

## NAVAL PROGRAMME PROPOSED BY UNITED STATES PREGNANT WITH INFINITE POSSIBILITIES

### Uncle Sam Places His Cards on the Table—Now Up to Other Nations.

#### DELEGATES STUNNED BY PROPOSITION

#### British Favorably Inclined to Proposals Set Forth by Secretary Hughes.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 13.—(Canadian Press)—A stop, characterized by one of Britain's delegates as "pregnant with infinite possibilities," was proposed by the United States Government yesterday when Secretary Hughes, head of the United States delegation, addressing the opening session of the disarmament conference put forward his naval programme.

Thus, at the first sitting of the Conference, Uncle Sam has placed all his cards upon the table, and it is now up to the other nations to show their hands. Mr. Hughes' programme, unfolded with great care and fortified by a formidable array of statistics, and put forward without the slightest vagueness or indefiniteness, came almost as a bolt from a clear sky. Every body expected the United States to take some kind of a lead, but nobody expected that it would have a disarmament programme to submit to the first sitting of the Conference, or that it would be upon so prodigious a scale.

#### Effect Upon Delegates

As the Secretary outlined his proposals, it was intensely interesting to note the effect upon the delegates. The Japanese, grouped together at the opposite end of the table, sat motionless, inflexible, inscrutable. No word, nor whisper, nor gesture passed between them; not a sign to reveal what they thought. The Chinese were more outwardly moved. In Canada, at least, forward, intent upon every word, listening almost with bated breath. So, also, the Portuguese, the Minister for the Netherlands and the representative of Italy. The French, however, appeared less concerned. M. Briand, who, with M. Viviani, sat at the right of the United States delegation, who resembles nothing so much as one of our Quebec M. P.'s, made no sign; while Viviani sat back with a look of indifference.

Mr. Hughes announced the United States' willingness to sacrifice thirty of its capital ships, Lord Beatty swung around in his chair as though he disbelieved his own ears.

#### Speeches Non-committal

The speeches that followed were, of course, non-committal. In London, who, earlier in the sitting, had moved that Mr. Hughes be the presiding officer of the conference, did not speak again. But the delegates of all the other nations were heard in turn, and a little thread, at straight up in unfeigned surprise; Lord Lee leaned forward with intense interest; and, as Mr. Hughes announced the United States' willingness to sacrifice thirty of its capital ships, Lord Beatty swung around in his chair as though he disbelieved his own ears.

#### British Favorably Inclined

But tonight, when the delegates have had time to study the proposals, to consult their colleagues and their experts and advisers, the atmosphere is astonishingly favorable to them. None of the delegates would leave direct statements, preferring to make a closer study of the details of the programme and to await a report from their technical advisers upon the large amount of data tabulated by Mr. Hughes. It can be stated that both the Japanese and the British are favorably inclined.

#### How Chances—and this warlike comes from high sources—it would be too optimistic to assume that disarmament is settled, that all that is now required is that the delegates shall accept the United States proposal and sit down together to work out its details. In the background, it is pointed out, there is the Far Eastern problem. There is China, there is Siberia and there is the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

Until these problems are out of the way, until the clouds in the Orient have been cleared, the path to realization of the Hughes' plan will be beset with difficulties. There is no doubt that these exist; but there is a deep antagonism to great armaments. Mr. Harding's statement, "we are opposed to disarmament and we have won," brought two hundred United States congressmen, gathered in the gallery, to their feet in shrill, approving cheers; and when later on Mr. Hughes used a similar phrase, a demonstration was begun which brought everybody, including delegates, to their feet in a sustained salvo of applause.

#### Meanwhile, experts are hard at work analyzing the details of the Hughes scheme. By Tuesday when the conference resumes, their reports will be in the hands of the delegates and they will be clear for an exchange of views.

## BELIEF GENERAL THAT JAPANESE ARE WILLING TO ACCEPT U. S. PROPOSAL

Washington, Nov. 13.—(Canadian Press)—The impression is general, although it has not been officially confirmed, that the Japanese are agreeably impressed by, if not actually willing to accept the Hughes proposals for limitation of naval armaments. This belief appeared to be further confirmed by few remarks made this evening by the Japanese delegates at a formal reception at the Shoreham Hotel, by Baron Shidehara, Japanese ambassador. In brief addresses both Baron Kato and Prince Toguwaya expressed the most optimistic views.

