Brechin, Ont., March 17 .- Mrs. Thomas McCauley, her 10-months-old babe, her 5-year-old boy, John and Josephine Callaghan, a servant, lost their lives early today when the Brechin Hotel was destroyed by fire. Two children of Mrs. McCauley, a girl aged 2 and a boy of 10, were rescued along with another lad Only Green Tickets Accepted about 10 years old, a visitor in the

Two servants, Misses McGerney and Crosby, jumped from the windows and escaped serious injury. The flames were discovered by Victor Adair, one of the boarders, who, after making his own escape, bravely smashed in the back door and succeeded in dragging out Mc-Cauley. He also aassisted in getting out

Mrs. McCauley. The children who escaped the holoaust were saved by neighbors . The building is totally destroyed and

The fire was carried by a stiff breeze across the street and destroyed the residence and offices of Dr. Gilpin. ## HYDRO INVESTMENT REACHES NEAR SIX MILLION DOLLARS

Total Plant Value Placed at Nine Millions in Annual Report-Net Profits of Operation During Past Year \$390,000.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, March 16 .- In the annual report of the hydro-electric power comnission tabled in the Legislature it is shown that 357.47 miles of lines are completed and 198 miles are under construction. The total capital investment is \$5,915,724, while the Province has advanced to date \$6,022,646. Of this amount. \$5,190,858 has been expended on the Niagara system. On provincial account for the year 1912-13, \$138,835 was spent for engineering assistance to municipalities, hydrographic surveys, rules and regulations, shop and development work and other services not chargeable to the municipalities direct.

The mileage of the different systems is made up as follows: Niagara, 378; St. Lawrence, 45; Simcoe, 67; Wasdells Falls, 65.



## HALF-MILE FRONTAGE FOR A LAKE HARBOR

Government to Learn of Advantages of Inverhuron-Would Be C. P. R. Terminal.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Walkerton, March 16 .- A large delegation from the western part of Bruce met here today preliminary to taking the af-ternoon C. P. R. train to Ottawa to lay before the Government the natural advantages of Inverhuron as a harbor of refuge for the Upper Lakes.

This harbor in its natural state, they claim, would give over half a mile of frontage for vessels drawing 30 feet of water. The shores are of solid rock with a clay bottom to the harbor. It is surrounded by an inlet or bay four-fifths of a mile long and half a mile deep. It is understood that if this harbor is taken in hand by the Government the C. P. R. would extend its line from Walkerton, which is now the terminal of this port, passing at or near Cargill and lapping two townships not now served by any railway. Warden McWhinney and W. D. 



### Western Ontario Will Lose Four Seats at Ottawa

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, March 16.—As forecast in The Advertiser two weeks ago, Western Ontario will lose four members in the Dominion Parliament by the work of the redistribution committee which will soon


A CONSISTENT POLICY.

THE C. P. R. management have an A extensive program for the year. They propose to expend some \$80,000,000 in improving the condition of their road in the mountain sections, and making extensions. When originally constructed. like all other old railway lines, the chief object was to get it running as quickly as possible, and with as little initial outlay as possible. Steep grades, sharp curves, poor stations, anything was permissible that allowed a speedy opening of the line. Now that the road is established, they are doing just as other companies have done, and are laving out millions to make up the deficiencies in the original construction.

The managers of the C. P. R. are recognized as shrewd men, and their employees as capable. So our Government, anxious to improve its intercolonial railway, has borrowed an employee from the C. P. R .- a Mr. Gutelius-to look after its line. And Mr. Gutelius very sensibly proposes the C. P. R. policy-straightening it out, levelling it, and attending to all the weaknesses inseparable from its early construction. His recommendations are approved by the Minister of Railways, and will be carried out. To this

New Brunswick Farmer Serving Term in United States Prison for Smuggling.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, March 16 .- In commemoration of the event of St. Patrick's Day Parlia ment discussed the case of William James Kelly, a New Brunswick farmer of Irish blood, who smuggled potatoes across the international boundary into the state of Maine. # SIR JOHN MURRAY, PROF. POWYS TALKS LADIES' COLLEGE IS

Students at Wellesley Behave Tells of Her Work in English Superbly and No Lives Lost Literature and of That of the -Damage Estimated at **Bronte Sisters—Reviews** \$1,500,000. Mrs. Cross' Characters.

George Eliot, philosopher, moralist, freethinker, and positivist, and the Bronte sisters, conventional, prudish, demure, without knowledge of the world and little of human nature, formed the subject for an extremely interesting lecture from John Cowper Powys, M. A., speaking here under the auspices of the Women Teachers'

Guild, last night. Mr. Powys dealt first with Mrs. Cross and her books. George Eliot, he said was really the first great English philosopher to write fiction. She was of such a receptive mind that she embraced many religions and philosophies in turn, the last being positivism. Very vividly Mr. Powys sketched scenes from Mill on the Floss. Middlemarch, Adam Bede, and Romola. George Eliot, he declared, delighted to take the priggish type of man for her hero, and to treat the pretty girls of her stories cruelly. Mr. Powys detested such

With her positivistic creed, George Eliot worshipped the human race, and it fire and sounding the fire gong. was this that influenced her to idealize the lower classes to such an extent. Mr. Powys doubted if such characters as she described could be found in Derbyshire today at least. George Eliot he deemed was at her best with a character like Maggie Tolliver, in which she practically described her own childhood and girlhood with all its longings and disappointments. In regard to Dinah Morris, the speaker pointed out that here the side of George Eliot that idealized duty was manifested. George Eliot scarcely admitted the existence of a God, or of immortality, but held that duty should go on forever; that although the human race might die like was this that influenced her to idealize although the human race might die like dogs, the actions, words and very thoughts of each unit were like the ripples on a pond; that they affected not only the community, but the world at large. No one could do anything without large. No one could do anything without influencing others, and it was therefore the demand of duty that each individual learn to command himself, suppress vices, and lead a noble and heroic life
