McCourt received his injuries early in the second half of the match, which had been growing in roughness up till this incident occurred. It is claimed that Throp struck Mc-Court, who started to retaliate when he was struck a terrific blow over the head by Masson, and fell unconscious.
Throp about this time received a very ugly cut over the head from a Corn-

McCourt came on again for a few minutes, but he had to quit, and, becoming unconscious, was taken to the Hotel Dieu hospital. At the hospital an operation was performed in an attempt to relieve the pressure on the brain, but the brain was bleeding, and he passed away without regaining con-