## PREMIER FAVORS PERMANENT ADOPTION OF PRESENT BONUS TO SOLDIER PENSION RATES

### Prime Minister in Answer to Questions Put by G. W. V. A. Declares in Favor of Immediate Steps Toward the Relief of Unemployment and Points to Measures Already Taken to Relieve Unemployment.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—(Canadian Press)—The Prime Minister replied in favor of immediate steps toward the relief of unemployment, and pointed to the measures already taken to relieve unemployment by assisting in munition works through the winter months.

With regard to housing and legislation, providing small holdings for ex-service men and women, Mr. Meighen points out that existing housing legislation has been put in effect in many parts of the country, "with the very best results."

He is in favor of continuing this policy, but is of the opinion that the matter of small holdings should be again referred to the joint committee of Parliament.

The G. W. V. A. asked if Mr. Meighen favored immigration and naturalization legislation, reserving protection of British traditions with rigorous application of such policy as regards Asiatic immigration.

Mr. Meighen replies that he is in favor of such laws as ensure the preservation of British traditions, and, also, favors the honest enforcement of these laws as regards all classes of immigration. Mr. Meighen says he is in favor of action, where necessary, providing for the complete re-establishment of all ex-service men and women.

#### General Smuts Strongly Supports League of Nations

London, Nov. 13.—A Reuter cable from Pretoria, South Africa, says a strong plea for support of the League of Nations was voiced by Premier General Smuts in an address delivered in the Pretoria Town Hall on Saturday. General Smuts, who incidentally noted with regret the apathy in South Africa regarding the League, believed it would get new assistance from the Washington Conference, on the importance of which he laid stress, for the great work for which it stood.

## PREMIER ENDS CAMPAIGN IN EAST PROVINCES

### Prime Minister Convinced Swing of Victory in These Provinces is With Him.

#### MONTREAL GAZETTE MAKES FORECAST

#### Based on Reports Received from Well Informed Persons Throughout Canada.

#### Special to The Standard.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—The Prime Minister has just completed one of the most remarkable political tours in Eastern Canada. He spoke at over one hundred meetings and the combined audiences totalled well over three hundred thousand. Hon. Mr. Meighen is convinced that in the five eastern provinces the swing of victory is with him, and that he will have a substantial majority over the Farmer-Liberal entente if he can but break even west of Fort William. There is no doubt that he has inspired his party with victory, and in bringing to the government support union labor, the Unionist Liberals and the unattached women's vote has made victory probable where even the most optimistic two months ago could see only at best the largest parliamentary group.

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### At Rousing Rally in Lorneville Minister of Customs and Excise and Colonel MacLaren With Other Speakers Clearly Set Forth Government's Position on Live Campaign Issues of the Day—Meighen's Railroad Policies Clearly Defined by the Minister—Tariff Problems Explained by Colonel MacLaren.

Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter and Dr. Murray MacLaren were accorded a whole-hearted and most enthusiastic reception at Lorneville on Saturday evening. The meeting was held in Coronation Hall, and despite the threatened inclement weather, an exceedingly large crowd was present. The chairman for the occasion was Wallace Galbraith, and in addition to the Minister of Customs and Excise and Dr. MacLaren, the speakers included Councillor W. E. Golding, Dr. J. K. Barton and Marshall Stout.

The chief feature of the meeting was the very brilliant speech of Hon. Dr. Baxter, who dealt with the railway policy of the government from an entirely different viewpoint and in a thoroughly convincing manner. In the course of his remarks, the Minister of Customs and Excise pointed out that, as soon as the government had actual possession of the Grand Trunk Railway it would for the first time have an opportunity to control the situation and be able to say that Canadian goods will be carried through Canada across the Province of New Brunswick. The fact that in the past goods shipped on the Grand Trunk Railway could only be shipped through Canadian ports where they had not been routed by the shippers. It was very easy, however, the speaker pointed out, to divert the freight under such conditions.

