# GERMAN SEA FIGHTERS BEATEN BY RUSSIAN WARSHIPS IN ENGAGEMENT OFF THE ISLAND OF GOTHLAND

# TWO GERMAN WARSHIPS LIMP INTO KIEL BADLY CRIPPLED AFTER FIGHT IN THE BALTIC

German Fleet in the Baltic Meets Russian Sea EXPLOSION Fighters and Brisk Engagement Follows -Enemy Reported to Have Lost at Least Two Ships—Had Eight Army Corps at Riga Ready for Advance North Supported by Fleet.

London, July 2.-The Copenhagen correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company states that a message has been received from Gothland, telling of a naval battle off the east coast of that island. According to the message gunfire was heard last night and at 6.30 o'clock this morning a naval action was observed from Ljugarn harbor and later warships steamed north. At 10 o'clock four cruisers were seen closely engaged near land. Later a German torpedo boat with many wounded, arrived at Katthammersvik, on the east coast of Gothland.

An official statement, issued by the Russian War Office on July 1 told of an attempt by German warships to bombard the port of Windau, Courland, and land troops.

This attempt was repulsed. Windau is a Russian port across the Baltic from Gothland Island. London, July 2.—"A naval action occurred this morning off the coast

of the Island of Gothland," says the Stockholm correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company

"The German mine-layer Albatross was chased by four Russian cruisers and ran ashore to escape capture... Twenty-one of the minelayer's crew were killed and twenty-seven were wounded." TWO BATTLESHIPS CRIPPLED.

Copenhagen, July 2, via London, July 3:- The German battleships Wittelsbach, which is damaged, and a battleship of the Kaiser class, with many shots under the water line, from the battle in the Baltic, have returned to Kiel.

Copenhagen, via London, July -The Politiken's Petrograd correspondent states that it is reported that not only was a German torpe-Windau, but a cruiser of the Magdeburg type was also lost.

Copenhagen, via London, July 3.—In preparation for an advance north, supported by a German fleet, the Politiken's Petrograd correspondent states that eight German army corps were concentrated at Riga and in the Shavli region. The attack on Windau, the correspondent believes, was an evidence that this was the object of the German military and naval authorities.



Petrograd, July 2, via London, July 3-The following official war statement was given out here to night: "On July 1st, north of Przas

nysz, and the following night in the Shavli and the Racionz regions, we repulsed local German attacks. On the left bank of the Vistula the enemy on Thursday delivered barren attacks on the front Sieno-Josefow. In the direction of Lublin the enemy is in con

tion of Lublin the enemy is in con-tact with us along the Por and Wyznica rivers. "Between the Vieprz and Bug rivers the enemy continues to pro-gress towards the north and the northeast.

"In the region north of Zamosc
on Thursday there was stubborn
rear guard fighting. A regiment
of Prussian Guards which had
seized the village of Jourkoff was
dislodged by our counter-attack.
"On the Sokal-Halicz fror the

enemy on Wednesday and all of Thursday morning delivered num-erous attacks, most of which we repulsed, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. During our counter-at-tacks we took over two thousand prisoners and captured several machine guns. "In the Argonne, the enemy, af-ter a very violent bombardment, attempted a new and general at-tack between the roads leading to tack between the roads leading to Benarville and Blanleuil. After an especially stubborn fight, which at certain points developed into a hand-to-hand encounter, we were able to hold all our positions.

"Yesterday evening the Germans, after most intense artillery preparation, attempted on our positions on Hilgenfirst (in the Vosges) a series of attacks, the first two of which were repulsed. In the course of the third attack the enemy succeeded in gaining a foothold in our works. Through a counter-attack we recaptured this morning all our positions, which the Germans are continuing to shell violently.

"In the Dardanelles, after the successes gained by the British

successes gained by the British troops on June 28; the Turks at-tempted several counter-attacks against the positions taken from

against the positions taken from them. They were repulsed with heavy losses.
"On June 30 we carried a Turkish redoubt in the form of a quadrilateral, including six successive lines of trenches. The ground is covered with the bodies of Turkish soldiers. We have not been counter-attacked."

