TIME OF SESSION.

There are two terms of six months each in the Academic year, commencing respectively on the first of November and first of May. Vacations, one week at end of each term, two weeks at Christmas, and seven weeks in July and August. Time of daily session, four hours, from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m.

ADMISSION.

All candidates from the Town and County of Pictou are admitted free upon passing the required examination. Students from beyond the limits of the county are required to pay a fee of Six Dollars per term to the Town Clerk. Those who have already paid three full fees shall be admitted free. Admission ticket for full course during good conduct, Eighteen Dollars.

ADMISSION EXAMINATIONS.

Candidates from the Common Schools of Pictou Town are required to pass the regular *Grading* Examinations on the complete syllabus of the Provincial Course of Studies, Class IV, for admission to the *Junior* Class.

Candidates from beyond the Town are required to pass the Admission Examination at the opening of the term, on the essential subjects of the same, Class IV, as follows:—

ENGLISH PAPER.—(a) To show a fair knowledge of English Composition, good Spelling and Penmanship. (b) To show a good knowledge of Grammar and Analysis as in Common School Text Books.

GEOG. AND HISTORY PAPER.—(a) Outline Geog. of the World and Geog. of the British Empire. (b) Outline History of Great Britain and Canada.

MATHEMATICAL PAPER.—Ready and accurate knowledge of Fundamental Rules of Arithmetic, Reduction, Fractions, (Vulgar and Decimal), and Commercial Rules as far as Simple Interest. A knowledge of Geometry and Algebra will count a few points.

Admission to the Intermediate and Senior classes will be on the essential subjects of the classes leading respectively to them, and the examinations shall be held at the same time as those for Junior Admission. Supplementary examinations may be held within a week from the opening of classes if deemed advisable by the Principal.

Exemptions from admission examinations are made in favor of those holding Certificates of Promotion to any of the Academic classes, and of those who obtain Certificates at the Academic Terminal Examinations. Also, a Grade D license or diploma from the Provincial Normal School or Council of Public Instruction

will be accepted in lieu of the Junior Admission Examination; a Grade C in lieu of the corresponding subjects in the Intermediate Admission; and a Grade B in lieu of the corresponding subjects in Senior Admission.

Students may be admitted to take special classes or a partial course, provided they can be accommodated without encroachment on the privileges of those taking the full regular course.

Drawing and Painting,—(Special Class).* Freehand and Architectural. Painting in Oils and Water Colors. Time of Session, between 3.30 and 5.30 p. m. daily, in the "Art Room."

ELOCUTION.—(Special Class).* Rev. J. Carruthers. Course of lectures on, and training in Voice Culture, Dramatic Reading and Declamation.

TAXIDERMY.—Student can obtain instruction freely in the art of preparing, preserving and mounting skins of birds and other animals, and in the preservation of Natural History specimens generally, from the Taxidermist and sub-curator of the Museum in the Natural History Laboratory.

MILITARY DRILL.—For this purpose it has been found most economical for students to join the Pictou Battery, Garrison Artillery, Captain, Joseph Gordon, Esq. In addition to Infantry Drill and rifle practice the company goes through a course of Artillery Drill with the heavy guns of Pictou Battery, under the ablest instructors.

The Terminal Examinations are conducted in writing during the last week of each term, on all the subjects of the course. Certificates are given to each deserving student, embodying the results of this examination, and a report on his class-work and deportment for the term.

Under the School Law of the Province of Nova Scotia, the Academy is subject in its particular management to the "Rules and Regulations of the Public Schools of Pictou Town," as published and amended from time to time by the Municipal Council.

The Pictou Academy is not a boarding institution. A condition of of admission, however, is: that "any enrolled student is accountable to the ordinary Academic disciplinary authority, even to suspension or expulsion, for any irregularity, occurring anywhere, which may affect the morale of the Academy injuriously."

Board for Students in private houses in the town ranges from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per week.




