Even the despised cabbage is capable of being made appetizing. After it is boiled and pressed dry it should be chopped fine and dried again by being put on the fire in the saucepan. Add a lump of butter, season with pepper and salt and a little grated nutmeg. When not serve on squares of hot toast.

Mashed carrots are quite as palatable as mashed turnips. They should be cooked, passed through a sieve and put into a stewpan with a piece of butter, a spoonful of cream, a drop or two of tarragon vinegar, whisked up and scasoned with pepper and salt, arranged in the form of a mound and sprinkled with a little chopped parsley?

Cucumbers are seldom used except raw, and yet they are both delicious and digestible when cooked. The peel should be removed and the cucumbers should be boiled until tender, the drained and sliced, and simmered in good brown gravy, to which a very little chilit vinegar has been added, for seven or eight minntes. Radishes, like cucumbers, can be served hot as well as in salads. They should be tied in bunches and boiled for eighteen or twenty minutes, then placed on toast and covered with white sauce. Peas, French beans and sprouts are greatly improved by being tossed for a few minutes previous to sending to table in a saucepan containing a fump of fresh butter, a tablebeing tossed for a rew infinites previous to sending to table in a saucepan containing a fump of fresh butter, a table-spoonful of cream, a pinch of castor sugar, and seasoning of pepper and salt. A rather more simple way of treating French beans is a la Francaise; they are put into a nan with a niger of butter.

French beans is a la Francaise; they are put into a pan with a piece of butter, the juice of half a lemon and a little pepper and salt.

A ragout of peas needs but to be eaten to be appreciated. Put three ounces of butter into a saucepan with a teaspoon of minced onion, a few leaves of fresh paint, pepper and salt. When these ingredients have simmered for a few minutes—take care that they do not acquire the least color—add a quart of green peas, and shake the pan to prevent their burning; after five minutes ald half a pint of water, a very little borax and half a teaspoon of powdered sugar. Cover the pan closely, and draw it to the side of the fire, and let the contents, cook slowly for about three-quarters of an hour; if allowed to boil the water will soon be absorbed, and unless more is added at once, the peas, instead of being large and tender, will be shrivelled and hard.

Fraudulent Sweetbreads. "A true sweetbread is perhaps the ost wholesome meat that can be eaten," most wholesome meat that can be eaten," said a doctor yesterday, "but you are never able to get it. The sweetbread proper is the pancreas, which is one of the most effective agents in promoting digestion, but the sweatbrerd of trade is usually obtained from the throats of cattle and is what is called the thyroid gland. This gland rests against the windpipe, and while its texture is similar to that of the real sweetbread, it has not the same beneficial qualities. But some butchers, in order to make money, pass off the salivary gland, that which furnishes the salivar located in the cheeks, for a sweetbread. This is the most infurnishes the saliva located in the cheeks, for a sweetbread. This is the most inferior substitute for all. The pancreas or real sweetbread is a most dainty morsel. It is of triangular form, while the sweetbreads obtained from the throat are of an oval form. But what is the use of making people dissatissied? They have been eating thyroid and salivary glands for sweetbreads for years and have been satisfied. But then they have never tasted the real thing."—Pittsburg Dispatch.

Household Hints. When milk is used in tumblers, wash them first in cold water; afterward rinse in hot water. One of grandmother's wise ways was to keep a cup of alum-water always close at hand; it usually stood on the windowstill beside her work basket. Cut fingers and bruises of all kinds, if wrapped in cloth wet with alum-water, healed with a rapidity that was truly wonderful. This is so simple a remedy that it is worth while to know about it. a short distance. SUBMARINE TELEPHONY. An Impossible Cable Required for Franco-Atlantic Conversation, It was Professor Sylvanus Thompson, of London, that set electricians talking of Longon, that set electricians talking again about what is known as subvarine telephony. He was in the United States some months ago and he declared his belief, that a cable so constructed as to make what the electricians call self-induction balance and neutralize certain other elements of difficulty in the problem would render it possible to talk from the Old World to the New. Practical electricians see small prospects of results from Professor Thompson's suggestion.

It is generally held by electricians
that a cable with a thick enough conducting core properly insulated would
carry the human voice under the ocean.
Some electricians guess that the cable, carry the human voice under the ceean. Some electricians guess that the cable, insulating coat and all, that should carry speech under the Atlantic must be a foot in diameter. This is arguing from known facts, but unforseen difficulties might arise. When the electrician has taken into account all he knows he is sometimes balked in practice by the development of things that he does not know. The building of such a cable, or of that suggested by Professor Thompson, is believed to be a long way off.

The only man who has suggested a method of sending human speech under the ocean by means of cables now in use is J. J. Carty, a widely known electrical engineer of this city who set forth his theory in a lecture about five years ago. Another man thought the idea of sufficient practical importance to have it patented. When Mr. Carty thinks so perhaps the other fellow will hear from him.

When a telegraph operator cables across the Atlantic there is an appreciable length of time between the communication of the impulse here and the recording of it on the other side, and the second impulse must be withheld until such time has charsed. For this reason the human voice cannot be directly transmitted by cables now in use, for a single syllable would communicate hundreds of tiny impulses to the cable, and they would jostle one another, so to speak, in such fashion that no clear record would be made upon the other side. Mr. Carty suggested that the message be first talked into a phonograph upon one side of the Atlantic; that the phonograph then be connected with the cable, and turned at so slow a rate that the impulses shall not crowd one another. A slowly moving phonograph on the other side would receive the message, and, having its record, would be on the other side would receive the message, and, having its record, would be revolved rapidly enough for the sounds to be received by the human ear.

Mr. Carty believes his plan perfectly sound in theory, but, he admits that it would take a long time to send such a message. No experiment has been tried to demonstrate its practicability, partly because Mr. Carty is too busy earning a cause Mr. Carty is too busy earning a living in the service of a nelephone com-pany to take six months off for devising the necessary machinery for the *Aperi-ment, and partly because the cable com-panies are not likely to trouble them-selves about such a matter.—New York Sun.
