The emperor had been suffering from a bronchial inflammation, but pneumonia developed and suddenly reached a critical stage, and from six o'clock on, the chances of the patient surviving grew slimmer.

Baron Burlan, who in addition to being foreign minister, is also minister of the amperial and royal household, was summoned. He left the sick chamber a little after 8 o'clock, but hardly had reached his office when the death of the emperor was announced.
