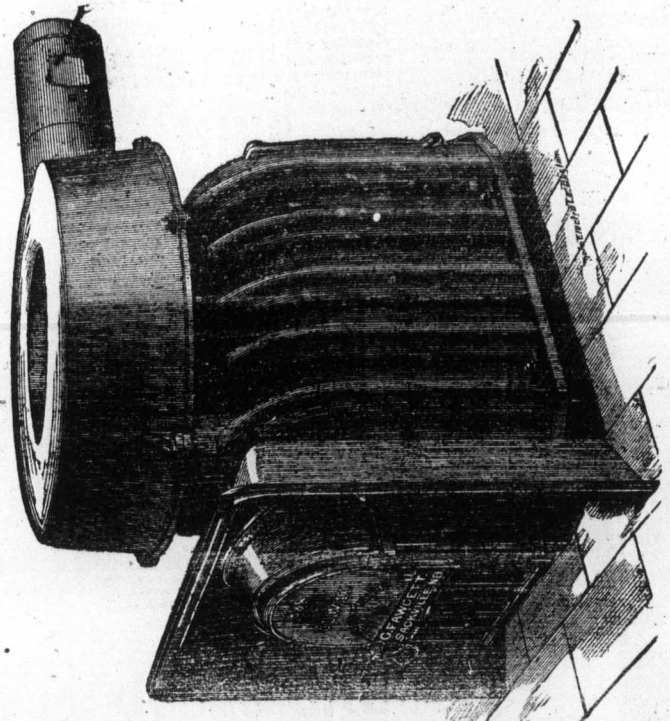

Moncton wants to increase its police force.
