

NEW GUNS FOR CANADA

Ottawa, May 29 .- In anticipation of supplying Canadian batteries with the new British 18-pounder field gun, limbers are now under construction in Ottawa. It was announced, it will be remembered, at the last annual meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association, that the Canadian Government had arranged for a supply of the new British artillery arm. The guns and carriages will be procured from England and the limbers and wagons will be constructed here. These are now, being made in parts, which will be assembled as soon as all that are necessary are finished.

The British Government experts are now experimenting at Woolwich with the new gun, with the object of making it a thoroughly efficient arm, the equal or superior of the best now in existence. It is probable that it will be some time before complete equipment of the gun will be issued in