Dr. Murray MacLaren was the first speaker, and immediately dealt with the tariff question from the point of view of those engaged in the fishing industry. He declared that, in order for the people in that business to make a living, it was necessary for them to have a market for their fish, and on account of the perishability of fresh fish it was essential that the market should be as near as possible. Those who did not ship fish to the United States required a home market, and any policy which would be injurious to the individual life of Lunenburg would hurt the people of Lunenburg. As regards the people engaged in fishing on the bay and who exported to the United States, if the market in that country was not a sure one or the duty was too high, then it would be detrimental to them. The Fordney bill had raised the tariff considerably on Canadian goods to the injury of these people.

## Mrs. Henry Joseph On Coming Election

"If This Government is Returned Canada Will Recover Very Rapidly."

To many who have had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Henry Joseph of Montreal, the following clipping from The Times Weekly of October 13th, is of interest. Mrs. Henry Joseph of Montreal, well-known philanthropic, patriotic, and social worker in that city, has been paying a visit to this country and is returning to Canada in time for the Federal election.

"Mrs. Joseph has been made president of the first Women's political organization, the Women's National Liberal-Conservative Association, to be recognized by the Canadian Government. While in this country Mrs. Joseph has spoken to large meetings of women in Glasgow and Paisley on Imperial Unity. She is full of enthusiasm for Mr. Meighen's programme and is prepared to line up her members on this side.

"If this Government is returned Canada will recover very rapidly," she said. "Our women's organization should help considerably in the election, for our Canadian women are very sensible. Though the women of Quebec have only a Federal vote they have been educated along political lines, and are inclined to vote to help their men folk without interfering unduly or demanding a special women's platform. Naturally, they want certain things redressed, for certain features of the old code Napoleon, which are unfavorable to women and children, prevail in the province of Quebec unchanged, though they have been four ago changed in France. Married women cannot dispose of their own property without their husband's consent; there is no compulsory education for children and women have not got a provincial or municipal vote. We look to our men to right these things, but we do not hurry them, we are out to see our country revive as quickly as possible from the effects of the war, and we believe that the present Prime Minister is indispensable for such recovery.

"Our Association has branches all over the island of Montreal, and we are organizing the different districts so that when the elections come in December we can draw up our women—like regiments to register—and vote. The organization was formed by Mrs. John Scott last January, and Mrs. MacNaughton first approached the Government with the idea of forming it under Government authority. Every month we have a meeting on political education lines, and have some eminent speaker to address us on a political subject.

## TRIO FIGHT FOR LIFE WITH KING OF THE COBRAS

One Snake Escapes from Cage and Wraps Himself Around Men's Bodies.

New York, Nov. 12.—Threats made for their lives with two king cobras, the deadliest creature of the jungle, in the reptile house of the New York Zoological Park yesterday, Raymond L. Dimars, curator, with keepers Tommy and Keeper Taggart, struggled for more than an hour to carry out an operation on the eyes of the two big snakes, while at the same time the passing of a cobra in the hand, striking of a cobra in the eye, might have meant death inside of two minutes. The battle came when Curator Dimars discovered that the methods he used last week, when he removed a cobra's eye, when he removed a cobra's eye, were proving ineffectual and that a more direct method of subjugation would have to be tried. With one eye clear the big cobra's vision was swift as lightning, and he struck out from under the wire screen tunnel that Head Keeper Tommy slipped over his head and struck savagely, lunging against the little door of his cage just as it slammed shut. The scheme of feeding him a snake to occupy his attention and his jaws while the two men were plucking at the skin over his eye failed completely because the cobra, who has gained rapidly in strength and appetite since his arrival at the zoo, bolted his cannibalistic meal like a professional prize-fighter. He swallowed first a blacksnake six and a half feet long, gulping him down completely before the animal could get over his head. The water snake five feet long, which he despatched with equal rapidity. He is thirteen feet long himself and his mouth reached a length of seven and a half feet. It was immediately after swallowing the second snake that the king cobra knocked the wire tunnel aside, and Dr. Dimars and his assistants, to rest their nerves, decided to deal with the smaller cobra-five feet long. They tackled him with their bare hands. Dr. Dimars opened the door of his cage, waited until the cobra's head rose threateningly and his hood widened out, then shot his arm forward and grabbed the cobra round the neck, while Tommy and Taggart helped him get the writhing body out of the cage. They carried the snake to a laboratory room and held him down on a table while the film was removed from both his eyes. # "ANTONIA" OF THE CUNARD LINE LAST WORD IN PERFECTION OF MODERN STEAMSHIPS

Second of Three Cunarders Either Built or Building by Messrs. Vickers, Limited, Barrow-in-Furness - To be Employed in Canadian Service.

