There was a good attendance.

In presenting their Annual Report, the Teachers desire to record their feeling of deep gratitude to God who has spared them to see the close of another year's work in His vineyard, and the growing conviction upon them that work is daily being more and more owned and blessed of Him whose injunction, "Feed my lambs," they, by the help of His Holy Spirit, have been striving to fulfil. During the progress of the late special services in the city, it has been more than once the blessed privilege of the teachers to hear from their scholars the anxious and heartfelt enquiry, "What shall we do to be saved?" and to know that many of them are now rejoicing in the Lord, and are striving, as far as in them lies, to follow in the footsteps of Him who, when He was upon the earth, said, "Suffer little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven." We would earnestly commend these, the little ones of the flock, to the prayers of the congregation, the loving and watchful care of their parents, whose more especial duty and great privilege it is to "train up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord;" while to the teachers we would say, "In the morning sow thy seed and in the evening withhold not thy hand, for thou knowest not which shall prosper, this or that."

The total number of children on the roll is 314; average attendance, 227. It is a matter of great regret to the teachers to notice the great disparity in the attendance of the girls and that of the boys; and they are at a loss to know how to account for it, but would respectfully urge the matter upon the attention of the parents and teachers.

Mr. Freeland still continues to lead the service of praise in the Sabbath School, and to take charge of the Infant Class. A most encouraging feature of this work is the regularity of attendance, and also the great interest manifested by the children in the instruction communicated by the use of the blackboard and otherwise. The total number on the roll is 50; average attendance, 45. Several classes have been formed from it during the year. A monthly temperance paper, called the "Band of Hope Review," is distributed and read with interest and profit.

The system of class collections inaugurated last year has been continued with gratifying results. Collections during this year, \$149, as against \$136 in 1878.

The state of the Library is a subject of much anxiety to the Teachers' Association. As it stands at present it is totally inadequate to the wants of the School, both as regards quality, quantity and manner of distributing; and as no Sabbath School equipment can be considered complete without a proper Library, it is earnestly hoped that some speedy action will be taken to procure a fresh supply of suitable books. The Library has been closed for the present.

There have been some changes in the list of teachers, several of the most devoted and faithful of whom have resigned their classes owing to removal from the city. As an Association, we have to mourn the loss of one of our most efficient and devoted teachers. On Sabbath, the 11th of January, Miss Jessie Kessack, who for over five years has labored in the school, departed this life, to be "forever with the Lord." It would

be out of place here to enlarge upon the Christian virtues and excellencies of one who was so widely known both in the church and city; and while we grieve that here we shall see her face no more, we rejoice to know that she has obtained an "inheritance among them which are sanctified, and a crown which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to all those who love His appearing."

In conclusion, the Teachers would respectfully beg leave to lay the claims of the Sabbath School before the parents, asking earnestly both their prayers and active co-operation, that they may begin the year with a fresh impulse given to their labors, "forasmuch as they know their labor is not in vain in the Lord."
