



The men draw the gravel, it is true, but with the gravel I notice they bring a large quantity of goodly-sized stones, whih become a veritable obstruction, especially to wheelmen. You say these stones help to form the roadway. Not at all. As well might you claim that the knots in a well-worn board sidewalk serve a good purpose.