The "Antonia" is the second of three Cunarders either built or building by Messrs. Vickers, Limited, Barrow-in-Furness. The first, the "Scythia," was launched in March last, and the third, the "Serbia," is to be launched in the near future. The "Antonia" is 538 feet long, 65 feet deep, 45 feet gross tonnage, 15,000 speed, 35 knots; accommodation for passengers: cabin, 510; third class, 1,178.

The "Antonia" is the fifth of the thirteen new ships in the Cunard post to the Canadian trade in 1921, all the ships in this service were designed for cabin and third class passengers. Several of the new ships of the Antonia class bear the names of these former Canadian ships, which were lost on war service. The success of these vessels was indisputable. In designing the new ships the company have had the advantage of experience already gained in addition to developments that have taken place in naval architecture and engineering during the past few years.

The highest degree of comfort at a rate which is quite moderate. No attempt has been made to attain the luxury of the former Canadian ships, but the same time owing to the large dimensions of the "Antonia" the public rooms are spacious and the stateroom accommodation is based on the most recent practice.

The cabin passengers, in addition to a large dining saloon, have a reading room, lounge, smoking room and verandah, cafe. This marks an innovation for ships of this type, as also does the charmingly decorated children's room.

The third class passengers, besides a large dining room, have the use of three other public rooms. Like all the other Cunarders, the "Antonia" has oil-fuel and her machinery is of the double-reduction geared turbine type.

**Cabin Passenger Accommodation.**  
The cabin accommodation has been designed by Messrs. Shephard & Bower, architects, Liverpool, who will also be responsible for that of the "Andania," "Alania," and "Aurania."

**Saloon.**  
The saloon is situated on "O" deck (with the kitchen department adjoining) and will be treated in a late Georgian manner. The portholes are arranged in groups of three, giving a wide view. **Verandah Cafe.**  
The verandah cafe is approached direct from the promenade deck and the smoke room. The cafe is carried out in a simple treatment of French style, consisting of paneled walls and pillars. The fascination of the stern view has not been overlooked, and passengers seated in the cafe gain full benefit of this through the large central window, the two side windows and the two large openings looking directly astern. For protection against bad weather the two large openings can be closed by sliding doors. The furniture will consist of wicker chairs and tables, and a small library for the use of the passengers.

**Children's Room.**  
An effect of cheerful cleanliness has been given to the children's room, bright high, with sycamore, polished its natural ivory tint, and severe mouldings and simple enrichment. A bright and beautiful frieze illustrates the principal incidents from "Alice in Wonderland" and the windows are glazed with old-fashioned panes, so fascinating to the child.

Two cosy ingeniously constructed seats have been built, comfortable and designed with an eye to hygienic and artistic considerations. The seats are painted with bright colors, and with all awkward corners eliminated, it will delight most children who love to disengage articles on their own seats.

**Third-Class Accommodation.**  
Third-class passengers will find in the "Antonia" every attention has been given to their comfort. There are well ventilated cabins with berths for two, four or six persons. In the main saloon, every attention has been given to the use of a spacious dining room, smoke room, general room and public room. Outside alleyways separate the groups of rooms and any congestion is eliminated. There is also ample open and covered promenade space. Special kitchens are devoted to the culinary needs of third-class passengers.

**Cunard Building Programme.**  
Today the company's fleet consists of 22 passenger steamships with a total tonnage of 225,000. It has built and due for delivery before the end of 1922, twelve big liners, totalling 210,000 tons. **First Sailing of Anchor-Donaldson**

S.S. Concordia Leaves for St. John on Nov. 26—Cunard Line Summer List.

H. C. Schofield, local agent of the Anchor-Donaldson line, has announced that their first sailing this year will be the S. S. Concordia, which is due to leave the other side for St. John on November 26, and is scheduled to sail for Glasgow and Havre on the 26th of December. It will be the first of this steamer to St. John.