# CHICAGO ARCHITECT TESTIFIES BEFORE ROYAL **COMMISSION AT MANITOBA**

Winnipeg, July 2-E. C. Shankland Winnipeg, July 2—E. C. Shankaland, the Chicago architect, was examined at today's session of the Royal Commission, principally with regard to the \$802,000 contract. Asked why he came to see Dr. Montague on October , he said it was in connection wit Horwood's estimate of \$812,047, as to the cost of steel to be used in the south wing, the central portion and the dome of the new parliament buildings. After studying this estimate he had wired Horwood that he could not

see how the quantities of steel were made up, stating that instead of 2,000 tons in the central portion, excluding the dome, he could only find 700. In a letter of the same date, he stated he could not check the estimate for \$12,047 for in using Horwood's prices as a basis of calculation he could arrive at only \$760,205.

On his visit to Dr. Montague he discussed the matter, and in the end did not report on the dome, but only on the other portions. Counsel stated that Horwood's estimate included the dome, amounting to \$902,000 was let on July 4th, but cancelled later and destroyed. In answer to a question from C. P.

# LINES OF TRENCHES AFTER A WEEK'S STUBBORN FIGHTING TO FIGHT FOR EMPIRE

London, July 2.—An official statement given out by the British govrnment this evening announces the capture of certain trenches in the Dardanells operations which complete the capture of that part of the Turkish line gained by the French on June 21.

The full text of the statement follows: "General Sir Ian Hamilton's report that on the afternoon of June 29 hostile columns, moving west from North Achi Babi and south from Kilid Bahr towards the Turkish right flank indicated that the enemy was preparing for a counter-attack against a position we captured on the previous day. During the evening two mine galleries in front of our right centre were blown in, after which the enemy subjected the trenches to a heavy rifle and machine gun fire for two hours. After a lull and another outburst of fire a determined attack was made against the left of ou position with the bayonet. This attack was repulsed with a heavy loss

"On the southern front the Turks made a concerted attack along the coast where H. M. S. Wolverine, a destroyer, got searchlights and guns into the main body and caused a heavy loss.

"To the east the attack was pressed closer under a heavy artillery fire, but finally was checked about forty yards from our parapet. Bomb attacks and intermittent shelling continued, but no further general attack was made, and at 6.30 a, m, the French moved out, and by 7.20 a. had taken a strong system of entrenchments immediately in front of the left center of the line called by them quadrilateral.

"A number of Turks were driven out of the trenches by the French bombardment and much execution was done during their retreat. 

He had had many conferences with the merchants, and it had now been arranged that their profits should be strictly limited. Violent fluctuations in price would also be avoided. Next came the case of the producers of coal. The cost of production had gone up partly by the withdrawal of about 200,000 miners for the army. He was glad to say that with the exception of two districts the "get" of coal per man had gone up since the beginning of the war, because the miners realised that war, because the miners realised that a great deal depended on their producing a large output. The reduction in the number of men led to an increased expenditure in getting coal. The upkeep was the same as in normal times. The main addition to the expenses of setting coal came from the rises in wages, many of which were already operative. Mr. Runciman said that if he were a coal owner he should say 1s. 6d. per ton, but he could not agree to that estimate. # MUST ASSIGN \$15 A MONTH TO THEIR WIVES

Soldiers Must Set Aside This Amount for Wives or Latter Will Not Be Given the Separation Allowance.

Ottawa, July 2—Every married man who joins the soldiers has to set aside \$15 a month for his wife or she does not get any separation allowance from the government. In the artillery the officers are insisting that the married men set aside \$15 a month to their wives when they entist. After that they still have about \$15 a month entirely for spending money because the food and clothing are all furnished them. It is a very effective way of avoiding imposition upon the government with regard to the separation allowance and seems to be more satisfactory than the provision that where men marry a certain after they entist their wives were not entitled to the separation allowance.
