**FIVE WILL PROBABLY DIE.**

Twenty-three persons injured in a railroad wreck.

Passenger Coaches Roll Over on the Empire State and a Briefly Running Stream in Colorado—Narrow Gauge Road and Top-Heavy Cars—Speed to Great For Safety.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE.

DENVER, Col. Sept. 15.—A passenger train bound toward Denver on the Great Northern division of the Union Pacific railway, was wrecked near Beaver Creek station, and 23 passengers were injured five of whom probably die.

The train was late and running very rapidly, when rounding a sharp curve, the express car suddenly left the track and rolled down a 15-foot embankment. It was followed by the mail car and two passenger coaches, one of which turned over twice before reaching life bottom. The water in the stream was rushing along in a current, and the cars were carried along with it a long distance.

The list of injured would have been much smaller, but for the difficulty experienced in some instances, the rescuers were badly injured by being hurled against the huge boulders in the creek.

The train was loaded with passengers, many of whom were Knights of Pythias returning from the state convention which was held at Aspen last week.

When the news reached Golden, Colo., a wrecking train was ordered out, and was starting, when Robert Pruett, an employee of the road, attempted to board the engine. In doing so his revolver fell from his pocket, the hammer hitting a passenger and the weapon was discharged, the ball taking effect in the man's neck, making a wound which will result fatal.

The seriously injured in the wreck were left at Golden in the hands of physicians. They are Mrs. Guthmacher of Black Hawk, Col., collar bone broken, back hurt, and internal injuries; Mrs. Ruhlger, merchant of Black Hawk, internal injuries; George B. Tarr, Denver, chest crushed and internal injuries; Burnett of Navadaville, Col., spine injured and injured internally; — Watson, injured internally.

The road is narrow gauge and the coaches very hot heavy. It is thought the train was running too rapidly for safety.

Hundreds Dying of Hunger.—The Queen of Spain's Donations. 253

Madrid, Sept. 15.—Additional reports from the flooded districts increase the terrible results of the calamity. Four hundred houses were destroyed in Almeria; many families are homeless. Five hundred houses are in ruins at Consuegra and the occupants are hurried under the debris. About 300 bodies have already been recovered. Many persons are dying of hunger.

The Queen has subscribed \$10,000 to the relief fund. The floods have been general in the south of Spain. In the province of Toledo the rush of water from the Consuegra river was so sudden that hundreds of people were drowned in their beds. Four hundred bodies are already recovered.

Madrid, Sept. 15.—Additional reports from the flooded districts increase the terrible results of the calamity. Four hundred houses were destroyed in Almeria; many families are homeless. Five hundred houses are in ruins at Consuegra and the occupants are hurried under the debris. About 300 bodies have already been recovered. Many persons are dying of hunger.

The Queen has subscribed \$10,000 to the relief fund. The floods have been general in the south of Spain. In the province of Toledo the rush of water from the Consuegra river was so sudden that hundreds of people were drowned in their beds. Four hundred bodies are already recovered.
