The request of the Quebec Government is practically identical with the one made to the Laurier government when a general readjustment of boundaries was under consideration some years ago. It was determined at that time by resolution of the House that any territorial addition to the Province of Quebec should not affect the unit of parliamentary representation as determined under the British North America act.

The action of "The Woman," as everybody knows, centres itself around the telephone, and the telephone girl impersonated by Miss Marjorie Wood, is a sort of "goddess of the machine." The first act discloses Miss Wood sitting at the switchboard of a big Washington hotel, behind her a row of telephone booths.

Just like a really-true-hello girl, Miss Wood wears a steel band about her head, and a round, disklike arrangement clasped over her left ear. Throughout the action of the play she is a telephone girl to the life, so much so that recently one of the managers of the Chicago Telephone Company, after watching the rehearsal closely, was so much impressed with the realism of Miss Wood's work that he sent a personal message of congratulation to her and to Mr. Belasco.

"Miss Wood's performance is so realistic," he declared, "that as I expected I would swear it was no 'dead' wire she was talking over, but a real 'phone.' Imagine that experienced telephone manager's surprise when Mr. Belasco replied with some spirit that it was indeed a real telephone, and that while some managers might countenance a dead wire, he supplied only live ones for his actors when they had occasion to use this conventional invention in the line of staging. He believed, then, Mr. Scarborough made the interesting discovery that the New York Telephone Company has been for years supplying a real telephone connection for every one of Mr. Belasco's plays in which a telephone is required in requisition. In other words, the telephone in "The Woman," as in "Nobody's Widow" and "The Concert," has a connection with the office of the wiring company in the idiom of the day, the perfectly good telephone. Because Mr. Belasco believes that perfectly good acting in association with the telephone can only be attained by giving the actor every possible business advantage, that peculiar little piece of mechanism.

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THE TURKEY TROT AMUSED THE DUKE

New Dance Was Given in Modified Form for Benefit of Connaught.

HIS HIGHNESS IMPRESSED

Thinks American Women Are Beautiful, and Beautifully Dressed, and Likes Democratic Ways.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Jan. 26.—H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, came back to New York this morning from his visit to President Taft in Washington. The duke was delighted with his reception at the national capital, being especially pleased with the democratic simplicity which marked the ceremonies at the White House and at the home of British Ambassador James Bryce. The royal visitor reached this city early and quite in time for his early morning walk, which he has taken daily since "the white-regard party" reached here from Canada last Monday.

His highnesses conclude their visit to New York today, and plan to return to Ottawa at 7:40 o'clock tonight. The duke, the duchess, and Princess Patricia, plan to spend their final day here sight-seeing. They expressed themselves as cordially of their reception here, and of the delightful time they have had.

The Duke's Impressions. The Duke of Connaught's "impressions" are given in a statement prepared during his railroad journey between Washington and New York. Royalty is not allowed by court etiquette to be quoted in the first person, and the statement, therefore, is in the third person, one of the duke's aunts acting as his proxy. Part of the statement as published here today follows:

"The duke has been very much gratified with the reception accorded to him in New York, and says that they could not but have made more fuss over him had he been the President or the ex-President. The duke approves of the easy ways of Americans and Canadians, and does not mind in the least being called 'Duky,' as he sometimes is by persons in the street. He prefers the democratic manner to the stiff formality in England.

"He has also noticed the nervousness of the average woman in the streets, the general air of prosperity, and the richness of the costumes of the society women.

"At the dance on Wednesday night he was astonished at the vivacity and beauty of the young women present, and the display of wonderful jewels. The duke had never seen such a collection of brilliant gems at any court function. The Turkey Trot, which was danced in modified form, amused the distinguished visitor very much.

"The duke has not heard anything about the King and Queen visiting the United States, when they go to Canada, but he thinks they will want to come after having heard his account of the people, their warm welcome, and the interesting things to be seen in the United States.

"The duke wishes to be entirely understood, that his visit to New York was his own idea, following an invitation given to him by Mr. Reid in London."

Butter and Eggs Were Also Sought in the Local Market. The Quotations.

LONDON, Jan. 27. Hay and straw were in demand on the market today, but were not plentiful, as they rarely are on the Saturday market.

Butter brought from 25c to 32c per lb. Eggs averaged 35c per dozen, but varied from 30c to 40c.

Barley and other grains are called for, but are seldom offered on the local market. Hay sells at from \$17 to \$18 per ton.

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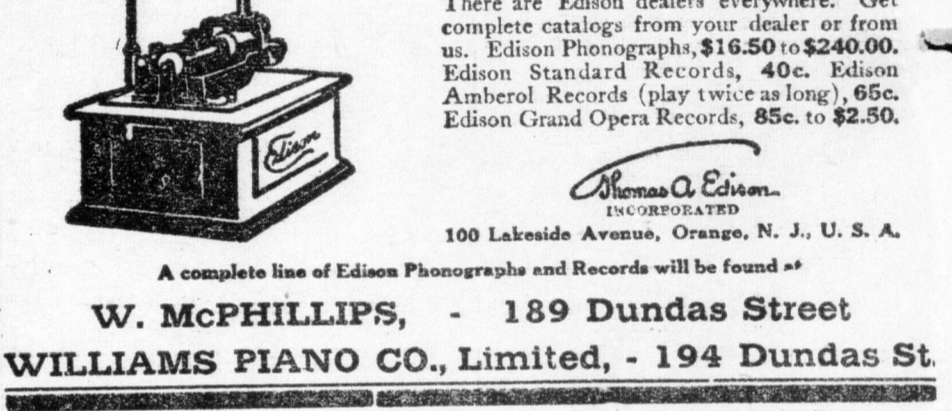

Five Hundred Hens in America's First Egg Laying Contest

Willimantic, Conn., Jan. 26.—Over at the Connecticut Agricultural College at Storrs, up among the Eastern Connecticut hills, 500 hens are laying eggs to the best of their ability. They are hens of the bluest blood in all poultry aristocracy, gathered together from various parts of the world for the first egg-laying contest ever held on the North American continent.

Wallingford, Conn., are represented one by White and the other by Brown Leghorns. Connecticut is, of course, largely represented, and so are Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey; but the eastern poultry raisers are joined by their brethren from Michigan, where so many of the cold-storage eggs are laid and stored, and from Kentucky and West Virginia and Illinois.

Canada has four entries altogether, one other besides that of the Trappist fathers from Quebec Province and two from Ontario. White Leghorns, Brown Leghorns, Rhode Island Reds and Barred Plymouth Rocks show the catholicity of taste of the Canadian poultry raisers—not fanciers, since while many of the birds entered would do well in the show-room each is entered here simply for its egg-producing powers and not at all because it possesses any of the points which go to make up the breeder's ideal or any of the qualities best fitting it for the table.
