Counsel had been \$1,167 less than the estimate of \$10,000. The honorable speaker touched on the other points wherein the estimate differed from the actual expenditure and explained the reasons therefore to the satisfaction of the House. In education there had been an estimate of \$594,377 62, and an expenditure of \$594,283 32, or an over-expenditure of \$3,860 70. 377 62, and an expenditure of \$594, 238 32, or an over-expenditure of \$3,860 70. This had been occasioned by the incurring of \$4,235 on ascount of the examinations already referred to, and was more than counterbalanced by the additional receipts. On account of maintenance of public buildings the expenditure had fallen short of the estimate by \$7,555, principally due to the fact that an estimate of \$5,500 had been taken last year for two of the cottages at Mimico, which were to accommodate 100 additional insane patients, and were promised by July 1 but were not ready until January and did not figure in the accounts. There was an overexpenditure on account of the changes at the Central Prison in connection with the industries, which would come up for full discussion at the proper time. In immigration the estimate and expenditure had been about alike, and in agriculture the expenditure had heen \$5,200 less than the estimate of \$143,987. On public buildings there had been an expenditure of \$518,407 against an estimated expenditure of \$612,389. The amount expended, however, was the largest in any year since Coniederation. It included \$260,455 for new asylum accommodation, viz., \$172,052 for the cottages at Mimico, \$57,596 for the Idiot Asylum at Orillia, and \$30,797 on the London Asylum. Complaints had been made in some quarters that the Government of Ontario had been remiss in its duty in providing accommodation for the insane of the Province, "but," said Mr. Ross, "whatever may be the short comings of the Mowat Administration, this at least cannot be laid against it. Mr. Ross said he would like honorable gentlement to look with same spectacles on Dominion accounts as they did on Ontario accounts, and they would see that in spite of the flourish of trumpets they had recently heard of a surplus of \$1,800,000 in this Dominion Treasury last year the public accounts showed they had borrowed money and increased their debt by over \$2,000,000. The Ontario Government had provided from its ordinary receipts for all necessary expenditure to carry on the services of the Government and had carried \$247,982 in cash railway certificates, and had at the close of the year in the banks cash to the amount of \$21,261, or only \$111,683 less than the amount there last year. He thought the position was one the House might justly congratulate itself upon. (Applause.)

LEGISLATURE NOTES.

Hon. Messrs. Drury, Hardy and Gibson received in the library Thursday afternoon the largest deputation of those interested in farming that has waited on the Government for many years. They represented the 89 electorial districts agricultural societies of the Province and their mission was to ask the Government for an additional grant of \$20,000 for the exclusive use of their societies. The delegates from Middlesex were John McPherson, James Shibley and R. Tooley, M.P.P. Mr. Dawson, of Algoma, was the first to address the Ministers and was followed by a number of others, who showed how from various causes the societies have become crippled. Hon. Mr. Drury, in reply, said he was pleased the farmers are following in the footsteps of all others in the Province who want the Government's assistance. This is as it should be. He had hoped that in the discussion something would have been said by the speakers touching a proposition made to the Government, to the effect that they should make a grant to central associations. He also expected to hear an expression of opinion regarding the usefulness of township shows. The Minister of Agriculture went on then to say that the Government had not the control of the \$10,000 formerly given to the Provincial Exhibition. The Council of the Agricultural and Arts Association want \$6,000 this year, and the grant in connection with agriculture. 

Of distilled spirits 71,064,733 gallons were used in 1887—a less quantity than was used in 1860, when the population was only half as large.

expenditures. In legislation the expenditure had been \$1,611 31 under the estimate. No Government has done more in the direction of providing accommodation freely to the insane and needy than the Government of Ontario. During the present Parliament alone accommodation had been provided, at a cost of about \$600,000, for 508 additional permanent beds in the asylums of the Province—100 in Toronto, 40 at London, 278 at Hamilton and 90 at Orillia. When all the cottages at Mimico were completed there would be accommodation for 350 more insane, and, when the asylum at Orillia was completed, for 200 more idiots.

The total votes placed at the disposal of the Government amounted to \$3,360,040, and the ordinary expenditure under the Supply Bill to \$3,181,614, less by \$178,426 than the amount voted. The ordinary receipts had been \$3,499,298, and, taking from this the ordinary expenditure he had just mentioned of \$3,181,614, there was a balance of receipts over expenditure on the ordinary account of \$317,684.
