VICTORIA COUNTY ELECTION.

Our young but prosperous and important sister County has at length redeemed herself from the imputation of choosing strangers for her representatives. We congratulate her most heartily on the fact, notwithstanding that we do not hold that non-residence should be considered as of necessity and insuperable objection. The telegram elsewhere shows that the choice of the electors has fallen upon Messrs. Daniel B. Raymond and John Costigan. We believe both to be good and true men—men who while keeping a careful watch over the interests of their own constituency will also take a fair and independent view of the general politics of the Province—men who will be found following subserviently within the wake of a Government or an Opposition, but who whether in support of the Ministry of the day or in opposition to it, will exercise their own judgement as to the policy which the legislature should pursue, and follow out the dictates of that judgement. We look upon them also as men who will not sit quietly by and see the interests of the River Counties neglected, and sacrificed as they have for years been on the altar of expediency and partisan motives. Mr. John D. Beardsley has not succeeded; but we hope to see him yet represent the County of Victoria. Our sympathies were with him, because we knew that his intellect was of a very high order, and because we looked upon him as among the most promising members of Young New Brunswick; but we did not care to give any expression to these sympathies because we were not sufficiently familiar with the politics and the wants and aspirations of Victoria to intermeddle in her election contests. Of Mr. Gaynon we know nothing beyond the name. We write without the slightest reference to party feeling, for we do not at this moment know whether the politics of Messrs. Raymond and Costigan are Liberal or Conservative. We feel satisfied that neither of them are Smashers.

RAILWAY OPERATIONS.—Some time since we announced the fact that a sufficient sum had been raised by the New Brunswick and Canada Railway Company to pay off their liabilities, and that an early resumption of the work upon the line might be expected. We are glad to hear that the contractors, Messrs. Walker and Johnson, are again at work, and that the prospect is that the Road will be opened to Ed River by the first of December, and to the O'Donnel Road, twelve miles from Woodstock, by the beginning of January next. Two trains are constantly employed in ballasting. Next season will see the completion of the Road to the terminus on the Houlton Road. We trust that it will see yet more—that it will see a commencement made under the authority and with the assistance of the Province for a continuation of the line forward towards Canada. Another session of the Legislature should not be allowed to pass without legislation on this matter; and if whatever administration may then be in powers endeavors to shirk the origin of a scheme for that purpose we trust that there will be spirit, and energy and independence in the members from the River Counties to bring the Executive to a sense of its duty and if the tenure by which its members hold their positions.

From S. B. Miller, Fredericton, we have received a little manual of elementary arithmetic, published by himself, and intended to supply the want produced by the change in the system of our computation from pounds, shillings and pence to dollars and cents. From the examination which we have been able to give it, we judge that its explanations are clear and simple and that it is well adapted for use in our Parish schools.

MAIL TO ST. ANDREWS.—We learn with pleasure that efforts are being made to obtain a weekly mail communication between St. Andrews and Woodstock by way of the Railway. We had such communication at one time; and during its brief continuance it proved a very great convenience and advantage to the country at both ends of the line. The expense would be a trifle compared to the benefit which would accrue to the public. The Railway officials, we understand, are anxious to have the thing done; and we trust that the Postmaster General will be prepared to immediately make the necessary arrangements.

FIRE AT VICTORIA CORNER.—In the hurry of Election matters, we omitted to mention that on Friday night, the 31st. May. A fire occurred in Victoria Corner, which destroyed Mr Geo. W Boyer's building and outhouses. We regret to learn that Mr. Boyer's loss will be considerable as the property was worth over \$2,000, only \$500 of which was covered by Insurance.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN. Lord John Russell said in Parliament that the Government had no information of a Canadian volunteer regiment having tendered its services to the United States, and of course could not say what action should be taken.

The Atlantic took out the news that the British Government would not permit privateers or armed vessels to take prizes into British ports. Lord John Russell, in his letter to the Lords Admiralty, directing them to carry out this intention, says it is done to secure the strictest neutrality.

Mr. Stiddell gave notice that he should ask Ministers if this interdiction is not at variance with former practice, and the reason for this change of maritime policy.

Parliamentary proceedings on the 5th were unimportant. The position of the Irish members relative to Galway subsidy was again debated, and several disclaimed any intention of tampering with the Government.

Lord Stanley gave notice of his intention to ask what steps Government had taken to prevent the violation of neutrality in the case of the regiment of volunteers in Canada who have offered their services to the United States.

Five cases, containing 100 rifles, directed to the Commercial Bank of New York, intended for steamer Adriatic, were stopped at Galway by the Agent of the line, who refused to let them pass.

Lord Elgin at a banquet given to him by the Greece Company of London, said he doubted if we could have trade with China without political relations, although he agreed that it was not political relations, but trade that was wanted. He believed our relations were now established on a footing not likely to be disturbed in future.

The Bombay mail of the 12th has reached England. News unimportant.

ITALY. Count Cavour died at 7 o'clock on the morning of the 6th inst. His death caused a profound sensation.

The evening preceding his death his state had become so alarming that great emotion was evinced by the people of Turin, and immense crowds surrounded his residence.

SPAIN. The Queen of Spain has given birth to a princess.

Montreal, June 12. Prince Alfred arrived at 8 o'clock this morning. The citizens were quite unprepared. He landed almost unobserved and drove to the residence of General Williams.

The Steamer New York.—The Steamer New York arrived in this port on Sunday last. She is a splendid substantial looking boat that gives you an inexpressible idea of safety and comfort as you look at her. The fittings are not new, and the interior does not betray a look as if it will no doubt appear when refitted, but the state rooms are large and commodious, and what seems to be an immense improvement the dining saloon is on the spacious upper deck, where 150 persons can dine at once. The after saloon, on the same deck, is very large and comfortable. She is commanded by Capt. Obisholm, who is so deservedly so great a favourite. The New York is 234 ft 9 inches in length, 24 ft 6 inches in breadth of beam, 8 ft 6 inches in depth of hold 14 feet, an unusual depth for steamers in these waters. Her cylinder is 60 inches in diameter, and of 12 feet stroke. The grand saloon is over 200 feet in length, and she has 23 state rooms.

These figures will give some idea of the size and character of the vessel. She is said to be an excellent sea boat, and is very fast, having on her downward trip, made the run from Montreal to Quebec, 100 miles, in 9 hours. It is to be hoped that all the steamers now on the route will find ample and remunerative employment, and that the enterprising spirit, to which the travelling public are so largely indebted for the accommodation now afforded, will win a rich reward.
