Creamed Potatoes.

There are several different ways in which creamed potatoes may be prepared. (1) Freshly boiled or cold potatoes may be cut into small cubes and served heated in cream sauce. (2) Wash, pare and cut potatoes into small cubes. Put into frying pan with a few silces of onion cut up very fine, and parboil 10 minutes. Pour off water, Add one tablespoon butter, seasoning of salt and pepper and milk colough to cover. Cook for 15 or 20 minutes or until the potatoes are well done and the sauce thick and creamy. It is necessary to stir the potatoes frequently to prevent sticking. The starch in the potatoes thickens the sauce.

Put one cupful of any flaked fish to beat in a double boller. Mix the egg yolk and cornstarch until light, stir in gradually the milk; add this to the fish. Put all over a brisk fire, season with the sait, pepper and nutmeg, attr and cook until the sauce is as thick as molasses. Then drop in the touter chopped fine.

Serve on squares of thin, delicately browned toast on a heated platter. Warm the plates before serving.





The Hansard report for March 7, o page 1606 quotes the member for Carleton in reference to certain shell

contracts as follows:

"I find a most interesting account here regarding \$320,000 worth of goods which were sold to the shell committee by a firm known as the Sheet Metal Products Company, Limited, of Toronto. By investigating the financial records, I find that the president and treasurer of this company is the Hon. A. E. Kemp, and that the vice-president and secretary is William A. Kemp. The other directors are W. Scott Waldie, Frederick S. Corrigan and Wellington Francis. I find that the shell committee purchased from a member of this Government \$300,000 worth of goods. I do not know whether the prices were fair and reasonable or not, but I do say, Sir, that unless they were the only people in Carada who could furnish these goods we should have a committee to investigate the matter to ascertain whether this member of the Government, through his company, sold to the shell committee goods at prices which were fair and reasonable."

It will be noticed that Mr. Carvell makes no charge that the prices at which the goods were obtained from the Sheet Metal Products Company He adduces no evidence to show that these goods could have been purchas ed more cheaply elsewhere, or with otter facilities for rapid delivery that a member of the Government was cominently connected with the company and therefore any transaction between the shell committee and that company must needs be questionable. Inversely, it is fair to assume that if member of the Government had not been connected with the Sheet Metal Products Company, Mr. Carvell would have had no fault to find with the con-

in affording facilities for training inspectors, whereby they familiarized themselves with their work, thus enabling them to inspect similar work which was being done in many other places, and this service was publicly acknowledged. It was also stated that this plant had been of immense value in overcoming difficulties in connection with the manufacture of articles referred to.

The total amount of business received from the shell committee, to which reference is made by Mr. Carvell, is considered small from two standpoints. First, in respect to the total amount of the class of articles required by the shell committee, which were distributed through many factories in different parts of the country, and second, it is also unimportant from the standpoint of the volume of our regular business, being approximately but three per cent. in the years for which delivery was expected. We do not know any useful purpose can be served by making reference to that part of the speech which assumed to deal with the technical side of the question, as those who have not an intimate knowledge in respect to manufacturing processes would scarcely appreciate this phase of the subject. Suffice it to say that what are commonly called "tin cups" are made from twenty-two gauge steel tinned. The articles called "cilps" are made from either brass or steel, in respect to both of which the combined operations, before completion are not less than thrity, all of which require to be of the most precise and exact character, and which fact, as those who know will understand, is common to the manufacture of all classes of ammunition. The foregoing has reference to two articles. The third article, to which reference has been made, is what are known as "sockets." We accepted this business for the reason that the information which came to us was that the production of shells was being considerably retarded for lack of this particular part.


